INFORMATION/DISCUSSION ITEMS

Discussion – Fiscal Year 2027 Operational & Maintenance and Capital Improvement Plan Budget

This is the third budget worksession of the FY27 budget cycle, held to continue discussion of departmental requests, capital improvement planning, and public engagement related to the FY27 budget.

Finance Director Wanda Colvin. Ms. Colvin advised the Board that the work session would begin with presentations from the Sheriff's Office, Fire & EMS, and Louisa County Public Schools.

Louisa County Sheriff's Office

Lieutenant Jordan Alvis of the Louisa County Sheriff's Office presented an overview of the agency's current operations, staffing levels, and future staffing needs. He explained that the Sheriff's Office provides 24-hour law enforcement coverage across approximately 500 square miles and serves a population of about 39,000 residents, with service demands increasing significantly during the summer months due to tourism at Lake Anna.

The county is divided into five patrol sectors, currently staffed with one deputy per sector and a roaming supervisor. The busiest patrol areas are East 1 (Bumpass/Lake Anna) and West 2 (Zions

Crossroads). In the previous year, the county received approximately 37,000 law enforcement calls, with the Sheriff's Office serving as the primary responding agency for 31,720 calls. The Town of Louisa Police Department recorded 5,274 calls, with the Sheriff's Office assisting when town officers are unavailable.

The Sheriff's Office currently has 27 full-time patrol deputies, with a minimum staffing level of three deputies on duty. Additional deputies are scheduled during peak hours between 2:00 PM and 2:00 AM, bringing ideal staffing to approximately seven deputies on duty.

Due to projected population growth—estimated to reach approximately 44,679 residents by 2030—the Sheriff's Office proposed increasing patrol staffing from 27 to 40 deputies to allow two deputies per sector, which would improve response times and ensure coverage when multiple officers are required for incidents such as domestic disputes or arrests.

Lieutenant Alvis also noted that Emergency Custody Orders (ECOs) can require deputies to remain with individuals at hospitals for extended periods, sometimes up to eight hours, placing additional strain on staffing resources.

The presentation also addressed impacts on other divisions, including the Civil Process Division and the Emergency Communications Center (dispatch). Dispatch currently has 16 authorized positions with four vacancies, and the department has proposed increasing staffing to 18 positions to accommodate growing call volume.

A three-year staffing plan was outlined:

- FY2027: Five patrol deputies, one civil process deputy, one emergency communications officer, and one full-time records clerk
- FY2028: Five patrol deputies and one civil process deputy and one communications officer
- FY2029: Three patrol deputies

Lieutenant Alvis noted that hiring and training a deputy takes approximately one year, including academy training and field training, and that equipping a new deputy can cost around \$100,000. He concluded by thanking the Board for prior salary increases that have improved recruitment and retention, and emphasized that the phased staffing plan is intended to help the Sheriff's Office meet the needs of a growing county while managing budget impacts.

Louisa County Fire & EMS

Chief Hawk presented an overview of the Byron Fire & EMS budget request, noting that public safety agencies provide 24/7 services and must maintain reliable operations regardless of weather or other circumstances. She reported that call volumes continue to increase, with EMS calls accounting for approximately 80–85% of total responses, while fire calls are also rising. She emphasized the need for adequate staffing, ongoing training, and compliance to ensure safe and effective emergency response.

Chief Hawk stated the department currently staffs 26 career personnel daily across five stations, with four vacancies and nine additional positions funded through the FEMA SAFER grant, which are expected to be filled with an academy starting in April. Those positions will staff a 24-hour fire engine at the Locust Creek station to improve response times in the eastern portion of

the county. She also noted that administrative staff often assist with high-acuity incidents and that increased call volume has recently led to more instances of “no units available.”

During discussion, Chief Hawk explained that major incidents—such as structure fires, serious vehicle crashes, or emergency medical transports—can require multiple units and personnel for extended periods, placing additional strain on staffing and resources.

Chief Hawk outlined the importance of adequate staffing for safety, reliable task assignments, improved response times, reduced overtime, retention, and preventing burnout among personnel. She also reviewed capital improvement needs, including apparatus replacement, renovations to older stations to support full-time staffing, potential relocation of the Zions Crossroads Firehouse, and expansion of the training center classroom.

She noted that major budget drivers include personnel costs, insurance, fleet maintenance, equipment, medical supplies, and fuel, and emphasized that turnout gear alone costs approximately \$5,000 per set.

Chief Hawk reported that FY25 call volume totaled approximately 7,900 calls, with response times considered strong for a rural locality. She also discussed rising apparatus costs, noting that ambulances cost approximately \$425,000–\$450,000, fire engines over \$1 million, tankers \$500,000–\$600,000, and ladder trucks \$2.0–\$2.4 million.

Deputy Chief Lee then reviewed grant funding secured by the department. Over the past five years, Byron Fire & EMS has received approximately \$6.3 million in federal and state grants, including \$5.9 million from FEMA, which helped support staffing, equipment, and operational needs. Additional grants funded firefighter safety equipment, ambulance equipment, wellness programs, and emergency shelter upgrades. He noted that these grants significantly offset costs that would otherwise fall to local taxpayers.

Board members commended the department for aggressively pursuing grant opportunities and noted that Louisa County’s high call volume and long hospital transport distances strengthen the department’s competitiveness for certain grants.

Louisa County Public Schools

Superintendent Doug Straley presented LCPS’s vision to become a world-class, forward-thinking school division and a model for the future, with a continued focus on challenging every student to reach their maximum potential. He reviewed the division’s mission to equip students with the “5 Cs” (including communication, collaboration, creativity, and citizenship/character) to prepare them for a changing workforce.

He highlighted major initiatives supported in recent budgets, including expanded early literacy support, full-time gifted services, 1:1 student devices, STEAM learning opportunities (including elementary labs and secondary innovation spaces), stronger CTE/workforce development programs, enhanced mental health supports, expanded extracurricular offerings, and division-wide safety measures (including school resource officers and weapons detection systems). He also noted recent facility improvements, including the LCMS addition and launch of the Marine Corps JROTC program.

The Superintendent reviewed recent performance highlights, including continued full accreditation, improved test scores at multiple schools, increased CTE completers, expanded teacher pipeline participation, strong community engagement events, and recognition of LCPS programs at the state and national level.

For the upcoming budget, he outlined three main areas:

- Operational increases, including insurance costs (with some final amounts pending).
- Staffing and operating needs tied to the LCMS addition, including a technology technician, cafeteria support, an agriculture teacher, custodial positions, and increased utilities/supplies.
- Compensation, emphasizing staff as LCPS's most valuable resource: a 3% plus step increase for certified staff, a 4% increase for classified staff, continued degree supplement adjustments, and pay scale updates for administrative assistants/secretaries.

He stated projected state funding figures were based on the Governor's introduced budget, with House/Senate impacts still unknown. Using projected state funding and VRS savings, LCPS identified a local request of approximately \$2.933 million plus final healthcare costs (pending).

Board members thanked LCPS for its work and asked questions regarding swimming lessons (held at the Brooks Family YMCA in Charlottesville), energy savings from solar projects, and test score improvements. The Superintendent attributed performance gains to strategies including the science of reading, tutoring/small-group supports, expanded learning opportunities, and staff retention supported through compensation.

The Board also discussed student mental health needs and noted the importance of continued counselor support. Finally, members raised concerns about a proposed high-voltage transmission line route potentially running close to school properties and requested the division monitor impacts to current and future school sites.

Discussion – Fiscal Year 2027 Operational & Maintenance and Capital Improvement Plan Budget (Continued)

Ms. Colvin reported that the operating budget is still being finalized, noting that final health insurance numbers are not expected for another one to two weeks and are projected to be higher than initially budgeted. However, the County realized a 1% savings in VRS contributions, totaling approximately \$256,000. Due to anticipated changes to the Children's Services Act (CSA) funding formula, which will increase the County's share, the VRS savings were reallocated to cover projected CSA expenditures.

She also reported that assessment values have been received, and adjustments have been made to the budget accordingly. A public hearing on assessments will be held at the March 16 meeting, with presentations from the Assessor's Office and staff.

The Board discussed funding for the Northern Virginia Emergency Response System, which replaced the former Thomas Jefferson EMS Council. Staff had originally budgeted \$13,000 based on preliminary guidance, but the organization later requested \$20,000. Because the County has not yet used the service and the benefit is still unclear, staff recommended beginning with \$13,000 to evaluate the value of services. The Board approved the \$13,000 funding level.

Mr. Woodward then discussed a capital improvement project for the former Girl Scout House/library building, which is currently used by Parks and Recreation and community groups. The building requires exterior siding and window replacement, estimated at \$225,000. While the Finance Committee had previously recommended moving the project to the FY28 budget, Mr. Woodward requested that it remain in the FY27 budget due to deteriorating siding and the continued use of the facility. The matter was referred back to the Finance Committee for further review.

Ms. Colvin reported that the current draft budget reflects approximately \$1.4 million available for long-term reserves, though additional adjustments are still under discussion. The Board agreed to hold an additional budget work session on March 16 at 4:00 PM prior to the regular meeting.

Staff also discussed potential congressionally directed funding requests, including public safety apparatus replacement, housing foundation initiatives, and possible animal shelter improvements, which could help offset capital improvement costs.

Next Worksession and Budget Roadshow Dates

The Board requested staff schedule a budget work session to finalize the overall budget before adoption. The next budget worksession will be held March 16, and the start time would be adjusted to 4:00 p.m.

RECOGNITIONS

Recognition – Recognizing and Commending Gordon Brooks for His Dedicated Service on the Louisa County Planning Commission

The Board recognized Gordon Brooks for his dedicated service on the Louisa County Planning Commission. Members of the Board expressed their appreciation for Mr. Brooks' time, commitment, and the respect and dignity with which he served the County during his tenure. Supervisor Barlow presented Mr. Brooks with a framed resolution in recognition of his service and contributions to Louisa County.

PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

Chairman Adams opened the public comment period.

Mr. David Purcell, Louisa District, (Town of Louisa), addressed the Board regarding the proposed ValleyLink power line project that would pass through the rural areas of Louisa County. Mr. Purcell stated that he is opposed to the project, expressing concern that the power

line would negatively impact the rural character of the County. He urged the Board to unanimously issue a statement, resolution, or other formal action expressing opposition to the proposed power line.

Mr. Adams Combs, Louisa District, addressed the Board regarding the proposed ValleyLink transmission line and data center development. Mr. Combs stated that he hoped Board members had taken time to research the issue and thanked Supervisor Jones for attending a recent community meeting and showing support for residents concerned about the project. Mr. Combs expressed opposition to the proposed overhead transmission lines, citing concerns including potential health impacts related to electromagnetic fields (EMF), noise pollution, and potential impacts on property values. He also raised questions regarding the energy demand associated with proposed data center developments in the area, particularly referencing a large facility proposed along Route 33. Mr. Combs questioned where the electrical capacity required for such facilities would originate and whether adequate planning had been conducted to account for the associated power needs. During his remarks, Mr. Combs questioned the Board's actions regarding the project and suggested that the Board was not being sufficiently proactive in opposing the proposed power lines. He further alleged that Dominion Energy's involvement raised concerns about whether the Board was being influenced or financially motivated to allow the project to proceed. Mr. Combs advocated for consideration of alternative transmission methods, specifically underground high-voltage direct current (HVDC) transmission lines rather than traditional overhead infrastructure, and referenced international examples of long-distance HVDC transmission projects. He concluded by urging the Board to conduct additional research, consider underground HVDC transmission options, and revisit the issue before allowing the project to move forward.

Mr. Hurley Lucckese, Patrick Henry District, addressed the Board regarding the proposed resolution on the evening's agenda related to the 2026 Virginia redistricting proposal. Mr. Lucckese stated that the redistricting effort was intended as a response to concerns about gerrymandering occurring in other states, including Texas, and was meant to promote fairness and representation on a national level. He expressed concern about local governments issuing statements opposing the proposed redistricting, stating that such actions could discourage citizens from researching the issue and considering both the potential benefits and drawbacks of the proposal. Mr. Lucckese emphasized the importance of allowing Virginia voters to exercise their constitutional role in determining redistricting matters. The speaker encouraged the Board to consider multiple perspectives, engage in thoughtful discussion, and avoid approaching the issue strictly through partisan viewpoints. He concluded by urging the Board to focus on what is best for the Louisa County community and to be mindful of how public statements may influence public understanding of the issue.

