The Board presented a resolution recognizing and honoring Christopher Coon as the Virginia Business Top 40 Under 40 Honoree for 2025. The Board took a moment to acknowledge Mr. Coon's accomplishments.

PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

Mr. Phil Winston, Mineral District, expressed concern over repeated developer requests regarding Lake Anna Resort and the implications for traffic and safety on Route 208.

Ms. Vicky Harte, Louisa District, raised three points: (1) why the County has not considered implementing a stormwater utility fee; (2) concern over the Board's previous denial of affordable housing at Lake Anna and questioning the rationale; (3) concerns over requiring permission for

churches to house residents during freezing temperatures.

Mr. Bob Babyok, Green Springs District, talked briefly about real estate taxes. He applauded the Board for taking action to help mitigate the impact on its residents, but urged the Board to consider more informational meetings on how assessments are made in the County.

Mr. Matthew Craig, Louisa District, urged the Board to reconsider postponement of the animal shelter expansion, emphasizing the shelter's growing importance.

Resolution – To Approve Funding Request from the Tourism Budget for the Louisa Arts Center

The Tourism Advisory Committee has reviewed and recommended funding allocations for various initiatives to support tourism and economic development in Louisa County. The Louisa Arts Center has requested funding to support an outdoor concert for a musical act with a large following and the potential to increase overnight visitation.

On the motion of Mr. Williams, seconded by Ms. Jones, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to allocate from the FY25 Tourism Budget to approve \$10,000 (not-to-exceed) for the Louisa Arts Center toward the performer fee of \$12,000, with a Memorandum of Understanding which requires:

- Add the Visit Louisa logo with a link to the bottom of e-newsletters and website for a minimum of one year.
- Include the Visit Louisa logo in any advertisements.
- Provide any related band photos or video Visit Louisa may use in its advertising.
- Provide a blog post that describes how a visitor may participate in the Louisa Arts Center's offerings during a week's stay.
- Coordinate an overnight stay package with a local lodging provider for the event.
- Submit a report with event data, including visitor origin information.

Resolution – To Approve Funding Request from the Tourism Budget for Lake Anna Jazz

The Tourism Advisory Committee has reviewed and recommended funding allocations for various initiatives to support tourism and economic development in Louisa County. Lake Anna Jazz has also requested funding to support an outdoor concert with a featured musical act with a large following and the potential to increase overnight visitation.

On the motion of Mr. Barnes, seconded by Ms. Jones, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to allocate from the FY25 Tourism Budget to approve \$5,000 (not-to-exceed) for the Lake Anna Jazz toward the performer fees of approximately \$15,000, with a Memorandum of Understanding which requires:

- Add the Visit Louisa logo with a link to the bottom of e-newsletters and website for a minimum of one year.
- Follow the process to submit Lake Anna Jazz events through the Visit Louisa ingestion process for a minimum of one calendar year.
- Provide content for a blog post with images promoting Lake Anna Jazz and its various venues.
- Use the county's doorway people counters at the venue during the event.
- Submit a report with event data, including visitor origin information.
- Coordinate an overnight stay package with a local lodging provider for the event.

Resolution – To Approve Funding Request from the Tourism Budget for the Trevilian Station Battlefield

The Tourism Advisory Committee has reviewed and recommended funding allocations for various initiatives to support tourism and economic development in Louisa County.

Trevilian Station Battlefield Foundation has requested funds to partially fund a roof replacement for the Charles Goodall Trevilian House and the house is the centerpiece of the battlefield, representing a tourism draw.

On the motion of Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Barnes, which carried by a vote of 6-1, with Mr. McCotter voting against, the Board voted to allocate from the FY25 Tourism Budget to approve \$20,000 (not-to-exceed) for Trevilian Station Battlefield Foundation toward the purchase of a new roof estimated at over \$45,000, with a Memorandum of Understanding which requires:

- Add the Visit Louisa logo with a link to the bottom of e-newsletters and website for a minimum of one year.
- Follow the process to submit events like Night at the Tavern through the Visit Louisa ingestion process.
- Provide content for a blog post with images promoting living histories with perspectives of soldiers, women and the enslaved to provide a robust overview of the time period.
- Provide a blog post on ghost sightings on the property.
- Provide a blog post with images detailing how to utilize the trails for horseback riding.
- Provide narration and logistical support for a virtual reality project that will be available through the Visit Louisa app (tentative).

Resolution – To Establish and Adopt the Tax Levy for Fiscal Year 2025-2026 for Real Estate, Tangible Personal Property, Merchant's Capital, and Machinery and Tools

Revenue estimates for Fiscal Year 2026 have been reviewed during the budget process and during several public work sessions. The Board of Supervisors' desire is to ensure continued effective fiscal management and the ability to meet the ongoing financial obligations of Louisa County.

On the motion of Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Barnes, which carried by a vote of 6-1, with Mr. Barlow voting against, the Board voted to hereby establishes the following tax levies on Real Estate, Tangible Personal Property, Merchant's Capital, and Machinery and Tools taxes for Fiscal Year 2026:

The Board hereby signifies its intent to provide a tax rebate equal to 2.4 cents (3.3%) off the tax rate on real property during fiscal year 2026.

Resolution – To Adopt the Fiscal Year 2026 Operational and Maintenance Budget

The Louisa County Board of Supervisors held a public hearing, in accordance with Code of Virginia §15.2-2506, on the proposed Fiscal Year 2026 budget on April 7, 2025. The Board of Supervisors previously reviewed the proposed budget during several public work sessions.

On the motion of Mr. Barnes, seconded by Mr. Williams, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to hereby adopt the Fiscal Year 2026 Operational and Maintenance Budget in the amount of \$174,867,600 as detailed in the attached. The Louisa County Public Schools budget is adopted with the understanding that the Louisa County Department of Parks and Recreation shall continue to use school facilities as in the past.

Resolution – To Adopt the Fiscal Year 2026 Capital Improvement Plan Budget

The Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors have both held Public Hearings on the proposed Fiscal Year 2026 Capital Improvement Plan Budget in accordance with the Code of Virginia §15.2-2506. The Planning Commission has reviewed the proposed Capital Improvement Plan Budget over the course of several public work sessions. The Board of Supervisors has

reviewed the proposed Capital Improvement Plan Budget during several public work sessions and a Public Hearing on April 7, 2025.

On the motion of Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Barnes, which carried by a vote of 6-1, with Mr. Barlow voting against, the Board voted to hereby adopt the Fiscal Year 2026 Capital Improvement Plan Budget in the amount of \$12,718,599.

Resolution – Signifying Intent to Provide a Tax Rebate on Real Property in FY2026

Code of Virginia §15.2-2511.1 allows any locality by ordinance to develop a method for returning surplus real or personal property tax revenues, or both, to taxpayers who are assessed such taxes in any fiscal year in which the locality reports a surplus. The Louisa County Board of Supervisors wishes to issue a 3.3% (equivalent of 2.4 cents) rebate of real property taxes in FY2026 from surplus funds from the previous fiscal years.

On the motion of Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Barnes, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to hereby approve the issuance of a 3.3% (equivalent of 2.4 cents) rebate of real property taxes in FY2026 from surplus funds. This is included in the FY2026 adopted budget.

County Administrator's Report

Mr. Goodwin reported that following the Board's adoption of stricter litter ordinances, the Louisa County Sheriff's Office intends to begin more active enforcement. This includes monitoring activity at refuse and recycling centers, checking for unsecured loads and improperly closed containers, which could contribute to roadside litter. He encouraged Board members to inform their constituents about this increased enforcement.

Mr. Goodwin shared that Central Virginia Regional Jail (CBRJ) will be restarting its workforce program this year. The program will consist of five individuals working one week at a time on litter and cleanup efforts. He invited Supervisors to submit suggestions for roads or areas that could benefit from cleanup and stated that more details would be shared once the schedule is finalized.

Mr. Jim Riddell, Chair of the Ag/Forestal and Rural Preservation Committee, provided a detailed presentation outlining recommendations for an agricultural and natural resource initiative to preserve farmland and forested land in Louisa County. Key recommendations included hiring a county-level agricultural advocate, creating voluntary conservation easement programs, increasing incentives for land preservation, and investing in infrastructure to support agricultural businesses. He reiterated the County's vision statement about strengthen our sense of community by providing resources for residents, promoting agriculture and forestry, and ensuring environmental stewardship, establishing reasonable growth areas and maintaining a rural character.

Board members engaged in discussion regarding the feasibility, costs, and potential impacts of these strategies. Supervisors Woodward, McCotter, Barnes, Barlow, Williams, and Jones offered support and insights, noting the urgent need to protect rural character amid growth pressures.

Chairman Adams summarized the consensus to begin with exploring hiring a dedicated AG/Forestry staff member and directed staff to continue working with the Committee on next steps.

Discussion – Tourism Administrative Process Update

Mr. Chris Coon presented a proposed administrative process for micro-tourism funding requests under \$5,000. The streamlined approach includes a Memorandum of Understanding, upfront and post-event funding splits, and specific marketing and partnership deliverables.

Supervisors discussed the eligibility criteria and how events would demonstrate support for overnight stays. Mr. Coon clarified that transient occupancy tax revenues fund these efforts.

After discussion and consensus, the Board directed staff to proceed with finalizing the MOU and begin processing pending micro-tourism applications.

NEW BUSINESS/ACTION ITEMS

Resolution – To Appropriate the Fiscal Year 2026 Operations and Maintenance Budget

The Fiscal Year (FY) 2026 County budget was approved and adopted by the Board of Supervisors at its regular meeting on April 28, 2025. The Code of Virginia requires that an appropriation of the budget be granted by the Board of Supervisors before obligations can be made to cover the estimated expenditures. The Board of Supervisors, being fiscally responsible, does appropriate the approved Operational and Maintenance Budget in the amount of \$174,867,600.

On the motion of Mr. Barnes, seconded by Mr. Williams, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to adopt the resolution appropriating the Fiscal Year 2026 Operations and Maintenance Budget.

Resolution – To Appropriate the Fiscal Year 2026 Capital Improvement Plan Budget

The Fiscal Year 2026 Capital Improvement Plan budget was approved and adopted by the Board of Supervisors at its regular meeting on April 28 2025. The Code of Virginia requires that an appropriation of the budget be granted by the Board of Supervisors before obligations can be made to cover the estimated expenditures. The Board of Supervisors has approved a budget of \$12,718,599 for Capital Improvement Projects.

On the motion of Mr. Barnes, seconded by Mr. Williams, which carried by a vote of 6-1, with Mr. Barlow voting against, the Board voted to adopt the resolution appropriating the Fiscal Year 2026 Capital Improvement Plan Budget.

Resolution - Authorizing the Sheriff's Department to Proceed with FY2026 Vehicle Replacement Capital Project

The Sheriff's Department Vehicle Replacement FY2026 capital project entails purchasing vehicles to replace the oldest vehicles with the highest mileage and/or supplement the Sheriff's Office vehicle fleet. The Sheriff's Office plans to retain the best high mileage vehicles to supplement the Sheriff's Office vehicle fleet as potential back-up vehicles. The Sheriff's Office has experienced delays in placing replacement vehicles into service if ordering is done after the start of the new fiscal year. The Sheriff's Office requests authorization to proceed with the FY2026 vehicle replacement capital project, not to exceed \$580,000 in FY2025 and allow ordering of these vehicles for delivery and payment in FY2026.

On the motion of Mr. Barnes, seconded by Mr. Williams, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to adopt the resolution authorizing the Sheriff's Department to proceed with FY2026 Vehicle Replacement Capital Project.

Resolution – Adopting the Move Safely Blue Ridge Comprehensive Safety Action Plan

Louisa County is committed to improving roadway safety and reducing fatalities and serious injuries on its transportation network. 173 people were killed or seriously injured in crashes in Louisa County from 2018 to 2022, underscoring the urgent need for coordinated safety improvements. The County has previously committed to the goal of reducing roadway fatalities and serious injuries by 50% by 2045, in alignment with the Virginia Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP). The Thomas Jefferson Planning District Commission (TJPDC) has developed the Move Safely Blue Ridge Comprehensive Safety Action Plan to identify data-driven strategies, prioritize safety improvements, and guide implementation efforts for enhanced roadway safety.

The Move Safely Blue Ridge Comprehensive Safety Action Plan serves as a framework for regional collaboration and supports eligibility for federal funding under the Safe Streets and

Roads for All (SS4A) program. Adopting this plan reinforces Louisa County's commitment to proactive safety measures, including infrastructure improvements, policy initiatives, and community engagement strategies aimed at preventing roadway fatalities and serious injuries.

