Scottsville Elementary is part of the **Southern Feeder Pattern**. Students continue to Walton Middle School and will graduate from Monticello High School.



Partnering with Community Scottsville Elementary School serves 186 students in preschool through fifth grade with 39 faculty and staff members. Now located on 15 acres in the rural town of Scottsville, the school was originally founded in 1908 to accommodate both

SCOTTSVILLE TIGER elementary and secondary students, and was situated on Scottsville Hill above Valley Street. The high school became fully accredited by the state department of education and the University of Virginia in 1913; then a new building was established on Main Street which went on to weather a series of major floods through 1972. In 1967 grades ten through twelve were redistributed to Albemarle High, and Scottsville became a combination elementary and junior high school, with the addition of a kindergarten class in 1973. The next year, grades six through eight moved to Walton Middle School at its inception, and ninth graders began to attend Jouett. The current structure, built in 1981, received an award for its design by the American Institute of Architects and includes ten classrooms, a media center, cafeteria and gymnasium. Scottsville recently renovated and updated their library in 2004-05, and each classroom now has high-speed Internet access. In 2009, the Scottsville students, also known as the Scottsville Tigers, participated in the Virginia Reader's Choice program, an opportunity for students to collectively read notable books and then vote on their quality.

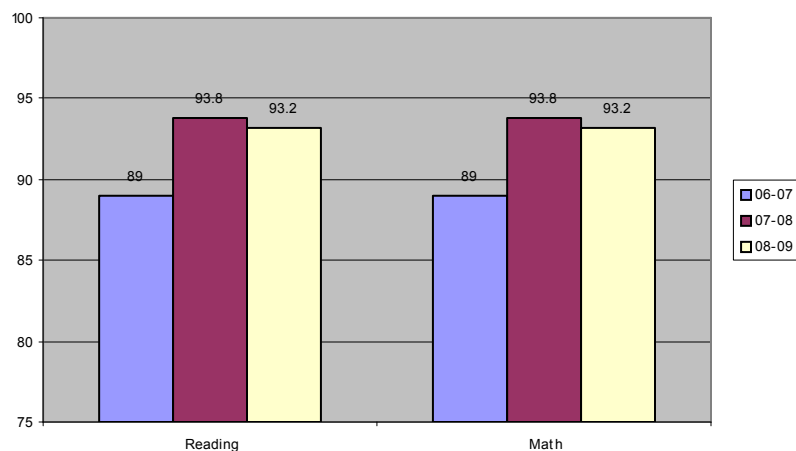

1908: Initially grades 1-12

1967: Grades 10-12 moved to Albemarle High

1973: Kindergarten class added

1974: Grades 6-8 moved to Walton Middle School, grade 9 moved to Jack Jouett Middle School

2000: Bright Stars preschool program added

Renovation Information

1876: Scottsville School was moved to a brick building, later called the Council building, on the corner of Main Street and Route 20.

1906: A new school was built on Schoolhouse Hill overlooking the Horseshoe bend of the James River and began as a large gray building with bell tower.

1925: A new brick building constructed at corner of Page and Main opened with a kitchen, stage, and library; primary classes were taught at a cottage on Byrd Street.

1974: The new school was built in the shape of a pod after Hurricane Agnes, which flooded the old school in 1972. Included was a classroom wing to accommodate primary students.

1981: The Scottsville pod was renovated and expanded with 10 classrooms, administrative offices, gym, media center, and cafeteria.

2005: Scottsville finished enlarging its library.