Mr. Roy Waters, Mineral District, addressed the Board and thanked the members for their service. Mr. Waters requested clarification regarding proposed rezoning language to ensure that family divisions would remain excluded from new restrictions. He also asked for an update on the TOD rollback related to the Fisher Chewing property. Mr. Waters expressed concerns about several budget priorities, including funding for the animal shelter, the maintenance shop, and expenditures related to inmate medical care. He also discussed tax assessments and personal property tax relief, suggesting the County consider reallocating funds to accelerate tax relief efforts. Additionally, Mr. Waters raised concerns about heavy construction traffic along Route 33 associated with the Northeast Creek Data Center project, citing safety concerns near a school bus stop, and asked who is responsible for water used for dust control during construction.

Mr. Ed Bailey, Albemarle County Resident, addressed the Board regarding the proposed ValleyLink transmission line. Mr. Bailey noted that under Virginia law, property owners generally cannot recover damages for loss of property or business value caused by a transmission line constructed on another property, meaning nearby landowners and businesses could bear any resulting financial impacts. Mr. Bailey referenced a Virginia Supreme Court case supporting this legal framework and encouraged the Board to request that ValleyLink evaluate underground transmission alternatives and provide information on the potential cost of such an option.

Mr. Mark Itzkoff, Cuckoo District, addressed the Board regarding the proposed resolution on the Virginia redistricting amendment. Mr. Itzkoff expressed opposition to the resolution and asked the Board to refrain from adopting it until Louisa residents have had the opportunity to review and discuss the amendment. Mr. Itzkoff stated that he supports the proposed amendment and encouraged Louisa voters to vote in favor of it, noting that the measure would remain in effect only until the 2030 census and is intended to ensure fairness in the redistricting process.

Ms. Melissa Young, Louisa District (Town of Louisa), addressed the Board in opposition to the proposed ValleyLink 765 kV transmission line, expressing concerns about potential impacts on nearby schools, property values, and the rural character of the County. She also raised concerns about possible health and safety risks associated with overhead transmission lines and encouraged consideration of underground alternatives. Additionally, Ms. Young asked for an update on the new turf athletic fields, noting that student athletes are eager to begin using them and requesting information on when the fields may be ready for use.

Ms. Robin Horne, Mineral District, addressed the Board regarding the proposed ValleyLink Dominion transmission line project. Ms. Horn expressed concerns about the potential impacts on private property, farms, and the rural landscape of Louisa County. She also noted difficulty submitting comments through the ValleyLink website despite being invited to provide input. Ms. Horne stated that Louisa County has previously supported major energy infrastructure projects and urged the Board to adopt a resolution opposing the proposed transmission line and explore alternative solutions.

Mr. Colby Horne, Mineral District, addressed the Board regarding the proposed ValleyLink 765 kV transmission line. Mr. Horne stated that he was speaking as a property owner and parent concerned about the potential impact of the project on his family and community. Mr. Horne expressed opposition to the proposed transmission line, stating that he believes it could negatively affect property values, the rural character of Louisa County, and the quality of life of nearby residents. He also raised concerns about potential noise and electromagnetic field exposure associated with high-voltage transmission infrastructure. Mr. Horne urged the Board to place the interests of local residents first, explore alternative solutions, and adopt a resolution opposing the ValleyLink project.

Chairman Adams acknowledged that a written comment had been received and, at the request of the submitter, asked that it be made part of the public meeting record. (See Appendix A.)

The following speakers either did not complete a comment card or submitted their card after the meeting; therefore, names and spellings may be inaccurate.

Ms. Paula Durbin Westby, Yanceyville Road, addressed the Board regarding the proposed ValleyLink 765 kV transmission line. Ms. Westby stated that she had spoken with several neighbors who reported they had not received notification letters about the potential route. Ms. Westby urged the Board to issue a strong resolution opposing the project, and stated that if the project proceeds, she believes the transmission lines should be installed underground rather than overhead. She also expressed concerns about potential fire risks, noise, property value impacts, and safety issues related to transmission infrastructure, particularly for vulnerable residents in the area. Ms. Westby also encouraged the Board to consider supporting community efforts opposing the project.

Ms. Juanita Jo Matkins, Yanceyville Road, addressed the Board regarding the proposed Virginia redistricting amendment, stating that she supports the measure and encouraged voters to approve it. Ms. Matkins discussed the importance of checks and balances within the federal government and expressed her belief that the amendment is necessary to protect democratic processes. Ms. Matkins also noted that she is a member of Yanceyville Church, which owns property used for conservation and a youth summer nature camp that could be affected by the proposed ValleyLink transmission line route. She expressed support for placing the transmission line underground.

Dr. Michael Huffman, Louisa District, addressed the Board regarding the proposed Virginia redistricting amendment, stating that he opposed the measure. Dr. Huffman, who identified himself as the Executive Director of the Virginia Assembly of Independent Baptists and a professor of constitutional law, stated that he believes the amendment does not comply with provisions of the Virginia Constitution and state law governing the constitutional amendment process. Dr. Huffman referenced concerns related to the 90-day requirement between passage of an amendment resolution and the election, the timing of notice provided to local courts and registrars, and procedures related to the amendment's legislative passage. He stated that he believes the amendment process violated Article XII of the Virginia Constitution and provisions of the Code of Virginia, and encouraged citizens to vote against the referendum.

Mr. Jerl Purcell, Louisa District, addressed the Board regarding the proposed ValleyLink 765 kV transmission line. Mr. Purcell stated that while he supports the need for a reliable electric grid, he is concerned about the proposed routing of the overhead transmission line through actively managed agricultural and forest land in Louisa County. Mr. Purcell emphasized that farmland and timberland should not be characterized as "undeveloped," noting that such land is actively used for agricultural production, forestry, and economic activity and contributes to the County's rural character. He expressed concern that the proposed infrastructure could permanently alter working farms and forest operations. Mr. Purcell urged the Board to formally oppose the proposal and request that the State Corporation Commission consider alternatives, such as locating infrastructure alongside existing corridors, underground routing, or placing generation facilities closer to areas of high demand. He thanked the Board for the opportunity to speak.

Ms. Helene Purcell, Louisa District, addressed the Board regarding the proposed ValleyLink transmission line. Ms. Purcell stated that she had spent time speaking with neighbors about the project and noted that some residents had only recently received notification letters or were not yet aware of the proposal. Ms. Purcell expressed concern about potential property value impacts, particularly for homeowners whose properties may be near the proposed route but not directly affected by the right-of-way. She described speaking with a nearby homeowner who had recently built a house and may be impacted by the proposed route. Ms. Purcell also shared concerns about

the potential effects of the project on farmland, wildlife, and the rural character of the area, noting the stewardship of her property and the presence of local wildlife.

Mr. Butch Duke, Patrick Henry District, addressed the Board regarding the proposed ValleyLink transmission line. Mr. Duke stated that he opposed the project as currently proposed and encouraged the Board to send a strongly worded letter expressing opposition. Mr. Duke expressed concern that the transmission line would primarily serve energy demand in Northern Virginia, while providing little direct benefit to Louisa County. He also suggested that future transmission infrastructure associated with data center development should be installed underground rather than overhead.

Mr. Mitchell Sasser, Louisa District (Town of Louisa), addressed the Board regarding a virtual town hall hosted by Delegate Amy Laufer, Delegate Katrina Callsen, and Senator Creigh Deeds. Mr. Sasser stated that during the discussion Senator Deeds referenced the proposed phase-out of the sales and use tax exemption for data centers in the Senate's budget proposal. Mr. Sasser noted that Senator Deeds indicated the exemption, originally projected to cost approximately \$1.6 million annually when introduced in 2008, is now estimated to represent approximately \$1.9 billion in foregone state tax revenue. Mr. Sasser also stated that Senator Deeds indicated the proposal to end the exemption would likely be a significant topic during the remaining weeks of the legislative session. Mr. Sasser stated that Senator Deeds referenced hearing concerns from Louisa County officials regarding the proposal due to the County's anticipated data center revenue. Mr. Sasser noted that he was preparing an article summarizing the virtual town hall and invited any Board members who had communicated with Senator Deeds about the issue to speak with him following the meeting.

With no one else wishing to speak, Chairman Adams closed the public comment period.

INFORMATION/DISCUSSION ITEMS

Resolution – Opposing the Congressional Redistricting Constitutional Amendment

Chairman Adams asked County Administrator Goodwin to read the proposed resolution. Administrator Goodwin indicated that the information was included in the Board packet and had been released for public review the previous week. He read the resolution as follows:

A RESOLUTION OPPOSING THE CONGRESSIONAL REDISTRICTING CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

WHEREAS, a Constitutional Amendment (Article II, Section 6-A) was approved by Virginia's voters in 2020 and the Virginia Redistricting Commission was accordingly created; and

WHEREAS, the proposed amendment received broad support across the Commonwealth of Virginia, with 2,287,091 Virginians favoring the measure; and,

WHEREAS, the Commission was established to convene in 2020, and every ten years thereafter, "for the purpose of establishing districts for the U.S. House of Representatives, the Senate of Virginia and the Virginia House of Delegates" pursuant to the Constitution of Virginia; and,

WHEREAS, the Commission ended partisan gerrymandering of Virginia's legislative districts, creating compact, legally compliant, and contiguous districts; and,

WHEREAS, the Virginia General Assembly called for a Special Session during the last week of October 2025 to propose a Constitutional Amendment that would amend the Constitution of Virginia by allowing the General Assembly to redraw the Congressional Districts in a partisan manner which is contrary to the Commission's goals; and,

WHEREAS, the Virginia General Assembly passed HB 1384, which would force a vote on a constitutional amendment regarding the issue; and

WHEREAS, the Virginia General Assembly set the associated election date for April 21 with early voting beginning on March 6, and should the amendment be approved, Louisa County would be placed in the 7th Congressional District; and,

WHEREAS, the proposed 7th Congressional District would include Powhatan, Goochland, Orange, Greene, Madison Culpeper Counties, and parts of Buckingham, Cumberland, Rockingham, Augusta, Fauquier, Prince William, Fairfax and Arlington Counties; and,

WHEREAS, Louisa County has little in common with some of these localities, and the proposed 7th Congressional District is neither as compact nor contiguous as the current 5th Congressional District, and the County questions the fairness of the measure to our citizens; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, on this 2nd day of March, 2026, that the Louisa County Board of Supervisors does hereby,

1. Express support for existing legislative districts that are compact, contiguous, and compliant with applicable law.
2. Express strong opposition to the proposed Constitutional Amendment which utilizes partisan gerrymandering.
3. Encourage the citizens of Louisa to exercise their right to vote on the proposed amendment.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be presented to Louisa County's General Assembly representatives and the Governor of Virginia.

Supervisor Williams stated that he had requested a change to language encouraging citizens to oppose the amendment so that it would instead encourage citizens of Louisa County to exercise their right to vote on the proposed amendment. He noted that while the "Whereas" statements in the resolution reflected factual background, he did not initially recognize that the resolution title and language in the document expressed opposition to the proposed amendment. Supervisor Williams expressed his view that the Board should avoid engaging in partisan political disputes and instead focus on encouraging civic participation. He stated that the role of the Board should be to ensure citizens are aware of the issue and encouraged to vote based on their own views.

Supervisor Williams proposed revising the title of the resolution to read "*A Resolution Concerning the Congressional Redistricting Constitutional Amendment*" rather than expressing opposition, and to revise language in the resolution to express strong concern regarding the proposed amendment rather than opposition.

Supervisor Williams then moved to amend the resolution by changing the title and modifying the language to express concern while encouraging Louisa County citizens to exercise their right to vote and decide the matter for themselves.

Supervisor Woodward stated that he agreed with the comments made by Supervisor Williams. He expressed the view that the Board should not take a position directing citizens on how to vote on the proposed amendment, but rather acknowledge concerns regarding the issue. Supervisor Woodward commented that the broader issues surrounding the matter stem from actions at the federal level, and stated that he believes responding with similar actions would not resolve the situation. He emphasized that citizens of Louisa County are capable of making their own decisions regarding the referendum and that the Board should not instruct voters on how they should vote.