Mr. Coon and a representative from the Thomas Jefferson Planning District Commission explained the benefits of adopting the plan.

On the motion of Mr. Barnes, seconded by Mr. Williams, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to adopt the resolution approving the Move Safely Blue Ridge Comprehensive Safety Action Plan, which positions the County to apply for federal road safety implementation grants.

Resolution – Authorizing a Budget Transfer to Mineral Volunteer Fire Station

Mineral Volunteer Fire Department is working on a building improvement capital project and is almost finished with the project. After careful consideration of what would be beneficial for specific spaces, they are requesting a budget supplement to add dividers to the bunk room versus having one large open area. The cost to add the dividers would be \$14,054 and would provide benefit to both the station and the County staff that work from this station. Funding for the dividers is available for transfer from the County VRS Retirement Contingencies budget.

On the motion of Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Barnes, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to authorize a budget transfer to Mineral Volunteer Fire Department Building Enhancements (30332000-482500-FS2) in the amount of \$14,054 from County VRS Retirement Contingencies (10091000-422100) for the addition of dividers in the bunk room at Mineral Volunteer Fire Station.

Discussion – Louisa County Public Schools CTE Center

A board member, who served on the planning committee, introduced the item and emphasized the importance of the connector from the new CTE center to the high school to prevent students from having to go outside when moving between buildings. The primary justification for the connector was safety, with weather being a secondary concern. The project was not originally included in the scope of work but was recognized as necessary during planning. The connector will be two stories tall to span over the existing bus loop, which contributed to its cost. It was confirmed that the project remains within budget due to thoughtful financing and the coupling of the middle school and CTE center projects. The estimated cost is \$1.6 to \$1.7 million. Funding will be covered within existing project financing for the middle school addition.

The motion to recommend approval of the \$1.7 million connector was passed unanimously by the Board.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS, BOARDS AND STANDING COMMITTEES

Committee Reports

Mr. Woodward reported on several vacancies on the Commission on Aging and encouraged the Board to continue seeking individuals to serve.

Board Appointments

County Administrator's Report

Mr. Goodwin informed the Board about a communication from the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) regarding a high burn-up fuel cask currently stored at North Anna. This type of fuel is kept in the reactor longer for greater efficiency and is subject to long-term monitoring. There is a federal effort underway to potentially transport the cask to Idaho National Laboratory in 2027 for testing, using a specialized Atlas railcar. County staff are engaged in early planning efforts and Mr. Goodwin encouraged Board members to review the provided materials and share input or questions.

Mr. Goodwin reported on the status of the Hamilton Road Bridge. He explained VDOT has announced plans to move forward with the replacement bridge, funded with state resources. The County previously adopted a resolution in support of a bridge capable of accommodating agricultural and emergency services traffic. Mr. Goodwin will forward the related communication to the Board and include it in the next packet.

Mr. Goodwin stated the most recent Household Hazardous Wast Day event at the landfill was very successful, with 242 vehicles participating. Improved internal traffic flow management helped minimize congestion around drop-off points. Mr. Goodwin commended Anderson Woolfolk and his team for their effective coordination and operations. He noted that while vehicle turnout matched previous events, he would follow up with volume totals when available.

Supervisor Barlow acknowledged the success of the National Day of Prayer event held the previous Thursday. Despite excellent attendance and community participation, it received no media coverage, which he found disappointing.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

Ordinance – Amending Louisa County Code Chapter 70, Taxation Article II In Real Estate Tax Relief for the Elderly or Totally Disabled Section 70-35

Ms. Wanda Colvin presented the proposed ordinance to amend Chapter 70 of the County Code regarding real estate tax relief for the elderly and totally disabled.

Louisa County Code Chapter 70- Taxation-Article II- Real Estate Tax Relief for the Elderly or Totally Disabled Section 70-35, currently states that the relief shall not exceed \$2,000.00 on any one qualifying dwelling and land. The proposed amendments will modify the relief to not exceed \$3,000.00 on any one qualifying dwelling and land.

Chairman Adams opened the public hearing. With no one wishing to speak, Chairman Adams closed the public hearing and brought it back to the Board for discussion.

On the motion of Mr. Barnes, seconded by Ms. Jones, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board to adopt amendments to Chapter 70, Taxation-Article II- Real Estate Tax Relief for the Elderly or Totally Disabled Section 70-35 modifying the relief to not exceed \$3,000.00 on any one qualifying dwelling and land.

Resolution – Approving the Six-Year Plan for Secondary Roads and the Construction Priority List for Louisa County

Mr. Scott Thornton appeared before the Board and recommended approval of the Six-Year Plan for Secondary Roads (2025/2026 through 2030/2031) and the Construction Priority List (2025/2026) for Louisa County. Section 33.2-331 of the 1950 Code of Virginia, as amended, provides the opportunity for each county to work with the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) in developing a Six-Year Plan for Secondary Roads. The Board of Supervisors had previously agreed to assist in the preparation of this Plan, in accordance with VDOT policies and procedures, and participated in a public hearing on the proposed Plan as well as the Construction Priority List on May 5, 2025, after duly advertised so that all citizens of the County had the opportunity to participate in said hearing and to make comments and recommendations concerning the proposed Plan and Priority List.

The Board of Supervisors has carefully weighed the comments of VDOT and Louisa County citizens as to the condition and importance of various secondary roads in the County. The said Plan appears to be in the best interest of the Secondary Road System in Louisa County and of the citizens residing on the Secondary System.

Chairman Adams opened the public hearing. With no one wishing to speak, Chairman Adams closed the public hearing and brought it back to the Board for discussion.

On the motion of Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Barne, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to approve the Construction Priority List (2025/2026) for Louisa County.



Cuckoo Elementary School, Louisa County, DHR File No. 054-5479

The 1.33-acre site of the Cuckoo Elementary School is located approximately five miles south of Mineral, Virginia, and 1 mile east of the village of Cuckoo off Route 33 in Louisa County. It is situated on the northeast side of Route 33 and the building is oriented toward the street. The site is relatively open with a somewhat worn grass lawn and minimal overgrown shrubs near the building's perimeter. The property is bordered by a church to the southeast and a residence to the northwest, all loosely bordered by a larger wooded area situated within surrounding cultivated farmland. The site contains a single resource, the c. 1925 vernacular one-story school building, which is a contributing resource. The Cuckoo School retains a relatively high degree of all seven aspects of integrity. It retains a high degree of integrity of location, setting, and association with its use as an African American school at its original location along Jefferson Highway. The property retains the same characteristics as it did historically. The resource also retains a high degree of integrity of design, materials, workmanship, and feeling. The building retains its form, materials, and floor plan. Alumni say that the building overall has not changed much from how it appeared when still functioning as a school. Furthermore, the building retains evidence of its workmanship and materials embodying early twentieth-century vernacular construction methods. As a whole, the building retains the aesthetic and historic components that reflect its history as a small, two-room early twentieth-century African American school. The retention of the physical components associated with the historic property, including integrity of the design and materials, along with setting and location, in particular, help maintain its link to the era of racial segregation in Virginia's public schoolhouses from 1870 to the 1960s.

The Cuckoo Elementary School is a rare surviving two-room schoolhouse in Louisa County Virginia, and the surrounding region. The school was an elementary school which served grades one through seven. The school was constructed in 1925, when most rural schoolhouses for African American students were modest frame buildings with one or two classrooms. It closed as the result of a fire in 1955. The school is locally significant under Criterion A for Education and under Criterion A for Ethnic Heritage: Black, for its association with Black history and culture in rural Louisa County, Virginia, from 1925-1955. Additionally, the school represents an important link to Virginia's era of racial segregation in public education and to the overall use of small one- and two-room schoolhouses from 1870 to the mid-twentieth century. The Period of Significance of the Cuckoo School begins with its construction in 1925 and ends with a fire which resulted in the school closing permanently in 1955. In later years the school building was used by the neighboring Philippi Christian Church for congregation activities. Currently the building is vacant. The Cuckoo School is being nominated under the African American School in Virginia Multiple Property Documentation Form and meets the registration requirements established therein.





The National and State Registers in Virginia

A Quick Guide to the National Register of Historic Places and Virginia Landmarks Register

- Established under the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, the **National Register of Historic Places** is the Nation's official list of historic properties worthy of preservation, administered by the National Park Service, U.S. Department of the Interior. Properties listed in the National Register include districts, sites, buildings, structures, and objects that are significant in American history, architecture, archeology, engineering, and culture.

In 1966, the Virginia General Assembly established the Virginia Historic Landmarks Commission, now the Department of Historic Resources. DHR is the State Historic Preservation Office responsible for nominating properties to the National Register and managing the **Virginia Landmarks Register**, the State's official list of properties important to Virginia's history. The same evaluation criteria and nomination form are used for the National Register of Historic Places and the Virginia Landmarks Register.

■ **Key Points**

- Listing in the National and State Registers is **honorary**. It recognizes a historic property's importance to its community, the State, and/or the Nation and encourages good stewardship.
- National and State Register listings **do not** place any obligations or restrictions on private property owners. Owners remain free to do what they wish with their property within existing laws and regulations and are not required to restore or maintain a property in particular ways as a result of listing.
- To ensure public participation in the process, property owners and local officials are notified and given the opportunity to comment on proposed nominations. When a nomination is submitted to the National Park Service, another public comment period is published in the Federal Register.

■ **Benefits of Register Listing**

- Owners of listed properties may qualify for Federal and State Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credits, historic preservation easements, and Federal and State grants for historic preservation when funding is available.
- Federal agencies whose projects affect a listed property must give the Department of Historic Resources an opportunity to comment on the project and its effects on the property.



Rights of Private Property Owners to Comment or Object to a Nomination for Listing



■ Supporting and/or Commenting on a Nomination

- A private property owner who supports a nomination for listing in the Registers is invited to send a letter of support but is not required to do so for the nomination to proceed. Private property owners are also welcome to comment without formally supporting or objecting to a nomination. Copies of letters of support and/or comment are provided to the Boards for review, along with the nomination to which they refer, and are included with the nomination if it is recommended to proceed to the NRHP.

■ Objecting to a Nomination

- Per 17VAC10-20-200, a private property owner has the right to object to listing in either or both Registers. For a private property being individually nominated, each owner or partial owner may object to listing regardless of the portion that party owns. For a historic district that is being nominated, each owner of private property in the district is counted as one individual regardless of how many properties that party owns or whether the properties contribute to the significance of the district.
- An objection to listing must be provided to DHR in writing a minimum of 7 business days prior to the Board meeting. Letters of objection must be addressed to the State Historic Preservation Officer at the Department of Historic Resources, 2801 Kensington Avenue, Richmond, Virginia 23221.
- When objecting to listing, any owner or partial owner of private property must submit to DHR a written statement that references the subject property by address and/or parcel number and certifies that the party is the sole or partial owner of the private property, as appropriate.
 - For objections to listing in the VLR, the written statement of objection must be attested and notarized by a notary public in order to be counted by DHR in determining whether a majority of private property owners has objected to a nomination.
 - Objection letters concerning NRHP listing are not required to be notarized. Per 28 U.S. Code § 1746, a written objection should state: "I declare (or certify, verify, or state) under penalty of perjury under the laws of the United States of America that the foregoing is true and correct. Executed on (date). (Signature)".
- A property owner may submit a single written objection to listing in both the VLR and NRHP, but in order for the objection to be applied to the VLR listing, the letter must be notarized.
- If a **majority** (50% + 1) of private property owners object according to the process above, the nomination will not proceed to listing. In such cases, DHR is still required to submit the nomination to the National Park Service for a Determination of Eligibility for the NRHP, per 36 CFR 60.6(n).
- Letters of objection received a minimum of 7 business days prior to the Board meeting will be copied to Board members for review, along with the nomination to which they refer. If the nomination is approved to proceed to the NRHP, all letters of objection will be forwarded to the National Park Service to consider with their review of the nomination, along with any letters of support or comment that DHR has received.
- Letters of objection to listing in the NRHP may be submitted to DHR even after the Board meeting at which the nomination is approved. DHR will forward any letters of objection to the National Park Service. The National Park Service continues to accept letters of objection up to the date of listing in the NRHP. The National Park Service typically concludes review and approval of a nomination within approximately 45 days of receipt of the nomination from DHR.

Narrative Description

Setting and Landscape

The Cuckoo School is located approximately five miles south of the town of Mineral, Virginia, and 1 mile east of the village of Cuckoo off Route 33 in Louisa County, Virginia. Situated on the northeast side of Route 33/Jefferson Highway, this 1.33-acre property is loosely encircled by wooded areas, which in turn are surrounded by expansive cultivated farmland, with the building oriented to face the road. The site is roughly bound by Harris Court Drive to the southeast, a wooded area to the northeast, and a driveway of the neighboring property to the northwest. A church, Philippi Christian Church, is located on the neighboring property to the southeast and a residence is located on the neighboring property to the northwest.

The property is accessed by a gravel driveway (Harris Court Drive) on the southeast side of the property, which leads to an informal and lightly graveled parking area at the northeast corner of the site. Otherwise, with the exception of the wooded area along the rear border of the property, the site remains relatively open with a slightly worn grass lawn and minimal overgrown shrubs near the building's perimeter. A few remaining tree stumps indicate that there may have once been a few mature trees on the parcel, but they have since been removed.

Description

School (c. 1925) - Contributing

This c. 1925 vernacular, one-story, five-bay, T-shaped school building has an uncut stone pier foundation, wood weatherboard siding, and a hipped, standing-seam, metal roof with closed eaves. The façade features a one-bay projecting entry vestibule with a hipped, standing-seam, metal roof. Accessed by concrete steps with a narrow pipe railing on one side, the entrance features double-leaf flush wood doors with a simple flush, wood-frame surround. Two six-over-six, double-hung, wood-sash windows, with a continuous wood sill and continuous wood header between them, flank the entry vestibule on each side. The windows on the northwest side are missing the horizontal muntins, making them appear as if they are a three-over-three configuration, but marks on the vertical muntins indicate that these windows previously matched the six-over-six configuration.

The northwest and southeast elevations each feature two six-over-six, double-hung, wood-sash windows connected by a continuous wood sill and a continuous wood header like the windows on the façade. Each has a single boarded-up window, and glazing and muntins are missing to various degrees. The rear, or northeast, elevation is devoid of any openings.

The building is in poor condition but has been stabilized. The building had a central brick chimney, but it has been disassembled, with the bricks stored on site. The chimney was removed because it had split in half in the attic and the resulting stress it was placing on the framing by

leaning against the rafters. Additionally, several of the wood siding boards are missing and many are damaged. Most of the visible damage is along areas of perimeter vegetation. Furthermore, the exterior paint is deteriorating, and there appears to be some water damage along the cornice and above the entry. The stone piers on the foundation are in poor condition with much of the mortar eroding or already missing. The piers have been replaced with concrete block along the rear elevation. The concrete block pier at the northwest corner was replaced recently, while the date of the other replacements is unknown. Underneath the building, the circular sawn floor joists are exposed, and several of them have severe damage from rot. With the replacement of the northwest corner pier, temporary shoring was placed beneath the joists to support the building until it can be properly repaired. Charring and damage visible in the attic and roof framing and on the ceiling were caused by a 1955 fire.

Interior:

The interior floor plan consists of a two-room schoolhouse with an entry vestibule. The vestibule opens to a small entry hall, approximately eight feet by five feet wide, flanked by two small storage rooms that were historically used as cloak rooms. Two doorways (missing doors) lead from the entry into separate, equal-sized classrooms; one is on the northwest side and one is on the southeast side. Both classrooms are open rooms divided by a solid partition wall that has been covered with wallboard, which was added when the church began using the facility for various purposes in the early 1970s. Centered on the partition wall separating the classrooms, a wood stove in each classroom once connected to a brick chimney. The chimney has since been deconstructed and the bricks stored on-site due to the stress it was placing on the framing.

Each classroom, as well as the entry hall, has unpainted tongue-and-groove wood floors and painted double-bead beadboard tongue-and-groove paneling on the walls and ceilings. Modern wallboard has been added to part of the ceiling on each side of the central partition to cover areas damaged by the 1955 fire. Unlike the rest of the spaces, the two cloak rooms remain unfinished. The window trim in the northwest classroom is flush to the wall, while the window trim in the southeast room is surface-mounted, suggesting a possibility that the southeast room was added on at a later date. Other differences between the two schoolrooms include the entrance door height, the flooring, and the chalk tray. The height of the door leading into the northwest classroom is a few inches shorter than the height of the door leading into the southeast room. The direction of the flooring and sizing is different in each room as well. In the northwest room, the flooring runs northeast/southwest, while the flooring in the southeast classroom runs perpendicular to the other room, northwest/southeast. Additionally, a chalk tray remains on the rear portion of the northwest side wall, where the chalkboard used to be located. In the southeast room, there is a surface-mounted horizontal, nominal 2x4-inch board along the rear wall where a chalkboard was historically located.

The attic consists of exposed framing. As a result of the 1955 fire, much of the attic framing, including the hip rafters and common rafters, collar beams, and decking, is charred. Modern

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supplementary framing, including rafters and vertical posts, has been added for additional structural support.

Alterations:

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


Figure 1: Historic Photos of the Cuckoo School Showing Three Windows in Each Window Unit, Image Courtesy of Alumni Edna Hackney.

While the building has not changed much from its overall historic appearance, there have been a few alterations and modern updates. The most notable change is regarding the window sets on the façade and side elevations. Historically, these were triple-unit window assemblies with three unified sections beneath a shared sill and header (Figure 1). The current configuration retains the flanking windows but replaces the central sash with a solid panel. This change was made during the Period of Significance. On the interior, while there appears to have been a solid wall dividing the two rooms earlier, there was a sliding door partition between the two classrooms when Edna Hackney attended the school (1945-1957) and prior to the 1955 fire. Alumni noted the sliding door was located on each side of the central chimney and opened toward the outer walls and away from the chimney to create one large room. Repairs in the 1970s have converted this back to a solid wall. Alumni also noted that the rear wall of each classroom had a blackboard that extended the entire length of the rear wall.¹ Other alterations include the installation of electricity for lighting in 1950, replacement of the front entry doors at an unknown date, and removal of the interior doors.²

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Integrity Analysis

The Cuckoo School retains a relatively high degree of all seven aspects of integrity. It retains a high degree of integrity of location, setting, and association concerning its use as an African American school at its present location along Jefferson Highway. Not only is the building still located in its original location, but the property retains the same characteristics as it did historically. The building is still set within a rural landscape consistent with the original landscape and feeling. In a June 28, 2022, interview with a group of alumni, the former students noted that the grounds around the school historically looked nearly the same as they do today. They noted that the landscape lacked trees, shrubs, planting beds, and most other vegetation beyond the wooded area northeast of the building. The group mentioned that there was not even a flag pole. The only difference identified was that the immediate lawn surrounding the school was dustier due to frequent use as opposed to the fully-covered grass present today.³ The property remains relatively open with a somewhat worn grass lawn and the wooded area remaining on the northeast edge of the property.

The resource also retains a high degree of integrity of design, materials, and workmanship. While some piers have been replaced with concrete block due to stabilization efforts, it still retains several of its stone piers in the foundation along with the primary materials, such as the wood weatherboard siding, standing-seam metal roof, and wood windows, as well as the interior materials including the wood floors, wood walls, and wood ceiling. Additionally, the building retains its rectangular form and hipped roof. While the building has undergone some minor changes, including changes to the partition between the two classrooms, entry door, and removal of a window in the center of each window group, alumni say that the building overall has not changed much from how looked while functioning as a public school. Furthermore, the building retains evidence of its workmanship as shown by the circular sawn marks on the floor joists, the stone piers, the craftsmanship in the wood windows, and the joinery and other woodworking details, including double-bead beadboard tongue-and-groove interior siding. The retained workmanship in this building demonstrates the construction methods of its time, such as the exterior cladding applied directly to the diagonal wood sheathing, a practice characteristic of the early twentieth century.

As a whole, the building retains the aesthetic and historic components that reflect its history as a small, two-room early twentieth-century African American school. The retention of the physical components associated with the historic property, including integrity of the design and materials, along with setting and location, in particular, help maintain its link to the era of racial segregation in Virginia's public schoolhouses from 1870 to the 1960s until integration. Therefore, the resource also retains integrity of feeling.

Narrative Statement of Significance (Provide at least **one** paragraph for each area of significance.)

Criterion A: Ethnic Heritage: Black

The current Cuckoo School was built on the site of at least two previous schools (pre-1875 and c. 1880) with at least the c. 1880 school also being called the Cuckoo School, representing a longstanding community commitment to the school and the site. The previous c. 1880 school was a log building, with the current, two-room frame school being a significant improvement for the students. The land for the current and previous schools was donated by the Pendleton family from land which was formerly part of their plantation, establishing a direct link between the former enslavers and the descendants of the formerly enslaved. The Pendletons also donated the land for the Philippi Church (located next door to the Cuckoo School) specifically for the Black community. Oral histories, given by former students, describe a school that is largely unchanged from the current building and a school and life experience which was indicative of most rural Black residents in Virginia in the early-to-mid twentieth century. The school was too small for the number of students, and the features and equipment were often inadequate, but the former students uniformly remember the school fondly. Two stoves heated the building (one in each classroom) connected to the single, central chimney. Wood privies were located behind the school, and seven grades were taught in two rooms. Two fifteen-minute recesses allowed students to play numerous traditional games including jumping rope, kickball, dodgeball, hopscotch, jacks, marbles, among others. The community also attended school events at Cuckoo

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School, including plays, recitals, and concerts. Cuckoo School was an excellent example of the vital role of a longstanding local school for a rural Black community in Virginia before the establishment of the modern, post-segregation public school system.

Additional historic context regarding the association of schools with the experiences of African American life in Virginia during the segregation era is available in the Multiple Property Documentation Form, African American Schools in Virginia.⁴

Criterion A: Education

Formal education for African Americans, both enslaved and free, was rare in Virginia until after the Civil War. The education of enslaved persons was made illegal in Virginia during the antebellum period, particularly after the 1831 Nat Turner Rebellion in Southampton County. As of 1860 it is estimated that only five percent of the enslaved population in the United States was literate.⁵ Following the Civil War, Virginia's constitutional convention resulted in the post-Reconstruction 1868 Underwood Constitution, which included a requirement that Virginia establish a public school system and begin construction of public schools to be open for the 1870-71 school year. Additionally, the new system would provide for schools within walking distance of every student. Unsurprisingly, the Underwood Constitution did not prohibit school segregation, and separate Black and White schools were established across Virginia.⁶ The result for many areas, and most rural communities, was the construction of one-room, log construction schools, as was built at Cuckoo c. 1880. During the late nineteenth and early twentieth century, rural schools increased in size to two-and-three room frame schools due to growing enrollments, but with lower investment in Black schools versus White schools. Purpose-built two-room schools (as opposed to additions to one-room schools) often featured a central partition dividing a large interior space into two classrooms, as seen at the Cuckoo School. These "graded schools" split seven grades between the two classrooms.⁷ If not for the 1955 fire closing Cuckoo School, it would likely have closed within a few years as a result of pressures related to the equalization era and Civil Rights Movement.

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Additional historic context regarding the history of education and rural schools in Virginia during the segregation era is available in the Multiple Property Documentation Form, African American Schools in Virginia.⁸

The Pendleton Family

The Pendleton family was already an established wealthy White farming family when Colonel Henry Pendleton constructed the prominent c. 1819 Cuckoo House, immediately after purchasing the land in 1818. With the establishment of this plantation, the Pendleton family began a multi-generational relationship with the local Black population, which was larger than the local White population before the Civil War. Initially the Pendleton family were typical of the rural landowning wealthy White elites of the antebellum period; Henry Pendleton left an estate of 226 acres and eighteen enslaved persons upon his death in 1822. However, the children and later descendants of Henry Pendleton often chose professions outside farming, particularly medicine: eventually at least eleven members of the family became doctors, with most practicing at Cuckoo, or in Louisa County.⁹

Edmund Pendleton inherited the Cuckoo estate from his father, Henry Pendleton, continuing as a successful plantation owner and greatly expanding the family holdings by the time of his death in 1828. However, two of his brothers began the family tradition of professional careers as doctors: William J. Pendleton and Joseph W. Pendleton, who served the Cuckoo community. Multiple children of Edmund's also pursued professional careers, including Dr. Philip Barbour Pendleton. Philip Pendleton inherited Cuckoo in 1830 and lived in the house until 1907, where he ran a store and served as the local physician, as well as running the plantation. Dr. Eugene Pendleton acquired the ownership of Cuckoo from his siblings in 1910 and served as a community doctor from the estate for the next fifty-two years. Members of the Pendleton family owned the Cuckoo estate through the entire Period of Significance of the Cuckoo School (ca 1925-1955) and through the twentieth century.¹⁰ The Pendleton family gifted the land and a log schoolhouse, located thereon, to the county school board so that it would be a public school and thus committing the county to maintaining and staffing the school.