Supervisor Barnes stated that he did not know how the vote would ultimately proceed but expressed that he was proud of the Board and its focus on putting Louisa County first.

Supervisor McCotter stated that he believes gerrymandering is wrong and noted that he supported allowing the citizens of Louisa County to decide the issue for themselves through the voting process.

Supervisor Barlow also commented that when reviewing the proposal, it appeared to return to practices the redistricting process was intended to avoid, and expressed concern about reverting to partisan redistricting.

Following discussion, the question was called, and the Chairman asked for a vote.

On the motion of Supervisor Williams, seconded by Supervisor Barnes, which carried by a vote of 6-1, with Supervisor Barlow voting against, the Board voted to adopt the resolution, with the proposed amendments to the title and body of the resolution given by Supervisor Williams.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

(None)

NEW BUSINESS/ACTION ITEMS

Resolution – Authorizing a Budget Supplement to Central Virginia Regional Jail for Medical Expenses

Supervisor Williams briefly addressed a comment raised during the public comment period regarding inmate medical expenses. He explained that the County is required to pay its share of medical costs for individuals incarcerated at Central Virginia Regional Jail, noting that these expenses are mandated and not discretionary.

Ms. Colvin shared that the Central Virginia Regional Jail (CVRJ) has incurred \$172,701 in additional medical services costs for the period of July 2025 to December 2025 for Louisa County inmates. The Central Virginia Regional Jail (CVRJ) also expects to incur further medical services costs for the rest of FY2026 (January 2026 to June 2026) for Louisa County inmates in

the amount of \$313,000. She noted these additional costs were not included in the current FY2026 allocation to CVRJ and Louisa County is required to cover such costs for county residents that are incarcerated in the CVRJ facility.

On the motion of Supervisor Williams, seconded by Supervisor Barnes, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted authorize a budget supplement for FY2026 in the amount of \$485,701 to the Central Virginia Regional Jail (10033100-456000) to cover inmate medical billing cost incurred as of December 2025. The source of General Fund Balance.

SUPERVISOR COMMENTS

Green Springs District

Supervisor Jones stated that she had attended a recent community meeting at Southern Revere Cellars where residents discussed concerns regarding the proposed ValleyLink transmission line project. She noted that many residents expressed strong emotions, including fear and concern about potential impacts to their property, health, land, and local schools.

Supervisor Jones stated that she understands the concerns being raised by residents and acknowledged that the project could significantly change the landscape and character of Louisa County. She reflected on past infrastructure projects in the County, including Interstate 64 and the North Anna Power Station, noting that those projects also had lasting impacts on local land and communities.

Supervisor Jones stated that she believes the County should oppose the proposed overhead transmission lines associated with the ValleyLink project. She indicated that she would be interested in learning more about underground alternatives, but stated that she supports opposing overhead transmission infrastructure. She requested that the Board consider bringing forward a resolution of opposition at a future meeting.

Jackson District

Supervisor Williams addressed comments made during the public comment period regarding family divisions and potential zoning changes. He stated that he strongly supports maintaining the current provisions allowing family divisions, noting that they are important for residents who have long lived in the County. However, he indicated that he may propose a policy change requiring individuals to reside on property for a period of time, such as five years, before utilizing a family division, explaining that the provision was intended to benefit established residents rather than new purchasers immediately subdividing property.

Supervisor Williams also emphasized the importance of respectful dialogue and civic engagement, noting that residents have the right to share their views and the Board has the responsibility to listen and consider those perspectives. He stated that the Board seeks to work with citizens to address concerns and make decisions in the best interest of Louisa County.

Supervisor Williams further commented on the County's continued progress, highlighting recent investments in broadband expansion, the school system, and other community improvements, and stated that while the Board may not always make perfect decisions, members strive to act in what they believe to be the best interest of County residents. He thanked citizens for their participation and engagement.

Patrick Henry District

Supervisor Barnes acknowledged the concerns expressed by residents and stated that he understands the emotions involved when citizens are working to protect their homes and property. He noted that Board members experience many of the same challenges as other residents, including rising costs and property assessments and utility bills.

Supervisor Barnes emphasized that while the Board will do what it can within its authority, other levels of government are also involved in the decision-making process. He encouraged residents to contact their state representatives and members of the General Assembly, as well as the State Corporation Commission, to share their concerns regarding the matter. He thanked citizens for attending and expressing their views.

Louisa District

Supervisor Woodward stated that he agreed with Supervisor Jones regarding the proposed ValleyLink transmission line, noting that he believes the Board should send a strong message in opposition to overhead transmission lines being constructed through Louisa County. He stated that if underground alternatives were proposed, the Board could consider those options, but expressed that overhead lines would not be suitable within the County.

Supervisor Woodward also commented on recent increases in electric utility bills, noting that he had received numerous calls, emails, and messages from residents expressing concern about rising costs. While acknowledging that colder winter temperatures contributed to higher bills, he stated that approved rate increases have also affected residents and emphasized that many citizens are experiencing financial strain.

Supervisor Woodward suggested that the County should consider communicating concerns to the State Corporation Commission regarding future utility rate increases, emphasizing the need for careful consideration of the impact on residents.

Cuckoo District

Supervisor McCotter thanked the Chairman for assistance with addressing concerns related to Kentucky Springs Road near the Lake Anna Technology Campus, noting that progress was made on the issue after the matter received attention. He stated that the Cuckoo District appreciates the efforts to help resolve the situation.

Mineral District

Chairman Adams commented on the proposed ValleyLink transmission line, noting that while Louisa County has historically had a positive relationship with Dominion Energy and the North Anna Power Station, appreciation for those partnerships does not require agreement with every project that may be proposed.

Chairman Adams stated that he understands the need for reliable power infrastructure but expressed concerns about the proposed routing of the transmission line through rural counties, including Louisa. He stated that he believes the project could have long-term impacts on the character of the County and expressed concern about how the route was selected.

Chairman Adams noted that while the Board does not have direct authority over the siting of the transmission line, it does have a responsibility to represent the interests and concerns of County residents and ensure their voices are heard by those responsible for making the final decision. He stated that he has had conversations with Dominion representatives and emphasized the importance of continued dialogue.

Chairman Adams expressed support for the Board adopting a strongly worded resolution opposing the proposed transmission line and encouraging Dominion and ValleyLink to explore alternative options, including underground routing or other potential routes. He also raised concerns about public notification, noting that some residents close to the proposed route reported not receiving notice while others located farther away had.

Chairman Adams concluded by stating that he believes the proposed project could significantly change the character of Louisa County, and that it is important for the Board to clearly communicate the concerns of the community.

Supervisor Jones made a motion that the Board oppose the proposed ValleyLink Joshua Falls transmission line through Louisa County and that a resolution reflecting the Board's opposition be presented at the next Board meeting. Woodward seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS, BOARDS AND STANDING COMMITTEES

Committee Reports

Board Appointments

On the motion of Supervisor Williams, seconded by Supervisor Barnes, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to make the following appointments/reappointments:

1. To appoint Ms. Linda Cullins to represent one of the Mineral District seats of the Commission on Aging.

County Administrator's Report

Administrator Goodwin provided his report to the Board. He noted that the Comprehensive Plan survey had recently closed and received nearly 2,200 responses, which exceeded participation levels from the previous Comprehensive Plan survey. He stated that staff will compile the results and present a report of the findings at the next Board meeting.

Administrator Goodwin also reported that staff is monitoring legislative activity in the Virginia General Assembly, noting that a number of proposals related to energy, housing, land use, taxation, and other issues affecting local governments are currently under consideration. He encouraged Board members to remain in communication with the County's legislative representatives regarding these matters.

Administrator Goodwin provided an update on the new turf fields, stating that staff is working to finalize the project and expects to have additional information on opening dates soon.

He also reminded residents of upcoming budget town hall meetings, scheduled for March 24, March 31, and April 1 from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m., to be held at Jouett Elementary School, Louisa County Middle School, and Trevilians Elementary School, respectively. He stated that the meetings will include a short presentation followed by opportunities for public questions and discussion.

Finally, Administrator Goodwin announced several upcoming community events, including the Easter Extravaganza at the Louisa County Fairgrounds on March 28 and Household Hazardous Waste Day scheduled for April 25, and encouraged residents to participate. He concluded his remarks and offered to answer any questions from the Board.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

Public Hearing – Dominion State of the Station Address

Mr. Andre May, External Affairs Representative for Dominion Energy, introduced the annual State of the Station Address for North Anna Power Station. Mr. May stated that the presentation would be delivered by Mr. Jim Jenkins, Site Vice President of North Anna Power Station.

Mr. Jim Jenkins, Site Vice President, addressed the Board and provided an overview of the station's performance and operations. Mr. Jenkins noted that North Anna continues to maintain industry-leading performance, generating safe, reliable, low-cost, carbon-free electricity and supplying more than 15 percent of Virginia's electricity.

Mr. Jenkins reported that Units 1 and 2 achieved a combined capacity factor of 90.48 percent in 2025, exceeding the station's performance goal. He explained that scheduled refueling outages occurred for both units during the year, including a 41-day refueling outage and maintenance outage for Unit 1 and a 34-day refueling outage for Unit 2. The station produced enough electricity in 2025 to supply approximately 475,000 homes for the majority of the year.

Mr. Jenkins stated that safety remains the station's highest priority. He reported that there were no declared emergencies in 2025, and a Nuclear Regulatory Commission emergency preparedness inspection resulted in no findings. The station retained the Institute of Nuclear Power Operations' highest rating and remained in the licensee response category of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission's Action Matrix, the most favorable classification.

Mr. Jenkins also provided an overview of workplace safety performance, reporting two OSHA-recordable injuries and nine first-aid events during the year. He noted that North Anna remains a Virginia Occupational Safety and Health Voluntary Protection Program Star Worksite, recognizing the station's commitment to safety and health management.

Regarding environmental monitoring, Mr. Jenkins reported that no required reportable environmental events occurred in 2025. He noted that elevated tritium levels were detected in several monitoring wells on station property in July 2025, and that the source was identified and repaired. He stated that monitoring confirmed the issue remained localized within the protected area and posed no threat to employees, the public, groundwater, or Lake Anna.

Mr. Jenkins also discussed the station's ongoing management of spent nuclear fuel, noting that fuel continues to be transferred to the station's independent spent fuel storage installation and

thanking the County for approving the renewal of the facility's permit for an additional seven years.

Mr. Jenkins highlighted the station's economic impact, stating that Dominion Energy paid approximately \$12 million in property taxes to Louisa County in 2025, with total company tax contributions of approximately \$13.5 million. He also reported that the station employs approximately 800 full-time employees, with additional contractors and supplemental personnel supporting operations during refueling outages.

Mr. Jenkins also discussed community and environmental initiatives related to Lake Anna, including monitoring for harmful algae blooms, water quality testing, and vegetation management. He reported that no confirmed harmful algae blooms occurred in 2025 and noted that 178 Lake Anna permits were issued in Louisa County during the year.

Mr. Jenkins highlighted community involvement by station employees, reporting that employees logged more than 5,100 volunteer hours in 2025 and contributed more than \$74,000 in direct donations to local organizations.

Mr. Jenkins concluded by discussing future energy planning, noting that Units 1 and 2 are licensed to operate through 2058 and 2060, respectively. He stated that Dominion Energy continues to evaluate the potential construction of Unit 3 and is also studying the possible deployment of small modular reactors (SMRs) at the North Anna site.

Mr. Jenkins thanked the Board for the opportunity to present the update.

Chairman Adams thanked Mr. Jenkins and Dominion Energy for their continued partnership and contributions to Louisa County.

The Chairman then opened the public hearing for comments related to the State of the Station Address. No speakers came forward, and the public hearing was closed.

A motion was made and seconded to accept the State of the Station report, which was approved unanimously by the Board.

Public Hearing – Louisa County Sanitary Landfill Environmental Permit

Administrator Goodwin explained that the public hearing covered two related items associated with the County landfill permitting process through the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ).

The first item involved a temporary increase in the County's permitted daily waste limit from 75 tons per day to 300 tons per day. Administrator Goodwin stated that this increase had previously been anticipated as part of the permitting for the County's existing landfill cells due to population growth and increasing waste volumes. He noted that the County has recently been trending slightly above the current 75-ton daily average and that the increase would allow additional operational flexibility and future growth.

Administrator Goodwin explained that the increase above the current permitted limit had been self-reported to DEQ through the County's routine reporting process, and that the temporary adjustment was being coordinated with DEQ as part of the permitting process.

The second item involved permitting for Landfill Cells 4A and 4B. Administrator Goodwin explained that solid waste permits include two phases:

- Part A – Site suitability, which has already been approved, and
- Part B – Construction and monitoring plans, which have been resubmitted following DEQ comments.

He noted that the new landfill cells would add approximately 3.8 million cubic yards of capacity, extending the County's landfill operational life from an estimated 2031–2032 timeframe to approximately 2049 based on current projections.

Administrator Goodwin stated that the public hearing was part of the state-required permitting process, and that the public comment period began February 12 and will remain open through March 14. Comments could be provided during the hearing or submitted in writing to the County.

Administrator Goodwin noted that County staff and representatives from the County's engineering consultant, LaBella Associates, were present to answer any technical questions related to the landfill engineering and permitting process.

Chairman Adams opened the public hearing. No members of the public came forward to speak. Chairman Adams closed the public hearing.

Administrator Goodwin noted that no Board action was required at this time, as the hearing was conducted solely to satisfy the public participation requirement of the permitting process.

ADJOURNMENT

On the motion Supervisor Barnes, seconded by Supervisor Williams, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to adjourn the March 2, 2026, meeting at 7:50 p.m.

RE: A Resolution to Approve and Award a Contract for Audit Services

I. Background:

a. Project Description

The County of Louisa is soliciting proposals from qualified firms to obtain the services of qualified certified public accountants/auditors to perform a financial and compliance audit for the County of Louisa. This includes the governmental activities, the aggregate discretely, presented component units, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information. A separate contract will be awarded for both the Student Activity Fund and Water Authority audits.

b. Need

The County of Louisa is seeking proposals from qualified firms to provide audit services, per regulatory requirements.

c. Project Budget

Funds for such services are included in the Finance Budget under GL# 4-100-12430-3120.

d. Request for Proposals

On December 10, 2025, the County issued a Request for Proposals inviting qualified auditing firms to submit proposals for Audit Services. The County of Louisa reserves the right to award to more than one Offeror. Louisa County will select the firm(s) who they determine most closely satisfies the needs of the County.

There is no requirement for acceptance of the lowest cost of service offered, and specific requirements may be waived or amended at the discretion of the County.

- e. The Selection Committee consisted of Wanda Colvin, Finance Director, Faye Stewart, Senior Accounting Manager, Sam Massie, Purchasing Coordinator, David Baker, LCPS Finance Director and Victoria McCormick, Senior Accounting Technician.

II. Current Situation:

a. Proposals/Bids

Three (3) proposals were received by the closing date of January 27, 2026. Proposals were received from the following auditing firms:

- Brown, Edwards and Company LLP
- Robinson, Farmer, Cox Associates
- UHY LLP

b. Short Listed Firms/Bid Tabulation

Interviews were conducted with all proposed firms on February 13, 2026 and February 19, 2026.

c. Selected Firm

After interviews and negotiation, the selection committee determined that Robinson, Farmer, Cox Associates is a qualified firm, and will meet the needs of the County.

d. Justification

Robinson, Farmer, Cox Associates has been under contract for these services for the past eighteen (18) years. The firm has met the needs of the County and is very familiar with Louisa County. In addition, Robinson, Farmer, Cox Associates has the most experience with Virginia county government, meets APA requirements on a yearly basis instead of every three, and has a reasonable cost for the services.

Brown, Edwards and Company LLP is a firm that is large enough to meet the County's needs, but their proposal did not include the Cost Allocation Plan.

UHY LLP has much less experience with auditing Virginia governments.

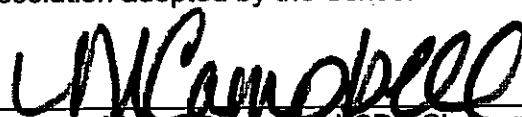

**A RESOLUTION STRONGLY OPPOSING THE PROPOSED VALLEY LINK
TRANSMISSION PROJECT IN LOUISA COUNTY**

WHEREAS, Valley Link, a joint venture of Dominion Energy, FirstEnergy Transmission, and Transource Energy, has proposed the "Joshua Falls to Yeat" project, a 115-mile, 765-kilovolt (kV) high-voltage transmission line spanning numerous counties in Central Virginia; and

WHEREAS, currently proposed routes for the project include approximately 20 miles of new transmission corridor through Louisa County, utilizing steel lattice structures approaching 160 feet in height and requiring significant and permanently cleared right-of-way; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors finds that an overhead 765kV line would cause significant and irreparable harm to Louisa County's rural character, agricultural heritage, and forestlands, would pass within 500 feet of numerous homes, and would decrease property values for hundreds of residents; and

WHEREAS, the project is intended to transmit bulk power for increasing demand in areas outside of Louisa County, and will provide no direct benefit to the residents or businesses of Louisa County who would bear the burden of its presence; and

WHEREAS, the Agricultural, Forestal, and Rural Preservation Committee recommends that the Board formally oppose the proposed route as currently presented and further recommend that the

Board request that the State Corporation Commission require utilities to evaluate alternatives that minimize impacts to working agricultural and forestry land, including routing alongside existing infrastructure corridors where feasible.

WHEREAS, the citizens of Louisa County have expressed overwhelming opposition to the overhead construction of this line due to its environmental, aesthetic, and health impacts.

**AGRICULTURAL, FORESTAL, AND RURAL PRESERVATION COMMITTEE
STATEMENT TO THE LOUISA COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS ON THE
PROPOSED VALLEY LINK 765-KV TRANSMISSION LINE**

The Agricultural, Forestal, and Rural Preservation Committee recognizes the importance of a reliable electric grid and the role transmission infrastructure plays in supporting it. Our concern is not with reliability, but with the proposed routing of a 765-kV overhead transmission line through actively managed agricultural and forestry land in Louisa County.

Much of the land along the proposed route has been described as “undeveloped.” The Committee believes this characterization is inaccurate. Land used for crops, cattle, forage production, timber, and pulpwood is not undeveloped—it is working land that has been intentionally managed and invested in over long time horizons. These lands support farming and forestry operations, contribute to the local tax base, and are central to the rural character of Louisa County.

A 765-kV overhead transmission line is large-scale, permanent industrial infrastructure. When placed across working farms and forests, it can fragment agricultural and forest lands, disrupt operations, and alter the long-term character of the rural landscape.

Because the Board of Supervisors has consistently emphasized the importance of preserving Louisa County’s rural character, the Committee recommends that the Board formally oppose the proposed route as currently presented. We further recommend that the Board request that the State Corporation Commission require utilities to evaluate alternatives that minimize impacts to working agricultural and forestry land, including routing alongside existing infrastructure corridors where feasible.

Agricultural and forestry lands should not be labeled “undeveloped” simply because they remain open. They are productive working landscapes and are foundational to the rural character and economic vitality of Louisa County.

BYLAWS

A. Name

The name of this group shall be the Louisa County Tourism Advisory Committee, hereinafter referred to as the TAC.

B. Purpose and Intent

I. The purpose of the TAC is:

- (1) To serve in an advisory capacity for ~~the Director of Parks, Recreation & Tourism, the County Administrator, and~~ the Board of Supervisors.
- (2) To make recommendations on matters pertaining to tourism marketing initiatives, tourism projects, and long-range plans for the tourism industry in Louisa County.
- (3) To investigate, research, and report on the feasibility of adoption or implementation of ideas and initiatives to further the County's tourism efforts and increase tax revenues and visitation numbers.

II. Mission Statement: The mission of the TAC is to inform and engage all tourism sectors and the community, creating a unified, dynamic consortium that increases tourism in Louisa County for the benefit of the entire community.

III. The TAC shall serve as an advisory board, not a policy board; therefore, it can make recommendations but not set policy.

C. Membership

I. The TAC shall consist of at least ten (10) but no more than thirteen (13) members, representing different stakeholders in the tourism industry in Louisa County and be appointed by the Board of Supervisors. ~~for two (2) year terms. Members may be reappointed for additional two (2) year terms by the Board of Supervisors.~~

II. In order to promote continuity and institutional knowledge, member terms shall be staggered. For the purpose of establishing and preserving staggered terms, the Board of Supervisors may designate appointments to serve one (1) year terms or two (2) years.

~~III.~~ Members are expected to attend and actively participate in all regularly scheduled meetings. Any member who accumulates two (2) unexcused absences within a calendar year may be subject to review and possible removal by the Board of Supervisors. The Chair shall notify staff of attendance concerns when appropriate.

~~IV.~~ Members shall serve without compensation.

V. The Board of Supervisors may remove any member of the TAC for any reason. Page 65 of 170

III.VI. For purposes of determining a quorum, a member who has disclosed a conflict of interest shall still be considered present; however, the member shall not be counted as voting on the affected matter.

D. Ex Officio Members

I. The following may serve as ex officio, non-voting members of the TAC:

- (1) Board Supervisors
- (2) Staff or elected representatives from each incorporated Town within Louisa County
- (3) County tourism staff

II. A majority of the currently appointed voting members of the TAC shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Only voting members present at a meeting at which a quorum has been established may vote on matters before the TAC. Ex officio members shall not be counted toward a quorum and shall not vote.

D.E. _____ Officers of the Committee

I. Officers of the TAC shall consist of a Chair and, Vice-Chair, ~~and Secretary~~.

II. The Chair and Vice-Chair shall be elected by the TAC at the first meeting of the year and shall serve a one (1) year term by majority vote of the TAC members. No member may serve more than two (2) consecutive terms in the same office.

- III. The Chair shall preside at meetings of the TAC and perform such other duties as are incident to the office or are properly required by the TAC.
- IV. The Vice-Chair shall, in the absence of the Chair, perform the duties of the Chair and other duties as assigned by the TAC.

~~V. The Director of Parks, Recreation and Tourism or designee shall serve as the Secretary and be responsible for: maintaining all TAC records; taking meeting minutes; and notification of TAC meetings.~~

~~VI.~~V. If a vacancy occurs in the position of Chair, the Vice-Chair will fill the unexpired term of the Chair.

~~VII.~~VI. If a vacancy occurs in the position of Vice-Chair, the position shall be filled by majority vote of the TAC at its first meeting following the creation of such vacancy.