Disciples of Christ, Gilboa Christian Church, Philippi Christian Church

The Disciples of Christ denomination expanded to Louisa County in the early nineteenth century and was formalized with the organization of the Gilboa Christian Church congregation in 1834. In 1835, Col. Edmund Pendleton, son of Henry Pendleton, the builder of the Cuckoo house, donated an acre of land for a church to be built, just down the road from the current Cuckoo School. This first frame church building served the congregation until a more formal brick Greek Revival Church was constructed in 1857. The bricks were locally made and the mason was Jim

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Veeney, a Black brick mason.¹¹ Black members appear to have also attended the church, but were required to stand at the back of the church during services. Eventually, Dr. Philip Barbour Pendleton granted the Black members of the Gilboa Church one-and-a-half acres for the construction of their own church in October of 1861. The church was called Philippi Christian Church (named for Phillip Pendleton) and is located directly east of the current Cuckoo School building.¹² A later deed places the transfer of land to 1887, after the construction of the first Cuckoo School.¹³

Cuckoo School

The first mention of a school for Black students at Cuckoo was in a letter to the Gordonsville Gazette in 1875 by E. Lee B., in which he states that “the negro school seems to be pretty well attended.”¹⁴ In 1880, Dr. Philip Barbour Pendleton gifted two acres of land to the Board of School Trustees of Cuckoo District for the purpose of building a public school. The deed states that a schoolhouse was already present on the property, very likely the school mentioned in 1875.¹⁵ While direct mentions of the Cuckoo School are relatively rare in early newspapers, an announcement in 1911 states that “Misses Mary Donnally and Jane Garth have accepted position(s) as assistant teachers at the Cuckoo School...”¹⁶ This was certainly the predecessor to the current school building. A survey of Black education in Louisa County, completed in 1949, lists the current Cuckoo School as being built in 1925 on one acre, and featuring two rooms, serving fifty-six students and owned by the county.¹⁷ Later, the Cuckoo School property, having ended up in private ownership, was deeded from Daisy Brice Cosby to the Trustees of the Cuckoo Colored School in 1936 for twenty-five dollars.¹⁸ Separately, a different “Louisa colored school,” supported by the Rosenwald Fund, was announced in 1926 with a total budget of \$5,100.¹⁹

The Louisa County School Board minutes (beginning in 1938, when they first are available, until 1957, after the fire and closure of the school) provide additional detail to the specific history of the Cuckoo School building itself. The Cuckoo School always had two teachers; in 1938 these were B.D. Ellis and Lillie Anderson.²⁰ The school board meetings regularly included representatives from Parent Teacher Associations (PTAs) linked to many different schools for Black and White students, but there is no record of a PTA for the Cuckoo School during this twenty-year period. Another regular occurrence at school board meetings was an accounting of

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billings, and the Cuckoo School is listed periodically for firewood, and a few additional entries, including repairs to the well pump, delivery of benches and other non-specific repairs.²¹ In December of 1950 there is a fifty-dollar payment for “wiring of Cuckoo Negro School;”²² after this, payments for electric service appear in the billings. In June of 1954, there was a list of estimated repair costs for schools; the highest was for two hundred and sixty dollars for the Cuckoo School, though it does not specify the repair type.²³ The April 1955 minutes address the fire at the Cuckoo School and a repair estimate of \$1,500-\$2,500. The board declined to repair the school, and the students were bussed to the Z.C. Morton School (formerly the Louisa Training School).²⁴ The 1950-1955 events occurred during the equalization era in Virginia, when many localities invested substantial sums in schools for Black students in an effort to demonstrate the viability of “separate but equal” school systems.

Oral History²⁵

Before the current Cuckoo School was constructed, a previous log building was on the site, next to the Philippi Church, as recalled by Alice Coleman, who was born in 1910 and attended the predecessor to the current Cuckoo School. Coleman recalled that “the land for the church and school was donated to the blacks by Dr. Pendleton and his family.” Alice Coleman graduated seventh grade from the log Cuckoo School and lived her entire life in Louisa County. She was a rare person who bridged multiple generations and periods of time: as a young child she remembers hearing stories of her enslaved grandfather, Alexander Haynes, arriving from Africa, and yet lived to age 102 when she passed in 2013.²⁶

The Cuckoo School today looks much as it did when it was active in the early 1950s. Alumni from the late 1940s and early 1950s²⁷ remember the exterior being largely the same, except for the currently boarded windows and one window being removed in the middle of each side wall, leaving two. The interior had a sliding door partition on one side of the central chimney which divided the space into two classrooms. The partition was originally a solid wall, but was changed c. 1949. The two small rooms abutting the vestibule were used as cloak rooms, one for the boys, one for the girls.

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The rear interior wall in both classrooms had a large blackboard along the entire wall, with teachers' desks in front; the students faced the blackboard, and the teacher faced the students. The desks were typical single-seat school desks with cast iron feet and sides, a wood seat and wood desktop. They had inkwells (which were not used) and hinged tops with storage below. The "library" was a tall bookcase in the upper grades classroom on the south wall, in the corner. The books were mostly hand-me-downs from White schools. The alumni interviewed did not remember any specific pictures or other wall decorations.

The grades taught at the Cuckoo School were 1st through 7th, with grades 4th through 7th in the west classroom and 1st through 3rd in the east classroom. Older boys started the fire each day, and had some janitorial tasks, including cleaning the erasers and pumping water from the well. The well was located where there is currently a concrete cap. One student remembered a bucket and rope was used before the pump was installed. Water was pumped into a container and brought into the school and kids brought or made their own cups. Wood for the fire consisted of slabs stored under the school along with wood gathered from the woods behind the school. The privies were enclosed wood frame buildings located at the edge of the woods behind the school. Girls used a "snake stick" to bang on the privy to scare away snakes before entering.

Recess was outside for fifteen minutes during the morning and afternoon sessions; there was also a fifteen-minute break for lunch. Students brought bagged lunches, while a few students who lived close by went home for lunch. Games at recess included Hide & Go Seek, jumping rope, baseball, kickball, dodgeball, hopscotch, jacks, marbles and volleyball. When the students played against another school their rivals would yell in a high, taunting voice, "cuckoooo, cuckoooo, cuckoooo." Teachers used a handbell to signal the students to come in from recess. The land around the school looked much as it does now, with no formal plantings, and the woods behind. The ground was more dirt and less grass as a result of all the playing; the only equipment was the volleyball net.

The teachers during this period were Lillie Anderson for the lower grades, and Rev. B.D. Ellis for the upper grades; later Queen Michie Jackson taught the upper grades. Mrs. Alberta Guy was a Black woman, who served as the superintendent of Black schools for Louisa County. When the students misbehaved, discipline included standing in the corner, a hand being paddled, collecting firewood from the woods, writing many times "I will not...", and notes home to parents. Alumni uniformly remember the Cuckoo School fondly with no bad memories. Particularly good memories included May Day, recitals in class, hearing the bell ring for recess and homemade bean and biscuit lunches from home. By the 1950s, most students rode the bus to school. There were also separate school events at Cuckoo including Christmas plays, recitals and concerts. Alumni felt blessed to attend Cuckoo and wished every child could have their formative years in a school and community like Cuckoo.

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Black Education in Louisa County

Early History

Records for early Black education in Louisa County are limited, particularly for pre-twentieth century history, and school records date to 1930. The 1949 survey of Black education in Louisa County used a combination of oral history and reports from Alice M. Fountaine (retired Black teacher) and Selda G. Morton (retired county supervisor) to offer a limited picture of this early period. There were few schools for Black children, and these consisted largely of log buildings, churches and private homes. Equipment and seating were limited or nonexistent. Teachers were generally White, since education (and required training) was so limited for Black residents. Some Black students had to walk distances as long as eight to ten miles to the nearest school, and many younger children were unable to complete the distance. Potentially the first Black school in Louisa County, located in the Louisa Court House District, before the public school system was established, was taught by Julia Shaw, who was described as being from the "New England States."²⁸ A document titled "Proposed African American schools" from the Letters of the Freemen's Bureau at Louisa Court offers further documentation of at least one school for Black students prior to 1870. The document lists eight proposed schools in eight different districts of Louisa County. The Louisa County Court House School is the only one documented as having operated.²⁹ For this school, the Black residents had to provide the teaching facility and the fuel for the fire, and boarding was provided for the teacher in local homes.³⁰ Such arrangements were common during the 1860s-1870s.

In response to the 1870 Virginia constitution's new requirement that counties establish public school systems, Louisa County began to slowly provide support for Black education, on a very limited basis. The first documented county-funded school for Black students was a two-room frame school built at Louisa Court House in 1883. Even by 1916, of the forty-eight schools in the county, only ten were owned by the County School Board.³¹

A February 28, 1885 monthly report by William Jackson Walton, Superintendent for Louisa County Schools, listed several details including the number of schools (broken down by race and district), the total number of pupils for each district and the number and race of teachers. At this time there were four districts: 1. Green Spring, 2. Court House, 3. Cuckoo, 4. Jackson. For all four districts there were 41 White schools and 39 Black schools. However, the White schools served 1,458 students, while the Black schools served 2,641 students, representing a much worse ratio of students to classroom space. Additionally, there were only sixty teachers listed on the report, resulting in an abysmal ration of 68 students per teacher. This was mitigated by the fact that schools had much lower average daily attendance than the total number of students. There

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were more female teachers than male teachers, and only 10% of the teachers were Black.³² With only 48 schools listed in the county in 1916, it is likely that there was substantial consolidation in the late-nineteenth and early twentieth century timeframe. Additionally, so many schools for Black students existing in 1885 implies that, while documenting and managing these schools, the county was not funding them.

Often Black residents were forced to fund and establish their own schools, even in the twentieth century. The Mt. Garland community raised funds from its members, purchased half an acre and built a private two-room secondary school in 1904, which was the first in the county to offer secondary courses: Rhetoric, Algebra, Civil Government, Astronomy and General History. The Mt. Garland School was a “pay school” costing one dollar per month per student. Unlike county-provided schools, Mt. Garland had blackboards, maps, desks and a clock.³³ Public secondary education was established in the county school system in 1921, but only in a “Negro free school” with three teachers, six subjects at the high school level, and, initially, five students. With consolidation for the county ramping up in 1933, the school board finally offered partial funding for a single bus and driver for student transportation.³⁴

Status of Black Louisa County Schools in the Mid-Twentieth Century

The status of general school funding in Louisa County, and the comparative state of Black versus White schools around the time of the closing of the Cuckoo School, particularly as it related to effort towards equalization, was a regular issue at school board meetings during the 1950s. The closing of the Cuckoo School occurred at a pivotal transition point for Louisa County, and the Commonwealth of Virginia in general, as school boards were faced with mandates for equalizing Black schools. A legal notice calling for proposals for a new “...central high school for Negroes of Louisa County...” was posted in November of 1950.³⁵ However, two years later, a new White elementary school was being constructed (Apple Grove) to replace a condemned frame building, while all Black elementary students were still being educated in one-to-two room frame buildings well past the need for replacement. At the same time, the frame buildings of the former Louisa Training School were being used to allow the county to “close two of the 16 small Negro elementary school units now in operation.” These sixteen small school units served 1,178 Black elementary students at the time, while the 1,106 White elementary students were served by five brick or masonry schools.³⁶ The discrepancies between the educational opportunities of Black and White students were a long-term reality that the Louisa County School Board would not address in many cases. In 1956, the school board transferred a fourth-grade teacher from Mineral to Louisa Elementary Schools to address overcrowding, but when informed of overcrowding at

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the Black Louisa and Z.C. Morton Elementary Schools, and low enrollment at other Black schools, no action was taken.³⁷

The 1949 survey of Black education in Louisa County revealed a good deal about the condition and features of Black schools at that time. There were twenty-five school buildings serving Black students: four of them formed the Louisa Training School at Louisa Court House; of the remaining twenty-one, there were two three-room schools, five two-room schools and fourteen one-room schools, all of frame construction. Of these, nine were built before 1930, including Cuckoo School. Two-room buildings, such as Cuckoo, could have one or two classrooms; the second room was sometimes used as a lunch or activity room. A majority of the White schools had indoor plumbing and electricity, versus none of the Black schools having indoor plumbing, and less than half with electricity. All of the Black schools at that time were listed as overcapacity, with enrollment often exceeding thirty-five students per classroom, and most of the actual physical seating in poor condition. None of the Black schools had auditoriums, though some had sliding doors which could be opened between two classrooms to create an assembly room (this was apparently a retrofit at the Cuckoo School). In the Black community in particular, school buildings often served additional uses, including for Sunday School, lodge meeting hall, or other community meetings. Another stark difference between Black and White schools was janitorial service: none of the Black schools had this service, while all but one White school did. And, more broadly, the overall funding for Black schools, the number of teachers, and all other metrics trailed those of White schools in Louisa County.³⁸

Extant Early Black schools in Louisa County

There are only a few surviving former Black schools documented in Louisa County. Located on the west side of Route 700, two miles northeast of the intersection with Route 618, is the former Louisa County Elementary School, also known as the Old School House (VDHR # 054-0413). Oral history relates that this frame-built school opened in 1916 and operated until the 1940s. Survey would be needed to confirm that it is still extant.