~~I. Regular meetings shall be held quarterly at the discretion of the Chairman.~~

~~III. The quorum for all TAC meetings shall be a simple majority of its appointed members.~~

II. A formal vote will be required for all matters pertaining to budget or financial decisions.

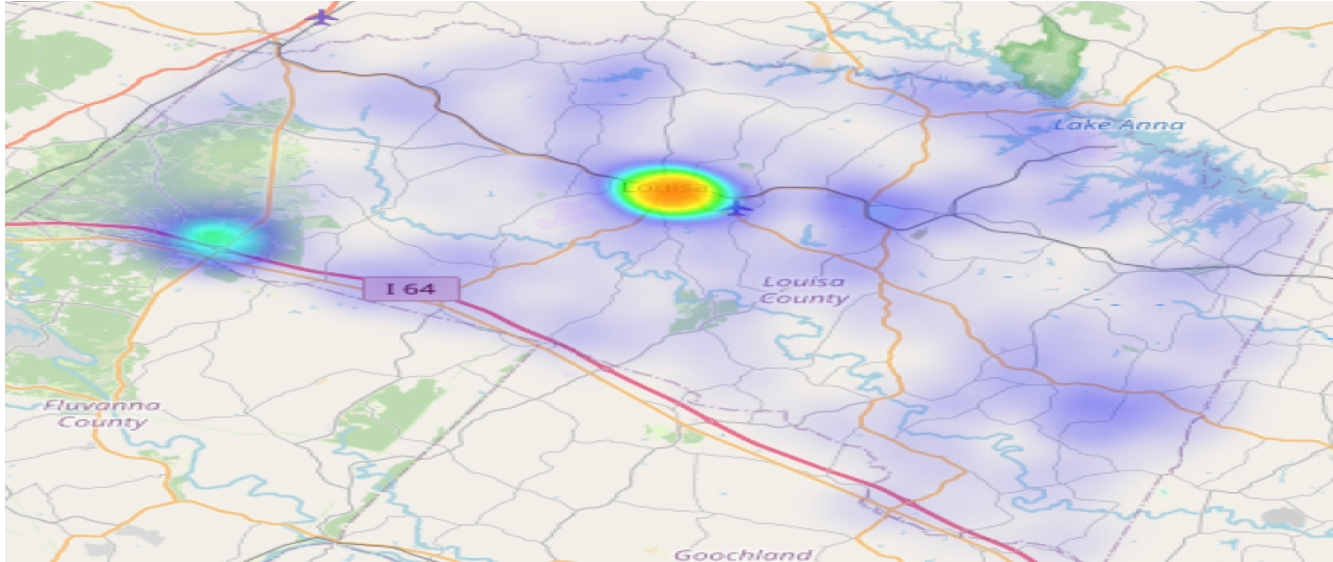

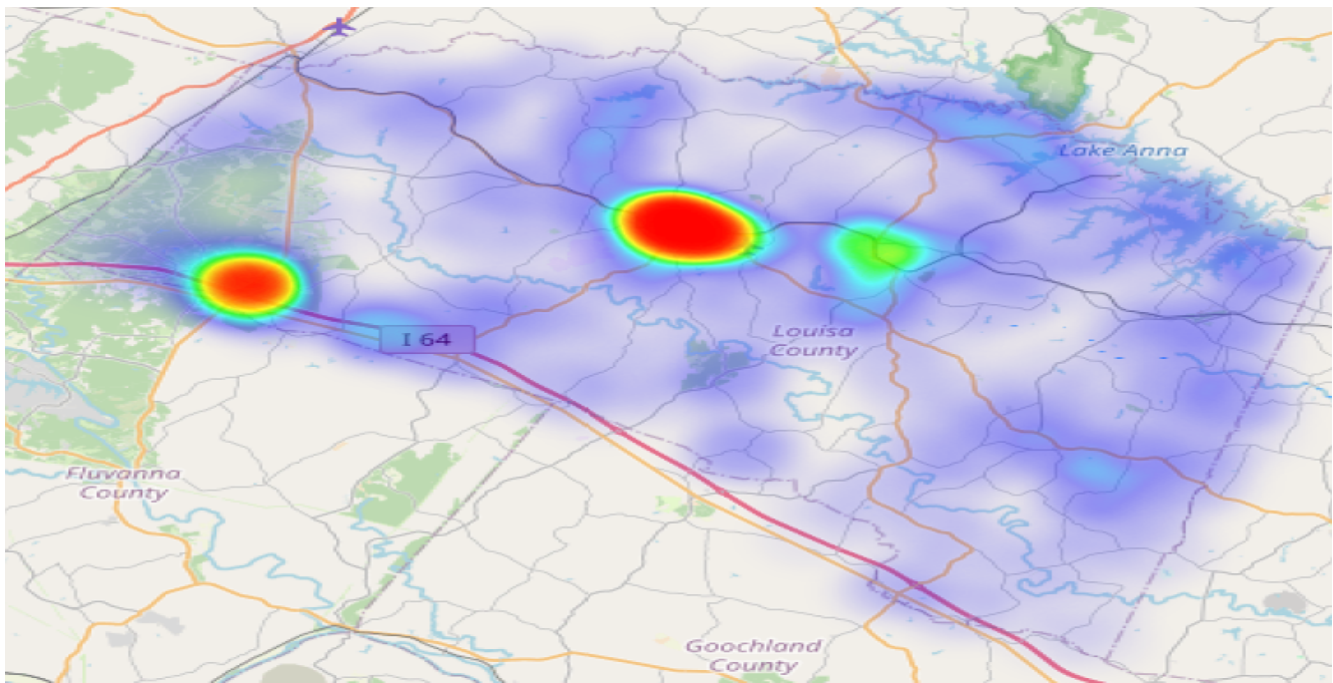

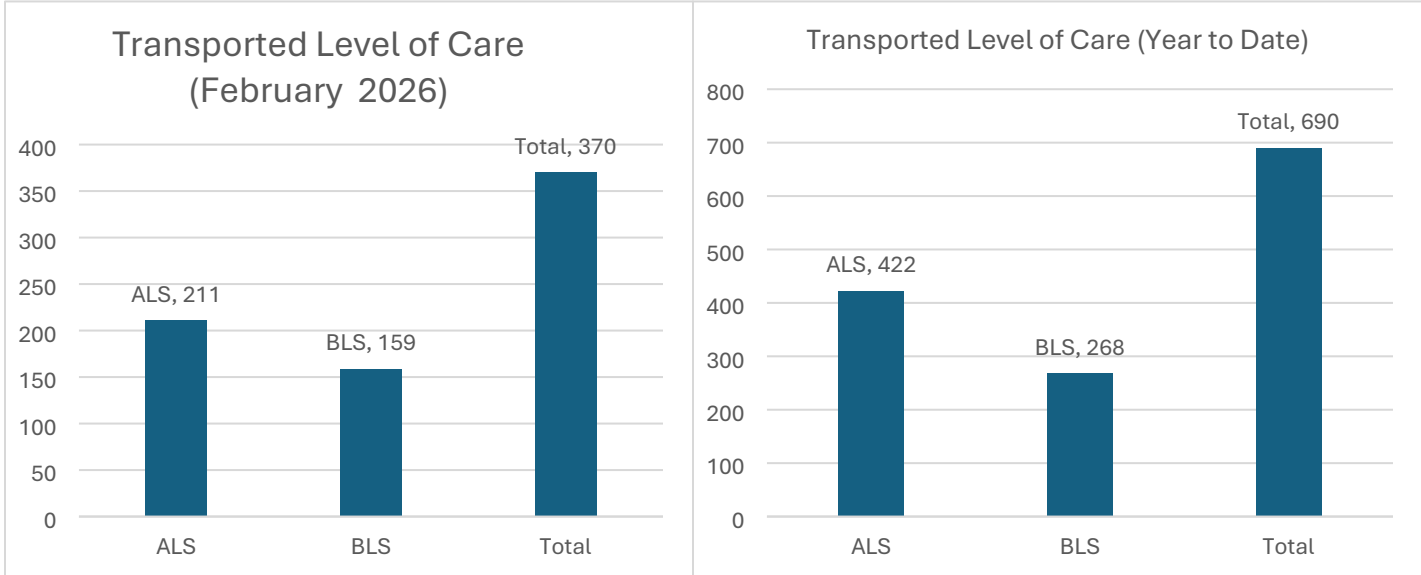


February 2026 Heat Map of Incidents

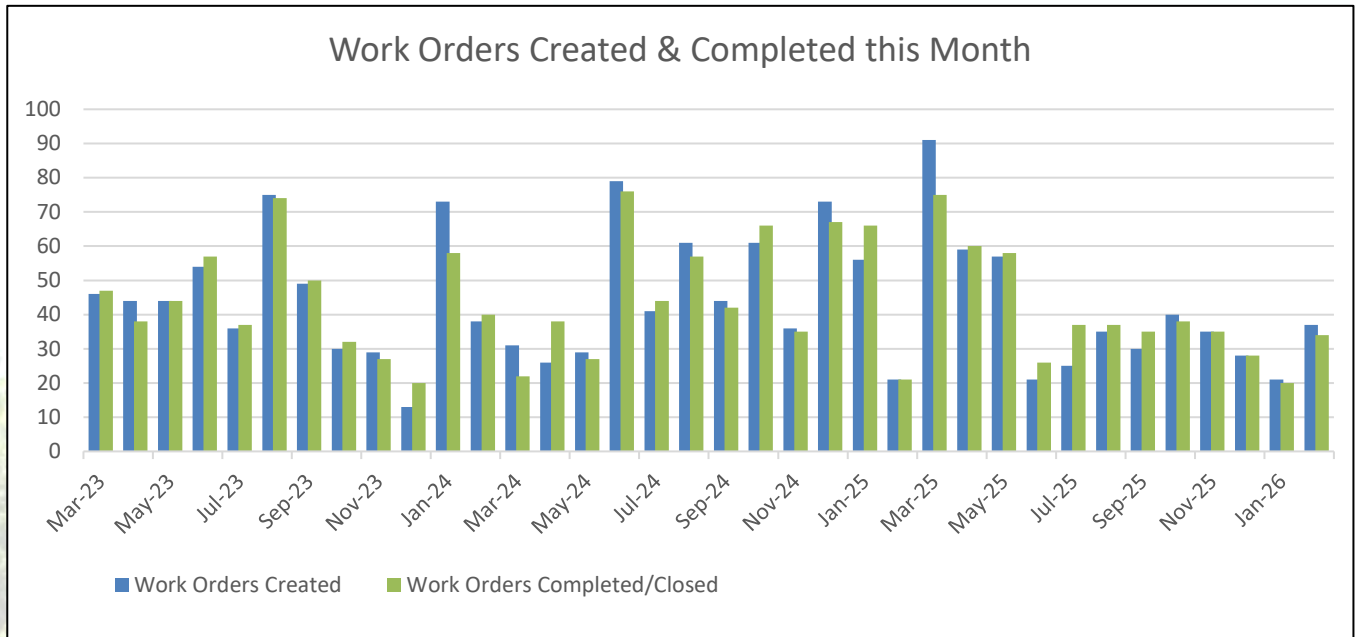

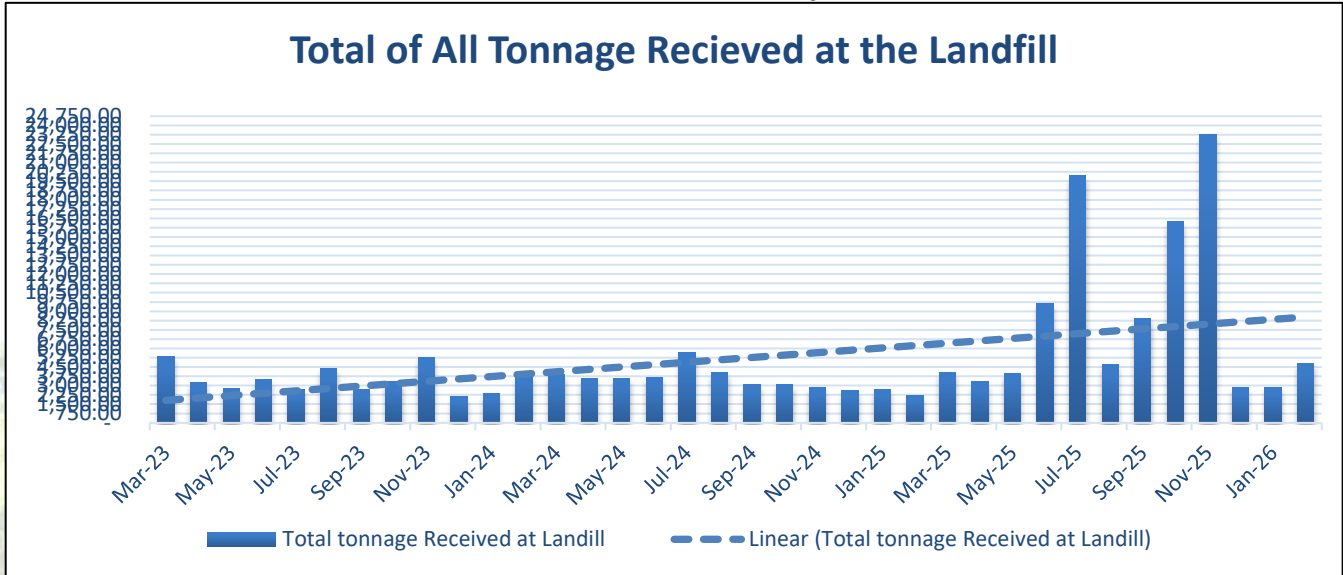

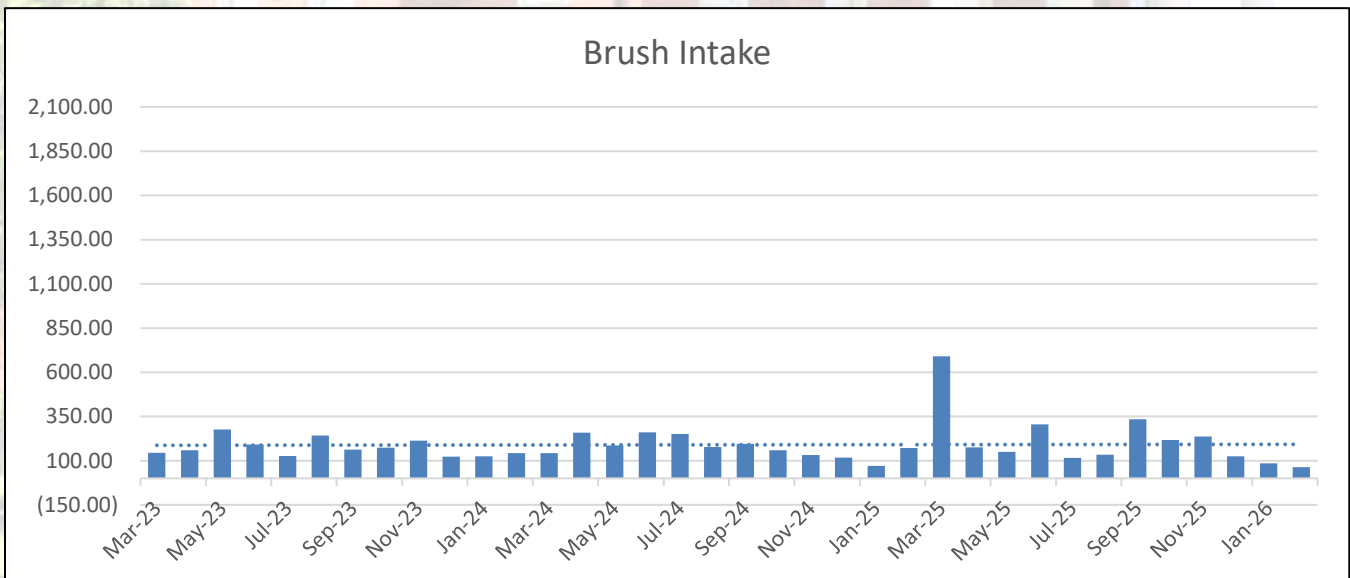

The Landfill received 64.32 tons of brush last month. The chart below shows the tonnage of brush received at the landfill each month over the last three years.

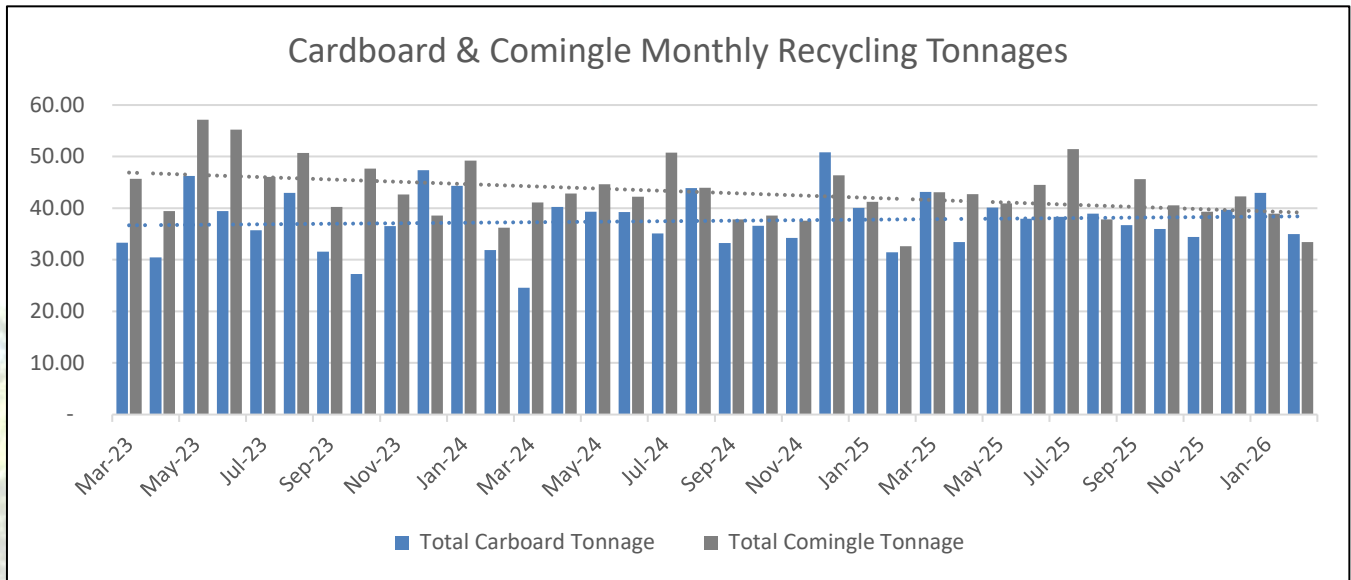

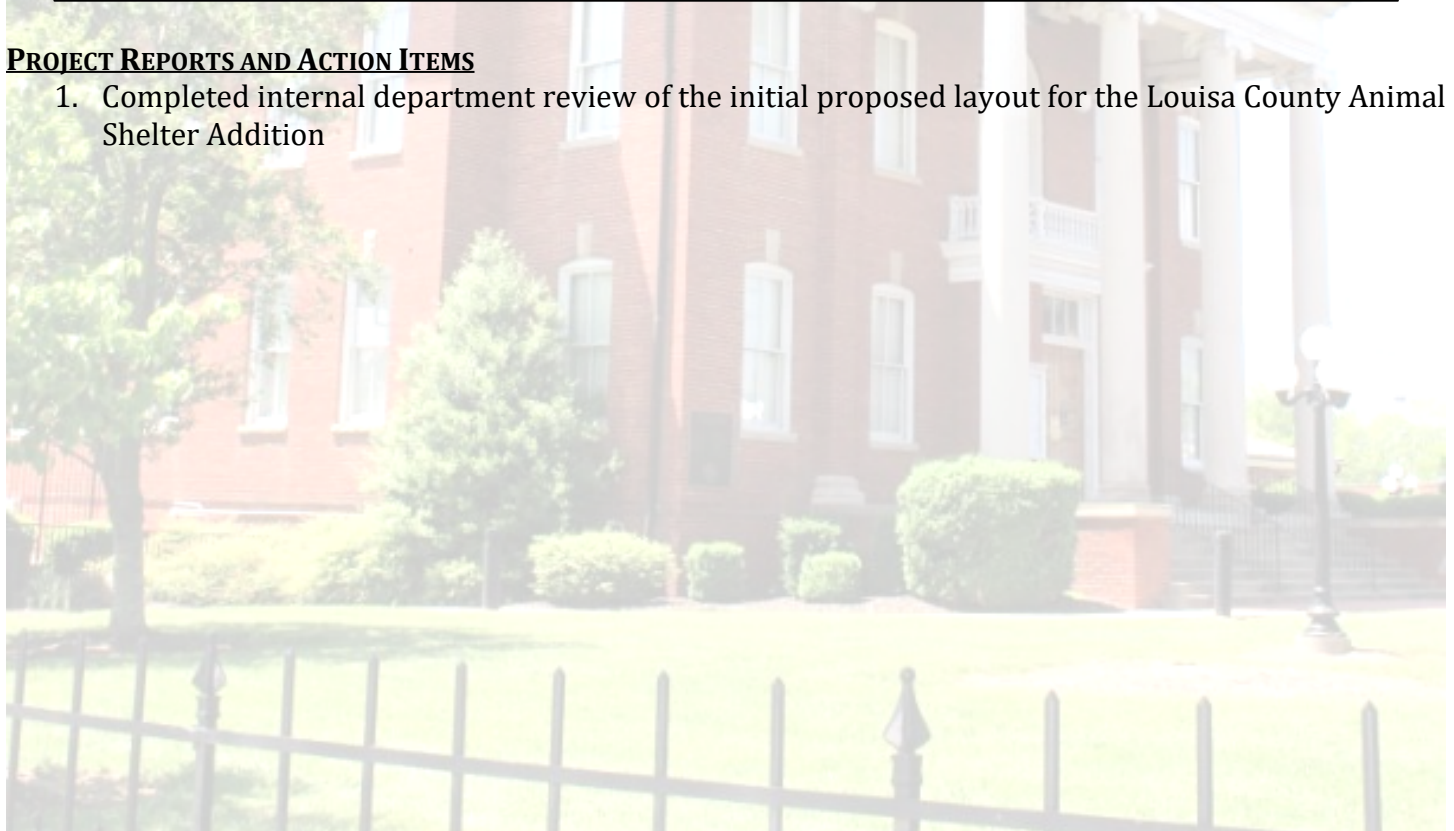

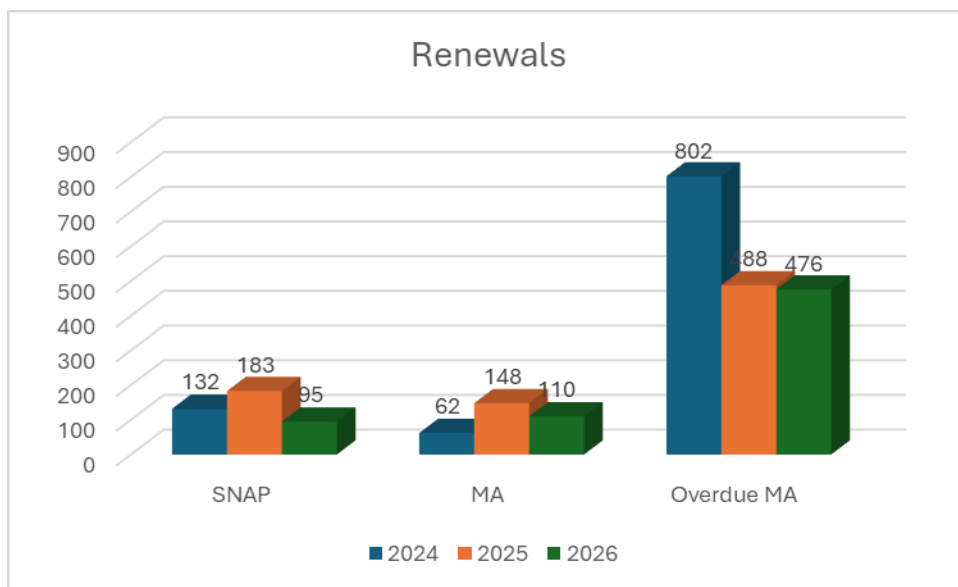


The high volume of calls to the local agency continues. The auto-attendant process is still a work in progress we hope to complete in the next month. Foot traffic was