Two other documented early Black schools are both Rosenwald schools, unlike the Cuckoo School. The first is the Shady Grove School (VDHR # 054-0099; 012-5041) located at 2940 Three Chopt Road and constructed c. 1925. Listed on the National Register under the Rosenwald Schools in Virginia MPD, this school is a frame construction, “one-teacher type” schoolhouse with a single classroom and in good condition. The second Rosenwald school, was known as the Louisa Training School (VDHR # 254-5008; 012-5041), constructed c. 1926 and located at 121 West Street. This frame construction school, now an apartment building, was a single-story, four-teacher school and remains in good condition.

The African American Schools of Louisa County is a story map created to trace the extant and lost Black schools in the county. The site identifies 26 African American schools that existed at some point. Besides the Cuckoo School (and the three documented schools above), there are at

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least four additional extant historic Black Schools: Spreaded Oak School, Shannon Hill School, Rising Sun School (now a community center), Mt. Garland School (now a church).³⁹

Registration Requirements

The Cuckoo Elementary School meets the registration requirements of Property Type 2: Privately-/Publicly-Built Schools, c. 1902-c. 1931 as developed in the African American Schools in Virginia Multiple Property Document (MPD). Within this category, the purpose-built Cuckoo School is classified as Subtype A, as the building's design did not follow a standardized plan. As with many schools in this group, Cuckoo is a rural school featuring a modest two-room layout and frame construction. Ubiquitous with nearly all of these schools were large windows for light, a chimney for a heating stove and a prominent main entry. This school formerly had sets of three windows, which were altered to their current configuration during the Period of Significance. Electricity in rural Black schools during this period was rare, and the Cuckoo School only received electrical service in 1950, towards the end of its time as a school. Another common element of the daily experience at these schools, and at Cuckoo as well, was the use of privies and the lack of indoor plumbing. A "projecting central bay" or an "entry vestibule" began to be more common in schools starting in this period, and the Cuckoo School is a prominent example of this trend. The second classroom is also more common in this period than in the late-nineteenth century, as is the presence of cloak rooms. Common interior finishes were tongue-and-groove flooring, double-hung wood sash windows and beadboard wall coverings, all seen in the Cuckoo School. The hipped roof with overhanging eaves and standing seam metal cladding were also typical features.

The Cuckoo Elementary School retains most of the elements which identify it so clearly as a Privately-/Publicly-Built Black School, c. 1902-c. 1931. The school retains strong architectural integrity of design, workmanship, materials and floor plan, with only the ceiling and the dividing wall being the areas of notable change. The school is in its original location and the rural highway setting next door to the Philippi Church is unchanged. The distinctive entry, with paired coat closets, is virtually unchanged. The classrooms retain their historic wood floors and double beadboard wall finishes, along with many original windows. The ceiling is a mixture of historic wood paneling and plaster board, as a result of the 1955 fire. The wall dividing the two classrooms is in the same location as the original moveable room divider, but is clad in modern plaster board. With its intact representative features, the Cuckoo Elementary School meets the registration requirements of the MPD under Criterion A in the areas of Ethnic Heritage: African American as well as Education.













The Landfill received 175.20 tons of brush last month. The chart below shows the tonnage of brush received at the landfill each month over the last three years.



1. Labela has submitted the Part "B" plan for the next phase of solid waste disposal (Phase 4) at the Louisa County Sanitary Landfill to the County of Louisa General Services Department for review and will then be submitted to DEQ
2. The Landfill hosted a Household Hazardous Waste Day event on May 3rd, 2025. Two-hundred forty-two (242) vehicles participated in the drive through event to recycle household items that are not accepted on any other day at the Louisa County Sanitary Landfill.
3. The Department submitted to DEQ its SWIA Recycling Rate Report for calendar year 2024, which contained information on materials sent to be recycled from Louisa County's waste stream. The county's **Final Recycle Rate was 27.6%**.
4. New Tracks were procured and are in the process of being installed on the D6K LGP dozer at the landfill.
5. The department held refuse and recycle attendant training for all scalehouse attendants, refuse site attendants, and rolloff drivers over three days from April 22nd to the 24th.
6. The new replacement compactor for Green Springs Refuse and recycling center has been procured and ordered. The compactor has an 8-12-week lead time.
7. Conducted rolloff truck driver interviews and hired full time driver for open position, and temporary driver for worker out on medical leave.




There was slight decrease in foot traffic as more clients are trying to conduct as much of their business over the phone and the next energy assistance program will not begin until June. 






Caseloads for SNAP and Medicaid have begun to level out over the last three years. Although unit vacancies have been filled, worker inexperience is still impacting processing timeliness. Contract benefits workers are providing case processing and additional support currently. Overdue Medicaid renewals are increasing due to staff that are still in the training phase of the work. FOSTER CARE SUMMARY:

Two new youth came into care this month; these youth were receiving In-Home services and before the court for truancy and delinquency which ultimately resulted in them being placed in foster care. We have one case (2 children) pending adoption finalization, we are waiting for the Judge to sign the Final Order. One case is on TPR appeal in Circuit Court; however, the children are in their pre-adoptive placement awaiting permanency.

As of April 2025, there are 20 youth in foster care. Six (6) youth have been in care for less than 12 months, six (6) youth have been in care for more than 12 months, but less than 24 months and two (2) youth have been in care for more than 24 months. Each of these youth have had a face-to-face visit as required by State and foster care policy. One (1) of these youth reside in relative foster homes, five (5) youth are in congregate care, four (4) youth are in pre-adoptive placements, three (3) youth in a non-relative foster home placement and six (6) youth are in the Fostering Futures program.

FOSTER PARENT RECRUITMENT/TRAINING UPDATE:

We have two new local foster families fully trained and approved. One family is open to adoption and is currently participating in visits and open to placement with a youth in our care. The other family will be used initially as respite/short term placements for younger children. We have two additional local families just starting the approval process.





PROJECTS

South Taxiway Construction – The project is progressing well and remains on schedule for completion in late June, weather permitting. A temporary runway displacement is scheduled for May 19, requiring a three-day runway closure to safely perform initial work and allow equipment access near the runway. Once reopened, the runway will be temporarily shortened by 1,315 feet, leaving 2,985 feet available for use. This shortened configuration will remain in place for several weeks. A second three-day closure will be scheduled later to remove equipment and debris and restore the runway to its full length. Approximately 30% of the project has been completed to date.

Taxi Lane Rehabilitation – The contractor is scheduled to seal the asphalt aprons in front of the old T-hangars on May 15 and complete the remaining punch list items. The project is on track to be completed by the end of the month.

Background/History:

Louisa County Water Authority was created in 1968 by the Louisa County Board of Supervisors as a separate legal entity from the County. The Authority is engaged in water and wastewater treatment in Louisa County as requested by the Board of Supervisors. From the beginning there has been an understanding between the Authority and the County that because the County has tasked the Authority with the creation and operation of water and wastewater treatment systems, which for some years could not operate fiscally in the black, some form of County subsidization would be required.

The Northeast Creek Water Treatment Plant currently produces approximately 350,000 – 400,000 gpd, peaking at 520,000 gpd. The treatment process is conventional treatment followed by Nanofiltration.

The Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant and collection system has too few customers to this day and cannot operate without operational funding from the County and Town of Louisa. Louisa County Water Authority is a party to a contract to operate the Regional WWTP. The LRWWTP treats approximately 465,000 gpd.

The Zion Crossroads water system consists of seven (7) potable production wells and thirteen (13) monitoring wells. The well system produces approximately 265,000 gpd. Spring Creek Well #1 is now online. Spring Creek Well #2 will be online as soon as the Virginia Department of Health – Office of Drinking Water inspection, engineering inspection and communication issue is resolved.

The Zion Crossroads Wastewater Treatment Plant and collection system was at first subsidized directly by the County but as more customers were connected the Authority was allowed to keep a portion of the connection fees and did not request O&M funding. During a difficult regulatory period, the Authority was no longer able to meet the Zion Sewer Expenses; to compensate, the Authority was authorized to keep connection fees charged for new connections beginning July 1, 2011. The ZCWWTP treats approximately 250,000 gpd.

The Bowlers Mill raw water system is the exception in that it was built at no cost to the County and operates on a contract with Old Dominion Electric Coop.

The New Bridge System at Lake Anna was taken over on May 1, 2023. Many upgrades have been undertaken to stabilize the wastewater treatment process and improve the potable water quality.

For each amendment request, the NRC proposes to determine that it involves no significant hazards consideration (NSHC). Because each amendment request contains sensitive unclassified non-safeguards information (SUNSI), the NRC is issuing an order imposing procedures to obtain access to SUNSI for contention preparation by persons who file a hearing request or a petition for leave to intervene.

This notice includes notices of license amendments containing SUNSI.

III. Notice of Consideration of Issuance of Amendments to Facility Operating Licenses, Proposed No Significant Hazards Consideration Determination, and Opportunity for a Hearing

The Commission has made a proposed determination that the following license amendment requests involve NSHC. Under the Commission's regulations in 10 CFR 50.92, this means that operation of the facility in accordance with the proposed amendments would not: (1) involve a significant increase in the probability or consequences of an accident previously evaluated, or (2) create the possibility of a new or different kind of accident from any accident previously evaluated, or (3) involve a significant reduction in a margin of safety. The basis for this

proposed determination for each amendment request is shown as follows.

The Commission is seeking public comments on these proposed NSHC determinations. Any comments received within 30 days after the date of publication of this notice will be considered in making any final determination.

Normally, the Commission will not issue the license amendments until the expiration of 60 days after the date of publication of this notice. The Commission may issue any of these license amendments before expiration of the 60-day period provided that its final determination is that the amendments involve NSHC. In addition, the Commission may issue any of these amendments prior to the expiration of the 30-day comment period if circumstances change during the 30-day comment period such that failure to act in a timely way would result, for example, in derating or shutdown of the facility. If the Commission takes action on any of these amendments prior to the expiration of either the comment period or the notice period, it will publish a notice of issuance in the **Federal Register**. If the Commission makes a final NSHC determination for any of these license amendments, any hearing on those amendments will take place after issuance. The Commission expects that the need to take this action will occur very infrequently.

A. Opportunity To Request a Hearing and Petition for Leave To Intervene

Within 60 days after the date of publication of this notice, any person (petitioner) whose interest may be affected by any of these actions may file a request for a hearing and petition for leave to intervene (petition) with respect to that action. Petitions shall be filed in accordance with the Commission's "Agency Rules of Practice and Procedure" in 10 CFR part 2. Interested persons should consult a current copy of 10 CFR 2.309. If a petition is filed, the Commission or a presiding officer will rule on the petition and, if appropriate, a notice of a hearing will be issued.

Petitions must be filed no later than 60 days from the date of publication of this notice in accordance with the filing instructions in the "Electronic Submissions (E-Filing)" section of this document. Petitions and motions for leave to file new or amended contentions that are filed after the deadline will not be entertained absent a determination by the presiding officer that the filing demonstrates good cause by satisfying the three factors in 10 CFR 2.309(c)(1)(i) through (iii).