consistent with what had been experienced in prior years, which averaged just over 36 visitors to the local agency daily. The energy assistance program for the Crisis program will continue until March 15th, 2026 and may be responsible for a percentage of the visitors to the agency. There was one observed holiday in the month of February: President’s Day (Monday).

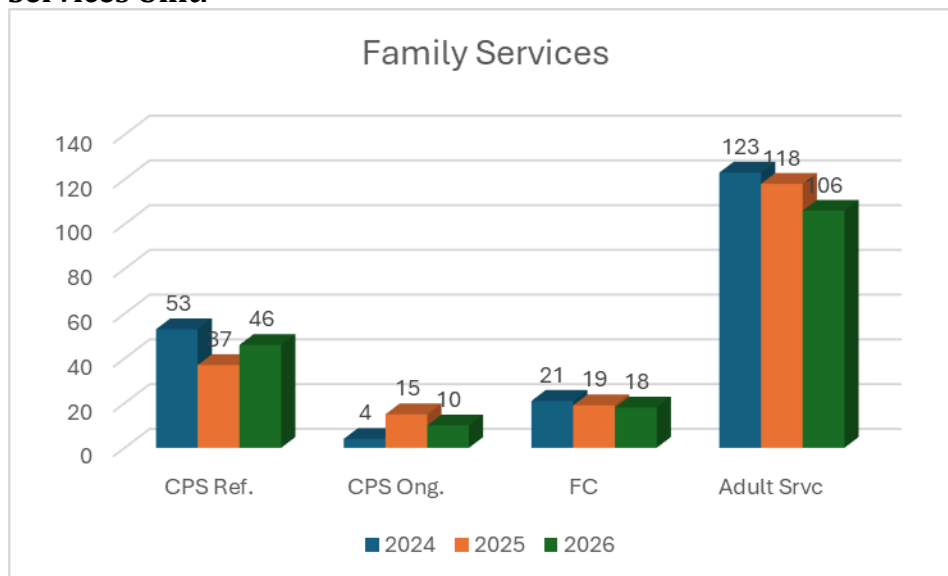




The local agency has made significant improvements in the overdue Medicaid renewals over the past three years. With support from the Board, we are stabilizing the local workforce and have hired two additional workers to further manage caseloads. The Ongoing benefits unit is fully staffed. One of the new hires is an experienced benefits worker and should be able to handle an ongoing caseload with minimal supervision. With assistance from the State, other LDSS staff, and contract workers, we anticipate the numbers will continue to decline and lessen our need for outside assistance to manage caseloads.