If a hearing is requested, and the Commission has not made a final determination on the issue of NSHC, the Commission will make a final determination on the issue of NSHC, which will serve to establish when the hearing is held. If the final determination is that the license amendment request involves NSHC, the Commission may issue the amendment and make it immediately effective, notwithstanding the request for a hearing. Any hearing would take place after issuance of the amendment. If the final determination is that the amendment request involves a significant hazards consideration, then any hearing held would take place before the issuance of the amendment unless the Commission finds an imminent danger to the health or safety of the public, in which case it will issue an appropriate order or rule under 10 CFR part 2.

A State, local governmental body, Federally recognized Indian Tribe, or designated agency thereof, may submit a petition to the Commission to participate as a party under 10 CFR 2.309(h) no later than 60 days from the date of publication of this notice. Alternatively, a State, local governmental body, Federally recognized Indian Tribe, or agency thereof may participate as a non-party under 10 CFR 2.315(c).

Order Imposing Procedures for Access to Sensitive Unclassified Non-Safeguards Information for Contention Preparation

A. This Order contains instructions regarding how potential parties to this proceeding may request access to documents containing Sensitive Unclassified Non-Safeguards Information (SUNSI).

B. Within 10 days after publication of this notice of hearing or opportunity for hearing, any potential party who believes access to SUNSI is necessary to respond to this notice may request access to SUNSI. A "potential party" is any person who intends to participate as a party by demonstrating standing and filing an admissible contention under 10 CFR 2.309. Requests for access to SUNSI submitted later than 10 days after publication of this notice will not be considered absent a showing of good cause for the late filing, addressing why the request could not have been filed earlier.

C. The requestor shall submit a letter requesting permission to access SUNSI to the Office of the Secretary, U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission, Washington, DC 20555-0001, Attention: Rulemakings and Adjudications Staff, and provide a copy to the Deputy General Counsel for Licensing, Hearings, and Enforcement, Office of the General Counsel, U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission, Washington, DC 20555-0001. The expedited delivery or courier mailing address for both offices is: U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission, 11555 Rockville Pike, Rockville, Maryland 20852. The email addresses for the Office of the Secretary and the Office of the General Counsel are *Hearing.Docket@nrc.gov* and *RidsOgcMailCenter.Resource@nrc.gov*,

respectively.¹ The request must include the following information:

(1) A description of the licensing action with a citation to this **Federal Register** notice;

(2) The name and address of the potential party and a description of the potential party's particularized interest that could be harmed by the action identified in C.(1); and

(3) The identity of the individual or entity requesting access to SUNSI and the requestor's basis for the need for the information in order to meaningfully participate in this adjudicatory proceeding. In particular, the request must explain why publicly available versions of the information requested would not be sufficient to provide the basis and specificity for a proffered contention.

D. Based on an evaluation of the information submitted under paragraph C, the NRC staff will determine within 10 days of receipt of the request whether:

(1) There is a reasonable basis to believe the requestor is likely to establish standing to participate in this NRC proceeding; and

(2) The requestor has established a legitimate need for access to SUNSI.

E. If the NRC staff determines that the requestor satisfies both D.(1) and D.(2), the NRC staff will notify the requestor in writing that access to SUNSI has been granted. The written notification will contain instructions on how the requestor may obtain copies of the requested documents, and any other conditions that may apply to access to those documents. These conditions may include, but are not limited to, the signing of a draft Non-Disclosure Agreement or Affidavit, or Protective Order² setting forth terms and conditions to prevent the unauthorized or inadvertent disclosure of SUNSI by each individual who will be granted access to SUNSI.

¹ While a request for hearing or petition to intervene in this proceeding must comply with the filing requirements of the NRC's "E-Filing Rule," the initial request to access SUNSI under these procedures should be submitted as described in this paragraph.

² Any motion for Protective Order or draft Non-Disclosure Agreement or Affidavit for SUNSI must be filed with the presiding officer or the Chief Administrative Judge if the presiding officer has not yet been designated, within 30 days of the deadline for the receipt of the written access request.

F. Filing of Contentions. Any contentions in these proceedings that are based upon the information received as a result of the request made for SUNSI must be filed by the requestor no later than 25 days after receipt of (or access to) that information. However, if more than 25 days remain between the requestor's receipt of (or access to) the information and the deadline for filing all other contentions (as established in the notice of hearing or opportunity for hearing), the requestor may file its SUNSI contentions by that later deadline.

G. Review of Denials of Access.

(1) If the request for access to SUNSI is denied by the NRC staff after a determination on standing and requisite need, the NRC staff shall immediately notify the requestor in writing, briefly stating the reason or reasons for the denial.

(2) The requestor may challenge the NRC staff's adverse determination by filing a challenge within 5 days of receipt of that determination with: (a) the presiding officer designated in this proceeding; or (b) if no presiding officer has been appointed, the Chief Administrative Judge, or if this individual is unavailable, another administrative judge, or an Administrative Law Judge with jurisdiction pursuant to 10 CFR 2.318(a); or (c) if another officer has been designated to rule on information access issues, then with that officer.

(3) Further appeals of decisions under this paragraph must be made pursuant to 10 CFR 2.311.

H. Review of Grants of Access. A party other than the requestor may challenge an NRC staff determination granting access to SUNSI whose release would harm that party's interest independent of the proceeding. Such a challenge must be filed within 5 days of the notification by the NRC staff of its grant of access and must be filed with: (a) the presiding officer designated in this proceeding; or (b) if no presiding officer has been appointed, the Chief Administrative Judge, or if this individual is unavailable, another administrative judge, or an Administrative Law Judge with jurisdiction pursuant to 10 CFR 2.318(a); or (c) if another officer has been designated to rule on information access issues, then with that officer.

If challenges to the NRC staff determinations are filed, these procedures give way to the normal process for litigating disputes concerning access to information. Interlocutory review by the Commission on orders ruling on such NRC staff determinations (whether granting or denying access) is governed by 10 CFR 2.311.³

I. The Commission expects that the NRC staff and presiding officers (and any other reviewing officers) will

consider and resolve requests for access to SUNSI, and motions for protective orders, in a timely fashion in order to minimize any unnecessary delays in identifying those petitioners who have standing and who have propounded contentions meeting the specificity and basis requirements in 10 CFR part 2. The attachment to this Order summarizes the general target schedule for processing and resolving requests under these procedures.

II. Notice of Consideration of Issuance of Amendments to Facility Operating Licenses and Combined Licenses and Proposed No Significant Hazards Consideration Determination

For the facility-specific amendment requests shown in this notice, the Commission finds that the licensees' analyses provided, consistent with section 50.91 of title 10 of the *Code of Federal Regulations* (10 CFR) "Notice for public comment; State consultation," are sufficient to support the proposed determinations that these amendment requests involve NSHC. Under the Commission's regulations in 10 CFR 50.92, operation of the facilities in accordance with the proposed amendments would not (1) involve a significant increase in the probability or consequences of an accident previously evaluated; or (2) create the possibility of a new or different kind of accident from any accident previously evaluated; or (3) involve a significant reduction in a margin of safety.

The Commission is seeking public comments on these proposed determinations. Any comments received within 30 days after the date of publication of this notice will be considered in making any final determinations.

Normally, the Commission will not issue the amendments until the expiration of 60 days after the date of publication of this notice. The Commission may issue any of these license amendments before expiration of the 60-day period provided that its final determination is that the amendment involves NSHC. In addition, the Commission may issue any of these amendments prior to the expiration of the 30-day comment period if circumstances change during the 30-day comment period such that failure to act in a timely way would result, for example in derating or shutdown of the facility. If the Commission takes action on any of these amendments prior to the expiration of either the comment period or the notice period, it will publish in the *Federal Register* a notice of issuance. If the Commission makes a final NSHC determination for any of these amendments, any hearing will take place after issuance. The Commission expects that the need to take action on any amendment before 60 days have elapsed will occur very infrequently.

A. Opportunity To Request a Hearing and Petition for Leave To Intervene

Within 60 days after the date of publication of this notice, any person (petitioner) whose interest may be affected by any of these actions may file a request for a hearing and petition for leave to intervene (petition) with respect to that action. Petitions shall be filed in accordance with the Commission's "Agency Rules of Practice and Procedure" in 10 CFR part 2. Interested persons should consult a current copy of 10 CFR 2.309. If a petition is filed, the Commission or a presiding officer will rule on the petition and, if appropriate, a notice of a hearing will be issued.

Petitions must be filed no later than 60 days from the date of publication of this notice in accordance with the filing instructions in the "Electronic Submissions (E-Filing)" section of this document. If a hearing is requested, and the Commission has not made a final determination on the issue of no significant hazards consideration, the Commission will make a final determination on the issue of no significant hazards consideration, which will serve to establish when the hearing is held. If the final determination is that the amendment request involves no significant hazards consideration, the Commission may issue the amendment and make it immediately effective, notwithstanding the request for a hearing. Any hearing would take place after issuance of the amendment. If the final determination is that the amendment request involves a significant hazards consideration, then any hearing held would take place before the issuance of the amendment unless the Commission finds an imminent danger to the health or safety of the public, in which case it will issue an appropriate order or rule under 10 CFR part 2.

A State, local governmental body, Federally recognized Indian Tribe, or designated agency thereof, may submit a petition to the Commission to participate as a party under 10 CFR 2.309(h) no later than 60 days from the date of publication of this notice. Alternatively, a State, local governmental body, Federally recognized Indian Tribe, or agency thereof may participate as a non-party under 10 CFR 2.315(c).

For information about filing a petition and about participation by a person not a party under 10 CFR 2.315, see ADAMS Accession No. ML20340A053 (<https://adamswebsearch2.nrc.gov/webSearch2/main.jsp?AccessionNumber=ML20340A053>) and on the NRC's public website at <https://www.nrc.gov/about-nrc/regulatory/adjudicatory/hearing.html#participate>.

B. Electronic Submissions (E-Filing)

All documents filed in NRC adjudicatory proceedings, including documents filed by an interested State, local governmental body, Federally recognized Indian Tribe, or designated agency thereof that requests to participate under 10 CFR 2.315(c), must be filed in accordance with 10 CFR 2.302. The E-Filing process requires participants to submit and serve all adjudicatory documents over the internet, or in some cases, to mail copies on electronic storage media, unless an exemption permitting an alternative filing method, as further discussed, is granted. Detailed guidance on electronic submissions is located in the "Guidance for Electronic Submissions to the NRC" (ADAMS Accession No. ML13031A056) and on the NRC's public website at <https://www.nrc.gov/site-help/e-submittals.html>.

To comply with the procedural requirements of E-Filing, at least 10 days prior to the filing deadline, the participant should contact the Office of the Secretary by email at Hearing.Docket@nrc.gov, or by telephone at 301-415-1677, to (1) request a digital identification (ID) certificate, which allows the participant (or its counsel or representative) to digitally sign submissions and access the E-Filing system for any proceeding in which it is participating; and (2) advise the Secretary that the participant will be submitting a petition or other adjudicatory document (even in instances in which the participant, or its counsel or representative, already holds an NRC-issued digital ID certificate). Based upon this information, the Secretary will establish an electronic docket for the proceeding if the Secretary has not already established an electronic docket.

After a digital ID certificate is obtained and a docket created, the participant must submit adjudicatory documents in Portable Document Format. A filing is considered complete at the time the document is submitted through the NRC's E-Filing system. To be timely, an electronic filing must be submitted to the E-Filing system no later than 11:59 p.m. ET on the due date. Upon receipt of a transmission, the E-Filing system time-stamps the document and sends the submitter an email confirming receipt of the document. The E-Filing system also distributes an email that provides access to the document to the NRC's Office of the General Counsel and any others who have advised the Office of the Secretary that they wish to participate in the proceeding, so that the filer need not serve the document on those participants separately. Therefore, applicants and other participants (or their counsel or representative) must apply for and receive a digital ID certificate before adjudicatory documents are filed to obtain access to the documents via the E-Filing system.

Participants who believe that they have good cause for not submitting documents electronically must file an exemption request, in accordance with 10 CFR 2.302(g), with their initial paper filing stating why there is good cause for not filing electronically and requesting authorization to continue to submit

documents in paper format. Such filings must be submitted in accordance with 10 CFR 2.302(b)-(d). Participants filing adjudicatory documents in this manner are responsible for serving their documents on all other participants. Participants granted an exemption under 10 CFR 2.302(g)(2) must still meet the electronic formatting requirement in 10 CFR 2.302(g)(1), unless the participant also seeks and is granted an exemption from 10 CFR 2.302(g)(1).

Documents submitted in adjudicatory proceedings will appear in the NRC's electronic hearing docket, which is publicly available at <https://adams.nrc.gov/ehd>, unless excluded pursuant to an order of the presiding officer. If you do not have an NRC-issued digital ID certificate as previously described, click "cancel" when the link requests certificates and you will be automatically directed to the NRC's electronic hearing docket where you will be able to access any publicly available documents in a particular hearing docket. Participants are requested not to include personal privacy information such as social security numbers, home addresses, or personal phone numbers in their filings unless an NRC regulation or other law requires submission of such information. With respect to copyrighted works, except for limited excerpts that serve the purpose of the adjudicatory filings and would constitute a Fair Use application, participants should not include copyrighted materials in their submission.

Quarterly Update on Projects and Activities

January through March 2025



Environmental

Watershed Implementation Plan (WIP): The TJPDC, pursuant to a contract with the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ), collaborates with DEQ and other partners to provide educational resources and technical assistance related to the WIP to the local governments of Albemarle, Charlottesville, Fluvanna, Greene, Louisa and Nelson and regional stakeholders, in an effort to reduce loads of nitrogen, phosphorus, and sediment for the Chesapeake Bay TMDL.

- The TJPDC partnered with the Culpeper Soil and Water Conservation District and Jack's Shop Kitchen to host a rain barrel workshop in March. The workshop reached capacity and provided 22 participants with rain barrels and kits to install them at home.
- TJPDC's first Regional Environmental Coordination meeting in February fostered shared knowledge and partnerships among local staff. Highlights included a Wetlands Watch presentation on the General Assembly and the Community Flood Preparedness Fund, PDC program updates, and a roundtable discussion.
- Staff continues to share information via the "Words from Your Watershed" newsletter and TJPDC website, as well as on the Rivanna River Basin Commission Facebook page, about funding opportunities, best management practices, and upcoming events to support local water quality.

Rivanna River Basin Commission (RRBC): The RRBC, formed in 2007 utilizing state enabling legislation and whose members are Albemarle, Fluvanna and Greene Counties and the City of Charlottesville, recommends programs for the enhancement of the water and natural resources of the Rivanna River and its watershed.

- The Rivanna River Basin Commission has appointed two new representatives, a new Fluvanna County citizen representative, and a new Thomas Jefferson Soil and Water Conservation District representative.
- The TJPDC and the University of Virginia's Batten School are partnering on a summer internship to support the Rivanna River Basin Commission Conference.
- The first Commission Board meeting of the year is scheduled for April 10 with the agenda to include discussion of Watershed Implementation Plan updates and the Fall conference.

Housing

PDC Housing Development Program: In 2021, the TJPDC was awarded \$2 million from Virginia Housing to work with community partners to develop 20 new housing units in the TJPDC region. This was part of \$40 million committed to the 21 Virginia PDCs for new housing initiatives.

- The TJPDC is administering funding for affordable housing development in all member localities with Habitats for Humanity of Greater Charlottesville, Fluvanna, and Piedmont, as well as with Virginia Supportive Housing. In total, \$1.8 million is being leveraged to develop new affordable housing units. TJPDC is closing in on having nearly 30 units being completed, spread across Albemarle, Charlottesville, Fluvanna, Louisa, and Nelson.
- About \$660,000 of PDC Housing Development Program funds have recently been awarded to Habitat for Humanity for Humanity of Greater Charlottesville, Fluvanna Louisa Housing Foundation, and Nelson County Community Development Foundation for additional work to build affordable housing in the region. The funds were split evenly between the subgrantees.
- The grant period for all projects is scheduled to conclude in June, though the TJPDC's contract with Virginia Housing has been extended to allow for completed units to be completed by the end of 2025. The TJPDC anticipates that the entirety of the \$1.8 million in programmatic funds will be expended by June 30, 2025. To date, \$794,912.07 has been spent on units in our region.

Central Virginia Regional Housing Partnership (CVRHP): The TJPDC has been partnering in recent years with all the region's localities, as well as the private and nonprofit sectors, as part of the CVRHP. It serves as an official advisory board to the TJPDC charged with enhancing regional coordination and effectiveness in addressing the unmet housing needs in the region.

- The *2025 Regional Housing Summit: From Crisis to Solution*, was held March 13, 2025, at the Charlottesville Omni. It was a very successful event, with more than 200 in attendance.

Thomas Jefferson HOME Consortium: TJPDC is the administrator for the first regional HOME Investment Partnership Consortium in Virginia. This program provides annual entitlement funding through the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for housing rehabilitation, down-payment assistance, or new construction for qualifying households in all localities in the region.

- On-going homeowner rehabilitation is being provided throughout Fluvanna, Louisa, and Nelson Counties, and the City of Charlottesville, using HOME funds.
- The 2025-26 Annual Action Plan is under development and will be made available in mid-April for public comment. A public hearing will be held on May 1 at the TJPDC Commission meeting.
- Services to those at risk of homelessness are being provided through HOME-ARP funds and disseminated through the Blue Ridge Area Coalition for the Homeless (BRACH) and the Greene County Department of Social Services.

Housing Preservation Grant (HPG): TJPDC annually receives these funds that are an important supplement to the HOME program, providing additional dollars for rehabilitation projects in the counties of Albemarle (eligible rural areas), Fluvanna, Greene, Louisa, and Nelson.

- The TJPDC is leveraging more than \$111,000 through the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Development for FFY24. With the funding, TJPDC expects to serve about 30 low-income homeowners in need of home rehabilitation across rural Albemarle, Fluvanna, Greene, Louisa, and Nelson counties. In FFY23, 52 households were served. Currently, 25 projects are underway using FFY24 HPG funds, totaling \$107,812 in committed funds.

Legislative Services

Legislative Services Program: This long-standing program represents the interests and positions of the region's localities with state policymakers, producing a regional legislative program and advocating for locally requested bills and budget amendments during the annual General Assembly session.

- Legislative Services efforts this past quarter were focused on the “short” (6 ½ weeks) General Assembly session. Activities included lobbying locality-requested bills and budget amendments, as well as other legislation of interest and concern to PDC localities; regular communications with TJPDC legislators and local government officials; and monitoring of budget and legislative

activities. During the session, legislative newsletters were produced on a regular basis and were sent out by email and posted on the TJPDC website. The session adjourned on schedule in late February.

- The Director of Legislative Services also planned and led discussion at the January meeting of the Mayor & Chairs/CAOs meeting and continues to serve as the Executive Director of the Virginia Association of Planning District Commissions.

Local/Regional Support

The TJPDC supports its member localities by leading or managing various programs that benefit an individual locality or several/all localities in the region. This work currently includes the following:

Virginia Telecommunication Initiative (VATI): TJPDC is the grant administrator for the \$287 million VATI (2022) broadband project, in cooperation with partner Firefly Fiber Broadband, which includes rural internet expansion in all TJPDC counties and eight additional counties in central Virginia. On July 24, 2024, TJPDC and Firefly were awarded a \$12.2 million VATI 2024 grant to expand upon this work.

- As of the March, 2025, VATI 2022 progress report, the project had achieved about 1,600 miles of field data collection; 3,624 miles of fiber design; 1,869 miles of make ready construction; seven communications huts set; 1,398 miles of aerial fiber placement; 633 miles of underground fiber placement; 1,587 miles of splicing, and 18,190 passings.
- During the last quarter, TJPDC staff conducted three site visits: two in Madison County (observed completed aerial fiber construction along Graves Mill Road and observed site work underway at the newly set Decapolis Communications Hut); and one in Amherst County (observed completed aerial fiber in the Naola area).
- In early March, TJPDC partnered with Firefly to facilitate the 10th quarterly stakeholders meeting to provide VATI project updates for the 13 county partners.
- The VATI 2024 project will provide broadband access to 5,825 additional unserved locations in 10 counties. As of the March, 2025, VATI 2024 progress report, field data collection and fiber design are underway, and the project has completed 17,600 linear feet of fiber and 126 passings.

Blue Ridge Cigarette Tax Board (BRCTB): TJPDC provides administrative support to the Board, which includes four PDC localities (Albemarle, Charlottesville, Fluvanna, and Greene) and six jurisdictions outside our region.

- At its January meeting, the Board heard a brief overview of the General Assembly session, followed by a more in-depth explanation/discussion of bills related to cigarettes and vaping that are being considered.
- The Board also received various reports from TJPDC staff, including updates on cigarette packs sold and tax revenue for the first half of the fiscal year, and the compliance agent's on-site visits to retail establishments that sell cigarettes within the Board's footprint.

Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS): TJPDC received a US EDA Economic Adjustment Assistance grant to develop a regional CEDS to benefit all TJPDC localities.

- An annual Implementation Committee meeting to review progress and metrics is being scheduled for this summer.

Transportation

Charlottesville-Albemarle MPO (CA-MPO): This federally required entity is responsible for conducting ongoing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning and programming in Charlottesville and the urbanized area of Albemarle County. The MPO considers long-range regional projects and combines

public input, technical data, and agency collaboration to develop forward-thinking solutions.

- In February, CA-MPO staff presented the draft FY26 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) to both the CA-MPO Technical Committee and Policy Board for review. The UPWP outlines the planning activities and funding priorities for the upcoming fiscal year. Following feedback from these committees, the final version is scheduled for adoption in April.
- Michael Fontaine from the Virginia Transportation Research Council shared a presentation with the Policy Board regarding a Smart Intersection project in Albemarle County funded by the Innovation and Technology Transportation Fund (ITTF).
- CA-MPO staff provided the CA-MPO Technical Committee and CA-MPO Policy Board with an update of the Move Safely Blue Ridge project, sharing information about the activities completed.

Regional Transit Partnership (RTP): The RTP serves as an official advisory board, created by Charlottesville, Albemarle, UVA, and JAUNT, to provide recommendations to decision-makers on transit-related matters.

- TJPDC staff is supporting the newly enacted Charlottesville Area Regional Transit Authority (CARTA) by staffing the CARTA Board and committee meetings. Staff submitted a Department of Rail and Public Transportation (DRPT) Technical Assistance grant application to develop an implementation plan for the services outlined in the Regional Transit Vision Plan.
- Staff is participating in the Charlottesville Area Alliance's (CAA) Transportation Working Group to improve transit planning. Partner agencies include the City of Charlottesville, Albemarle County, the Blue Ridge Health District, The Center, and iTHRIV (UVA). The group received an AARP Livable Communities grant to conduct a gap-analysis of transportation needs for seniors in Region 10.
- The RTP continues to hold regular meetings to receive updates from transit providers and subject matter experts and to discuss transit-related matters.

PATH (Partnership for Accessible Transportation Help): PATH is a regional mobility management program, funded by the Department of Rail and Public Transportation and administered by TJPDC, that builds partnerships and assists transportation providers with improving and increasing transportation options for non-drivers. PATH has a website and toll-free number to assist older adults and people who cannot drive to find rides.

- During this quarter, PATH staff attended meetings and events targeted at older adults and people with disabilities to share information about the program and its services. Staff also met with potential partner organizations, gave a presentation for special education students at Fluvanna County High School, and submitted DRPT grant applications that were due in January.
- PATH staff answered calls and assisted older adults and people with disabilities with finding transportation services; the main requests have been for rides to medical appointments.
- PATH staff held workshops at Feeding Green Food Bank in Stanardsville and the Charlottesville Redevelopment and Housing Authority, and is working to organize 11 workshops, presentations and travel training sessions for April and May in all TJPDC jurisdictions.
- PATH staff updated the program's website, launched a digital marketing outreach campaign, and continued distributing printed promotional materials. PATH also has partnered with CAT to promote program activities on CAT's bus fleet.
- PATH completed the development of the Transportation Assistance Fund, supported by a \$5,000 grant from the Twice is Nice Foundation, to assist people who have a dire need for transportation and cannot afford it. The program was launched in March, and the first recipient has already received transportation assistance.

Safe Streets and Roads for All: The region's six member localities supported and pledged local funds toward a required match for the TJPDC's submittal of a multi-jurisdictional application through the federal Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Discretionary Grant Program. TJPDC is implementing the \$857,600

grant award for developing a Comprehensive Safety Action Plan for each locality in the region. The overall project is named “Move Safely Blue Ridge.”