FOSTER CARE SUMMARY:

One youth transitioned to Fostering Futures this month. Several youth will be discharging from care in March due to aging out, successful reunifications and transfer of custody to relatives. However, there are multiple In-Home and CPS cases that are high risk for immediate foster care due to lack of family and parents lack of follow-through with safety plans. We are currently seeking relatives for kinship placement options should we need to pursue removals.

As of February 2026, there are 18 youths in foster care. Six (6) youth have been in care for less than 12 months, two (2) youth have been in care for more than 12 months, but less than 24 months and five (5) youth have been in care for more than 24 months. Each of these youth has had a face-to-face visit as required by State and foster care policy.

Two (2) of these youth reside in a relative foster home, seven (7) youth are in congregate care, one (1) youth is in a non-relative foster home placement, and five (5) youth are in the Fostering Futures program. Two (2) youth are on a trial home placement. One (1) youth under 18 is in an Independent Living placement.

FOSTER PARENT RECRUITMENT/TRAINING UPDATE:

Two families have dropped out of the approval process due to the training and approval requirements. The curriculum for training foster parents has recently changed and families are complaining about the amount of time they spend in training and the required “homework” in between training sessions. One new family is currently in the approval process, and one new family has recently reached out to us.

To encourage tourism spending, we follow tourism marketing trends and use data including [Virginia Tourism Corporation \(VTC\) travel reports](#), collected meal tax, and collected occupancy tax to make campaign decisions. We use story telling techniques to create a more holistic picture of Louisa’s offerings, impart the feeling of “escape” from the hustle and bustle, and develop motivation to visit multiple areas of the County. We pursue grant opportunities often and look for opportunities to partner with others. Please note for advertising efforts that it takes an average of an ad being seen seven to 10 times before it is memorable.

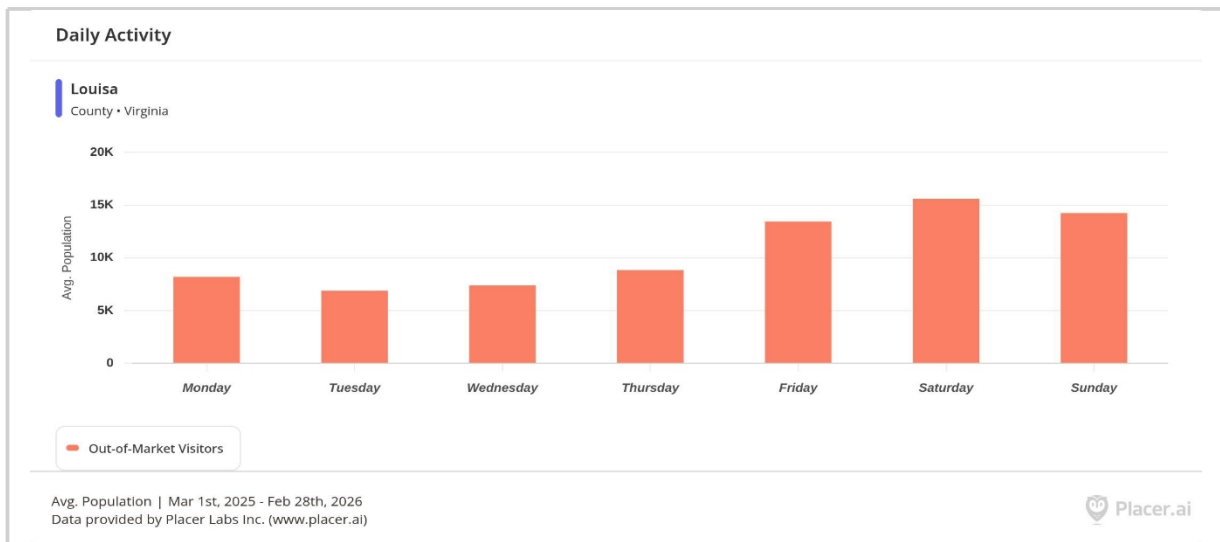

Background/History:

Louisa County Water Authority (LCWA) was created in 1968 by the Louisa County Board of Supervisors to engage in water and wastewater treatment in the County. The County has provided financial assistance as necessary since the Authority’s inception as LCWA works to build a sufficient user and revenue base.

LCWA is comprised of several separate subsystems:

- The Northeast Creek Water Treatment Plant produces water for the Towns of Louisa and Mineral as well as surrounding areas, and utilizes conventional treatment followed by Nanofiltration. This plant uses raw water from the Northeast Creek Reservoir; treated water is delivered via a distribution system which connects end users outside of the Towns as well as Town-managed distribution systems within the Towns.
- The Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant, which is owned by the Town of Louisa and the County and serves the same areas as the Northeast Creek Plant above. LCWA operates this system under contract.
- The Zion Crossroads water system consists of eight (8) potable production wells, and thirteen (13) monitoring wells and serves the Zion Crossroads/Fernclyff areas through a distribution system.
- The Zion Crossroads Wastewater Treatment Plant and collection system serves the same area as the Zion Crossroads Water System above.
- The Bowlers Mill raw water system is owned by the County and operated by LCWA to provide raw water to Old Dominion Electric Cooperative.
- The New Bridge System at Lake Anna provides water and wastewater services to the development area near Lake Anna on Rt. 208.

I am pleased to inform you that the above-named property is now officially listed in the National Register of Historic Places. The National Park Service (NPS), a division of the U.S. Department of Interior, officially added this property to the National Register on **January 16, 2026**. National Register listing is an honorary designation that recognizes our nation's historic places that are significant, including individual buildings, sites, structures, objects, and historic districts. Additionally, the property was listed in the Virginia Landmarks Register by the Virginia Board of Historic Resources at their meeting on **September 18, 2025**.

I also want to let you know about DHR services and programs that may interest you. To begin, please know that should you have any questions or plans pertaining to historic properties in your jurisdiction, DHR is happy to offer consultation, especially regarding actions that might impact the historic integrity of buildings and structures or belowground archaeological resources. We encourage everyone to learn more about best stewardship practices and our staff stands ready to assist in that capacity.

As the chief elected official in your community, you also may want to know more about DHR's Certified Local Government (CLG) program, which gives local governments a way to participate more formally in the state and national historic preservation programs. Participation in the CLG program entitles your community to access technical assistance from DHR and the National Park Service, to apply for grants for preservation projects, to obtain annual staff training, and to educate your constituents about their community's unique history. Detailed information about the CLG program is available at <http://dhr.virginia.gov/clg/clg.htm>.

Also, you may wish to learn more about Virginia's Rehabilitation Tax Credit (RTC) program, which is administered by DHR. The economic impact of the rehabilitation tax credit program can be important to local economies by stimulating investment in and redevelopment of historic properties, improving real estate, and creating local jobs. Virginia provides a 25 percent tax credit on eligible expenses to property owners who rehabilitate their Register-listed properties according to preservation standards. Moreover, if a National Register-listed historic property is used for income-producing purposes, it may also qualify for a federal RTC offering a 20 percent tax credit on qualified rehabilitation expenses. These credits may be utilized over a number of years. Projects using either state or federal RTCs must comply with *The Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation*. Please contact DHR if you would like to obtain more information about how your community can promote use of the RTC program, or visit our website at http://dhr.virginia.gov/tax_credits/tax_credit.htm.

Dear Mr. Turille,

This notice is to advise that you appear to be operating a waterworks in violation of the Public Water Supplies Law, Title 32.1, Chapter 6, Article 2 of the Code of Virginia, and Section 12VAC5-590-384 B 1 a of the Virginia *Waterworks Regulations* (“Regulations”) for exceeding the locational running annual average (LRAA) for HAA5s under the Stage 2 Rule.

The LRAA for the HAA5s concentration was 0.067 mg/L for the scheduled samples collected during the 1st Quarter of 2026, from DBP05- Department of Forestry. The Primary Maximum Contaminant Level (PMCL) for HAA5 is 0.060 mg/L. The Regulations characterize this alleged violation as a Tier 2 violation.

Section 12VAC5-590-384 B 1 a states, “The owner of a waterworks required to monitor quarterly shall calculate the LRAAs for TTHM and HAA5 using monitoring results collected under 12VAC5-590-374 F and determine that each LRAA does not exceed the PMCL in order to comply with the PMCLs listed in Table 340.6. If the owner fails to complete four consecutive quarters of monitoring, then the owner shall calculate compliance with the PMCL based on the average of the available data from the most recent four quarters. If the owner collects more than one sample per quarter at a monitoring location, then the owner shall average all samples collected in the quarter at that location to determine a quarterly average to be used in the LRAA calculation.”

The samples collected from DBP05- Department of Forestry are shown in the table below. The 3rd quarter samples for 2025 had high results, which resulted in an increase in LRAA for HAA5s and exceedance of the PMCL.

Required Actions

In accordance with Section 12VAC5-590-540 of the Regulations, a Tier 2 violation requires you issue a Tier 2 Public Notice (“Notice”) to the consumers in the area served in accordance to the public notification requirements described below:

Public Notice: The Tier 2 Notice requires you to notify consumers in the area served **within 30 days** of learning of the violation. This Notice must be handled as follows:

- **You must provide a Notice to consumers no later than April 9, 2026;** (i.e., 30 days from date of letter or 30 days from when owner was apprised of the violation, whichever comes first.)
- Your Notice to consumers must be mailed or directly delivered to each customer receiving a bill, and to other service connections served by your waterworks.
- If your waterworks serves consumers who do not pay water bills, or who do not have service connection addresses (apartment dwellers, university students, or nursing home patients, for example) you must also use other delivery methods to provide notice to these consumers as well. Examples of other methods include (but are not limited to) notice publication in local newspapers, delivery of multiple copies to apartment buildings, or posting the Notice in public places served by the system.
- Until the violation is resolved, you must give a copy of the Notice to all new billing units or new customers, before or at the time service begins.
- You must repeat distribution of the Notice every three months, for as long as the violation persists.

Draft Notice: Attached is a draft Tier 2 Notice for you to distribute as directed above. You may use this Notice as is, or modify it to better meet your situation, as long as the information is accurate and it contains all of the required elements and mandated language. If you decide to change the Notice, we suggest that you contact this Office to verify that your proposed changes meet the requirements of the Regulations. Please insert the name, address, and phone number of a waterworks representative in the spaces provided on the draft Notice.

Public Notice Confirmation: Within ten (10) days of completing the public notification, but no later than **April 19, 2026**, you must provide this Office with a copy of the Notice that you distributed, along with a signed certification that the distribution was completed in the required time and manner. Failure to distribute the Notice and submit a signed certification form to this Office may be a further violation of the Regulations. A certification form is enclosed for your use.

Follow-Up Actions: The waterworks will continue to sample and monitor for DBPs, including HAA5, on a quarterly basis.

Requesting an Administrative Proceeding: If you disagree with the allegations in this notice or wish to obtain a determination as to whether a violation has occurred, you may request an informal conference in accordance with Va. Code § 2.2-4019 and 12VAC5-590-115 of the Regulations. To request an informal conference, please contact the ODW Director of Compliance, Enforcement and Policy by telephone or email at 804-629-0989 or Grant.Kronenberg@vdh.virginia.gov.

Enforcement Authority: Failure to take all the necessary corrective actions in a timely manner to voluntarily return your waterworks to compliance may result in enforcement action. Enforcement actions include permit revocation, administrative orders, and civil or criminal proceedings, and civil charges or penalties of up to \$5,000 per day for each violation. Va. Code §§ 32.1-26, 32.1-27, 32.1-175.01 and 32.1-176.

LRAA PMCL Exceedance for Disinfection Byproducts - HAA5s under Stage 2 Rule

Our water system recently violated a drinking water standard. Although this incident was not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened and what we did (are doing) to correct this situation.

We routinely monitor for the presence of drinking water contaminants. Testing results from the 1st Quarter of 2026 show that our system exceeds the standard, or maximum contaminant level (MCL), for HAA5. The standard for HAA5 is 0.060 mg/L. It is determined by averaging all the samples collected at each sampling location for the past 12 months. The level of HAA5 averaged at one of our system's locations for the 1st Quarter of 2026 was 0.067 mg/L.

What should I do?

- There is nothing you need to do. You do not need to boil your water or take other corrective actions. If a situation arises where the water is no longer safe to drink, you will be notified within 24 hours.
- If you have a severely compromised immune system, have an infant, are pregnant, or are elderly, you may be at increased risk and should seek advice from your health care providers about drinking this water.

What does this mean?

This is not an emergency. If it had been, you would have been notified within 24 hours.

HAA5s are five haloacetic acid compounds which form when disinfectants react with natural organic matter in the water.

People who drink water containing haloacetic acids in excess of the PMCL over many years may have an increased risk of getting cancer.*

What is being done?

We will continue to monitor HAA5 levels during quarterly routine sampling.

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 86 PROPOSED ADDITION TO TAYLORS

Location

The proposed district addition is located on or at the end of near Trice Road (Route 776), which is south and southeast of Paynes Mill Road (Route 601) and southeast of Jackson Road (Route 658). The proposed district addition is located northeast, approximately 0.34 miles from the core portion of the existing Taylors Creek Agricultural and Forestal District. The properties are further identified as tax map parcels, 91-20-2, 91-20-3, 91-20-4, 91-33, 91-34, 91-34A, and 91-96 located in the Jackson Voting District.

Zoning

The parcels proposed to be included in the Taylors Creek Agricultural and Forestal District are zoned Agricultural (A-2). In summary, the stated purpose for this zoning district is to allow for the compatible mixture of agricultural uses and limited residential development in rural areas and protect and retain the rural, open character of the countryside. Very low-density residential uses are allowed along with agricultural uses that are compatible with residential activity to provide for community cohesion in the rural areas and encourage land use interdependence.

Sec. 86-151. - Statement of intent; policy guidance.

(a) The agricultural (A-2) district is provided to allow for the compatible mixture of agricultural uses and limited residential development in rural areas and protect and retain the rural open character of the countryside. Very low-density residential uses are allowed along with agricultural uses that are compatible with residential activity to provide for community cohesion in the rural areas and encourage land use interdependence. Zoning standards are also included to ensure the co-existence of these uses with each other. The creation of lots fronting on existing state roads or federal highways is strongly discouraged.

(b) Agricultural (A-2) district uses range from agricultural to neighborhood oriented commercial and community services. The use of development setbacks, shared access, reverse-front lots and roadside buffers are encouraged to retain the rural character of the county along-side the open farm activities prevalent in the county.

2040 Comprehensive Plan

The 2040 Louisa County Comprehensive Plan designates this area of Louisa County as “Rural Area.”

The Vision Statement for the 2040 Comprehensive Plan states:

“We strengthen our sense of community by providing resources for residents, promoting agriculture and forestry, ensuring environmental stewardship, establishing reasonable growth areas, and maintaining our rural character.”

This Plan addresses and amplifies the vision statement above, with the following eight (8) supporting goals:

- Preserve and protect our rural heritage and natural resources
- Encourage open space retention
- Safeguard historic resources
- Maintain community characteristics
- Ensure compatibility between land uses
- Manage growth by concentrating development activity
- Encourage high quality development
- Maximize returns on the investment of public resources

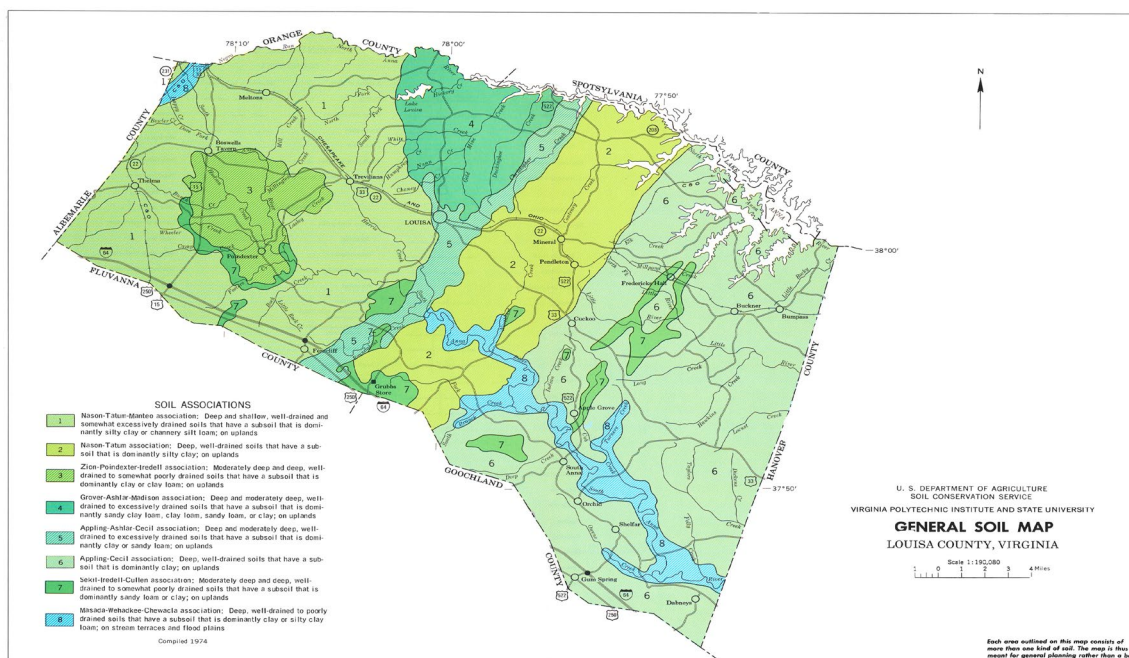
The creation of agricultural and forestal districts and subsequent additions to those districts, complements the goals identified in the Vision Statement by preserving and protecting natural resources, open space retention, compatibility between land uses, and managing growth by concentrating development activity to the designated growth areas.

Existing Uses

Based on information provided by the property owners, the subject parcels are used for livestock production, hay production, and storage of farming inputs such as farm machinery, maintenance tools, fencing, and animal feed.

Soils

Based on the 1976 Louisa County Soil Survey from the U.S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service, the soils in this area are primarily made up of the Appling-Cecil soil association. In summary, this soil association is described as “Deep, well-drained soils that have a sub-soil that is dominantly clay; on uplands.”



State Code of Virginia – Agricultural and Forestal Districts Act

§ 15.2-4302. Definitions.

“Agricultural products” means crops, livestock and livestock products, including but not limited to: field crops, fruits, vegetables, horticultural specialties, cattle, sheep, hogs, goats, horses, poultry, furbearing animals, milk, eggs and furs.

“Agricultural production” means the production for commercial purposes of crops, livestock and livestock products, and includes the processing or retail sales by the producer of crops, livestock or livestock products which are produced on the parcel or in the district.

“Agriculturally and forestally significant land” means land that has recently or historically produced agricultural and forestal products, is suitable for agricultural or forestal production or is considered appropriate to be retained for agricultural and forestal production as determined by such factors as soil quality, topography, climate, markets, farm structures, and other relevant factors.

“Forestal production” means the production for commercial purposes of forestal products and includes the processing or retail sales, by the producer, of forestal products which are produced on the parcel or in the district. “Forestal products” includes, but is not limited to, saw timber, pulpwood, posts, firewood, Christmas trees and other tree and wood products for sale or for farm use.

§ 15.2-4305. Application for creation of district in one or more localities; size and location of parcels.

“.....any owner or owners of land may submit an application to the locality for the creation of a district or addition of land to an existing district within the locality. Each district shall have a core of no less than 200 acres in one parcel or in contiguous parcels. A parcel not part of the core may be included in a district:

- (i) if the nearest boundary of the parcel is within one mile of the boundary of the core,
- (ii) if it is contiguous to a parcel in the district the nearest boundary of which is within one mile of the boundary of the core, or
- (iii) if the local governing body finds, in consultation with the advisory committee or planning commission, that the parcel not part of the core or within one mile of the boundary of the core contains agriculturally and forestally significant land.

No land shall be included in any district without the signature on the application, or the written approval of all owners thereof....”

§ 15.2-4306. Criteria for evaluating application.

Land being considered for inclusion in a district may be evaluated by the advisory committee and the planning commission through the Virginia Land Evaluation and Site Assessment (LESA) System or, if one has been developed, a local LESA System. The following factors should be considered by the local planning commission and the advisory committee, and at any public hearing at which an application that has been filed pursuant to § 15.2-4303 is being considered:

1. The agricultural and forestal significance of land within the district or addition and in areas adjacent thereto;
2. The presence of any significant agricultural lands or significant forestal lands within the district and in areas adjacent thereto that are not now in active agricultural or forestal production;
3. The nature and extent of land uses other than active farming or forestry within the district and in areas adjacent thereto;
4. Local developmental patterns and needs;
5. The comprehensive plan and, if applicable, the zoning regulations;

6. The environmental benefits of retaining the lands in the district for agricultural and forestal uses; and
7. Any other matter which may be relevant.

In judging the agricultural and forestal significance of land, any relevant agricultural or forestal maps may be considered, as well as soil, climate, topography, other natural factors, markets for agricultural and forestal products, the extent and nature of farm structures, the present status of agriculture and forestry, anticipated trends in agricultural economic conditions and such other factors as may be relevant.

Conclusion

The proposed addition is located within one mile of the land areas that currently make up the Taylors Creek Agricultural and Forestal District. The current use of the properties for active agricultural use, supports the intent of the agricultural and forestal districts.

Staff recommends the application for addition to the existing Taylors Creek Agricultural and Forestal District be approved, as consistent with the current zoning of the properties as Agricultural (A-2) and the Rural Area designation in the 2040 Louisa County Comprehensive Plan.

Recommendations of the Agricultural, Forestal, and Rural Preservation Committee

The Agricultural, Forestal and Rural Preservation Committee met to review this application on February 5, 2026. The Committee forwarded a favorable recommendation to the Planning Commission for an addition to the Taylors Creek Agricultural and Forestal District, as described.

The Louisa County Board of Supervisors will hold a public hearing on the following item at **6:00 p.m., after regular business, on Monday, March 16, 2026**, in the Louisa County Public Meeting Room, Main Floor, Louisa County Office Building, Louisa, Virginia:

The County of Louisa proposes to increase property tax levies.

1. **Assessment Increase:** Total assessed value of real property, excluding additional assessments due to new construction or improvements to property, exceeds last year's total assessed value of real property by 6.88%.
2. **Lowered Rate Necessary to Offset Increased Assessment:** The tax rate which would levy the same amount of real estate tax as last year, when multiplied by the new total assessed value of real estate with the exclusions mentioned above, would be \$0.674 per \$100 of assessed value. This rate will be known as the "lowered tax rate."
3. **Effective Rate Increase:** The County of Louisa proposes to maintain the current tax rate (\$0.72 per \$100 of assessed value). The difference between the lowered tax rate and the proposed rate would be \$0.046 per \$100 or 6.43% percent. This difference will be known as the "effective tax rate increase." Individual property taxes may, however, increase at a percentage greater than or less than the above percentage.
4. **Proposed Total Budget Increase:** Based on the proposed real property tax rate and changes in other revenues, the total budget of Louisa County will exceed last year's by 23.76%. This is subject to change as revenues and expenditures are finalized. A public hearing on the increase will be held on April 6, 2026 at 6:00 p.m., after regular business, in the Louisa County Public Meeting Room, Main Floor, Louisa County Office Building, Louisa, Virginia.