- TJPDC staff conducted the sixth Working Group meeting as a series of one-on-one sessions (one with each jurisdiction) to discuss countermeasures and refine the project scoring framework.
- TJPDC staff hosted a public meeting in Charlottesville to gather community feedback on three proposed safety improvements at the intersections of East High Street, Meade Avenue, and Stewart Street. The input will help determine which concept offers the greatest transportation safety benefits.
- In March, TJPDC’s consultant completed work on the draft Comprehensive Safety Action Plan. The plan, which outlines strategies and priority projects to improve regional transportation safety, was distributed to stakeholders for review and feedback before finalization. This Plan, once adopted, will position the jurisdictions to be able to apply for implementation funding in future SS4A rounds.

Rural Transportation Program: This program started in 1993 as a cooperative forum for transportation planning in the counties of Albemarle (rural areas), Fluvanna, Greene, Louisa, and Nelson. The program provides local planning assistance to the rural governments, maintains the Rural Long-Range Transportation Program, and assists the localities with other transportation needs.

- The Rural Transportation Advisory Committee held its regular meeting in February and approved the FY26 Work Program.
- Staff presented the FY26 Rural Transportation Work Program to the TJPDC Commission at its March meeting.
- Staff met with Fluvanna County staff to discuss Comprehensive Plan update needs.

RideShare: RideShare is a TJPDC program working to reduce traffic congestion and increase mobility throughout the region by providing free carpool matching and vanpool coordination and operating a Guaranteed Ride Home Program to provide free rides home in an emergency. RideShare’s “Rides and Rewards” app can also be used for transit trip planning and has incentives for commuters to share the ride.

- Staff completed the quarterly Park and Ride Inventory.
- Staff submitted the annual grant request to DRPT for FY26.
- The Commuter Assistance Program (CAP) Strategic Plan was adopted by the TJPDC Commission at its March meeting.



Dear Ms. Washington:

Per your conversation with Azhar Mirza, District Engineer, on May 7, 2025, the Town reports they did not receive the letter dated February 5, 2025, regarding potential issues with source capacity at the waterworks in a timely manner. Looking at email documentation, it does not appear that an email copy of the letter was sent on February 5, 2025. In addition, this Office has received similar feedback from other waterworks that mail sent through the postal service has arrived several weeks later. Based on this information, the previous date of February 5, 2025, which established when the Town needed to pause approval on water expansion projects, has been modified to March 7, 2025. March 7, 2025, was the date that email communication between this office and the Town clarified the pause on water expansion projects and is the first communication relating to the pause since the February 5, 2025, letter. Please see the modifications to the May 6, 2025, letter to include this revision in date.

We have received some questions about the pause of waterworks expansion and offer this letter to provide some additional clarifications on what is expected.

1. Projects approved prior to March 7, 2025, may be completed.
2. Existing connections may transfer to new tenants.
3. Modifications to existing connections may be conducted including additions to existing buildings.
4. Routine operations and maintenance activities such as: water meter replacement at existing

connections, water line repairs and replacement with similar sized piping (like for like), and water line flushing to maintain water quality may continue.

5. Construction of private wells to serve new construction are not included in the scope of the February 5, 2025, letter. Those wishing to construct private wells should consult the Town of Mineral for any applicable ordinances and Blue Ridge Health District for private well regulatory requirements. Cross connections between private wells and the municipal water supply must be avoided.
6. The pause on water system expansion does not require any increased water conservation efforts such as water restrictions.
7. The pause on water system expansion does not prohibit the use of municipal water for fire fighting activities.
8. The Town may resume services at existing connections that may have been connected to the water system and using water previously, but were temporarily stopped due to vacancy, billing issues, construction, etc.
9. The Town cannot approve projects after March 7, 2025, which may extend new water lines or otherwise expand the water system and increase water demands until additional source capacity is provided and evaluated. This includes the connection of new services after March 7, 2025.

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT), at the direction of the Louisa County Board of Supervisors, proposes to replace the structurally deficient Hamilton Road (Route 695) Bridge (Structure No. 6057) which carries Route 695/Hamilton Road over the north fork of the South Anna River in Louisa County. Due to the bridge's condition, it was closed to vehicular traffic on 10 February 2025 and remains closed. The current project is solely a state-funded effort utilizing state construction forces and does not include federal funds or a federal permit. Therefore, VDOT is consulting with the Department of Historic Resources (DHR) pursuant to the State Environmental Review Process (SERP) and the terms of the existing *Programmatic Agreement Between the Virginia Departments of Transportation and Historic Resources Concerning Interagency Project Coordination* executed in 1999 (1999 State PA).

Project Description

The VDOT proposes replacing the structural deficient Hamilton Road (Route 695) Bridge with a new superstructure and modern span on the same location. The new bridge will be a modified

Warren Type truss (similar to U.S. Bridge Company fabricated “Cambridge flat truss”; see Attachment A) which gives the closest appearance to the existing bridge available to VDOT. The VDOT will install the new bridge on the existing abutments which will require minor modifications and repairs to accommodate the new bearing devices. Work on the approaches will be minimal and limited to approximately 10 feet on each end and will result in no changes to elevation. There will be no increase in pavement width and the open roadway will remain 12 feet wide. When completed, the new bridge will be able to handle all legal loads to include modern emergency and fire vehicles, farm equipment, and school buses.

Description of Hamilton Road (Route 695) Bridge

The subject bridge (DHR Inventory No. 054-5010) is a one-lane, single-span riveted steel Pratt pony truss bridge with steel I-beam substructure constructed in either 1917 (based on the date of the bridge plans) or 1929 (based on the date provided on the survey form). It measures approximately 83 feet long and 12 feet wide. The I-beams are supported underneath by steel I-beams running perpendicular to the main beam supports as well as steel cross pieces. Supporting the bridge at either end is a poured concrete abutment. The approaches to the bridge are asphalt and the bridge’s deck consists of wooden planks with low wooden rails running along the base of the trusses as well as two metal pipes affixed directly to each truss acting as guardrails (see Attachment B).

Although unremarkable and lacking individual distinction, the structure is within the boundary of the Green Springs Rural Historic District (DHR Inventory No. 054-0111), a property listed in the Virginia Landmarks Register (VLR) and National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) and designated by the National Park Service as a National Historic Landmark (NHL) in 1974. The Hamilton Road (Route 695) Bridge retains its historic rural setting indicative of the district itself. The structure falls within the district’s period of significance and is a remnant of the historic transportation infrastructure that allowed farmers to transport agricultural products to a wider market, which in turn contributed to the overall economy of the Green Springs area. For these reasons the Hamilton Road (Route 695) Bridge, although not specifically mentioned in the 1974 NHL nomination, is considered by VDOT as a contributing resource to the Green Springs Rural Historic District.

Previous Project Consultation

In May 2012, VDOT, on behalf of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), initiated consultation with DHR pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, as amended, and its implementing regulation 36 CFR Part 800, for the replacement of the Hamilton Road (Route 695) Bridge (see DHR Project Review No. 2012-1571). As part of that process, VDOT identified several organizations and individuals with demonstrated interests in the undertaking and invited them to participate as consulting parties. After a series of consulting parties’ meetings on the undertaking (December 2012 and February 2013), with additional coordination among VDOT, DHR, and the consulting parties on the identification of historic properties, project alternatives, and project effect, DHR concurred with VDOT District on 5 December 2013 that the planned bridge replacement would have an adverse effect on the Green

Springs Rural Historic. The adverse effect determination precipitated the development and circulation of four drafts of a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA), an additional in-person meeting, and two conference calls with the consulting parties (23 July 2014; and 21 May 2015 and 28 October 2015, respectively). In the end, however, consensus among the parties could not be reached. In June 2016, VDOT made the decision to forego the proposed bridge replacement and instead reduce the maximum loading for the bridge and continue ongoing maintenance as necessary. Since that time, the structure was closed to traffic from 24 May 2023 to 21 August 2023 and underwent replacement of a deteriorated floor beam in the summer of 2023. However, despite this repair, the bridge's structural deficiencies identified in 2012 remained. This was shown on 10 February 2025 when Hamilton Road (Route 695) Bridge was closed again after an inspection revealed continuing deterioration to several floor beams supporting the deck. The structure remains closed to traffic.

At the request of Louisa County, in the summer of 2024 VDOT initiated a study to evaluate options aimed at addressing the functionality of the Hamilton Road (Route 695) Bridge. The options discussed were guided by the Louisa County Board of Supervisors' resolution of 6 March 2023 requesting VDOT to "undertake a project to address the structure at Hamilton Road over the South Anna River" that will "deliver a structure that can safely convey vehicular traffic including but not limited to emergency vehicles and equipment." The VDOT contracted the Institute for Engagement & Negotiation (IEN) at the University of Virginia to serve as a facilitator for a series of stakeholder meetings on the bridge study. The goal of the meetings was to help stakeholders and VDOT reach an informed decision concerning the future disposition of Hamilton Road (Route 695) Bridge. Three stakeholder meetings were held on 10 July 2024, 30 January 2025, and 26 March 2024. After carefully considering the views and concerns of the stakeholders, and balancing the need for a safe and reliable structure to carry Hamilton Road /Route 695 across the South Anna River with the historical importance of the existing bridge and Green Springs Rural Historic District, VDOT has determined that the most viable solution to meet the County's stated goal in its 6 March 2023 resolution is to replace the Hamilton Road (Route 695) Bridge with a modern structure on its current location.

Identified Stakeholders

Although neither the SERP process nor the State PA contain provisions or requirements for public involvement, due to the demonstrated interest in the treatment of the Hamilton Road (Route 695) Bridge and potential project impacts on the Green Springs Rural Historic District shown by the local community during the Section 106 project consultation in 2012 to 2016, VDOT believes it desirable to engage with the public on the present bridge replacement project. We have used the consulting parties list developed for the previous undertaking to invite organizations and individuals to participate as stakeholders in the current process. During the bridge study process, other individuals not originally included in the earlier consultation expressed interest in participating. As a result, VDOT added them to the list of stakeholders. The identified stakeholders are:

Please note, FHWA and the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, which were both involved in the 2012 to 2016 consultation, are not included in the current list of stakeholders because the current project is state-funded and not subject to review under Section 106.

Area of Potential Effects

Pursuant to the 1999 State PA and consistent with 36 CFR §800.4(a)(1), VDOT has defined the Area of Potential Effects (APE) for the project as the construction footprint required for the removal of the existing bridge and installation of a new structure, as well as the immediate viewshed of the existing Hamilton Road (Route 695) Bridge within the Green Springs Rural Historic District (see Attachment C). This APE is identical to the one which VDOT recommended for the previous federal undertaking and which DHR concurred with on 6 May 2013.

Historic Property Identification

The project APE was first comprehensively surveyed by VDOT consultant Cultural Resources, Inc. (CRI) in March 2013 for the original undertaking to replace Hamilton Road (Route 695) Bridge. The consultant summarized the survey results in a report titled “An Architectural Survey for the Hamilton Road Bridge Replacement, Louisa County, Virginia” (4 April 2013). In the report, CRI documented three historic architectural properties within the APE. These properties were the Green Springs Rural Historic District (DHR No. 054-0111), VDOT Structure No. 6057 (DHR No. 054-5010), and The Glass House, 1611 Hamilton Road (DHR No. 054-5043; see Attachment D). The Green Springs Rural Historic District is listed in the VLR, the NRHP, and designated an NHL. VDOT Structure No. 6057, which is the Hamilton Road (Route 695) Bridge, VDOT determined not to be individually eligible for listing in the VLR/NRHP but is

contributing to the historic district. The VDOT similarly recommended The Glass House as not individually warranting VLR/NRHP listing, however, it does contribute to the Green Springs Rural Historic District. The DHR concurred with these recommendations on 6 May 2013.

Since it has been over five years since the APE has been surveyed, VDOT will contract one of our on-call consultants to conduct an architectural survey of the project APE and to update the documentation and findings of the previous 2013 identification efforts. The VDOT will consult with DHR and the stakeholders on the architectural survey when completed.

As in 2013, a review of DHR's Virginia Cultural Resource Information System (V-CRIS) identified no previously recorded archaeological sites within the project APE. The minimal construction footprint required for this project is characterized by previous ground disturbance associated with construction of the existing road and installation of underground utilities. Therefore, VDOT does not anticipate that any intact, significant archaeological resources will be affected by the bridge replacement and no additional archaeological survey is recommended. An identical recommendation regarding the need for archaeological investigation was made by VDOT in 2013 and DHR agreed with this assessment on 6 May 2013.

The VDOT requests DHR concur with the APE, list of stakeholders, and our recommendation that no additional archaeological survey is warranted by signing the attached signature page.
