Recognition – Recognizing Mr. Scott McClary as the Louisa County Public Schools’ 2025 Wallace L. Tingler MVP of the Year

Resolution presented recognizing Mr. McClary, technology specialist at Louisa County Middle School, for his 13 years of service and dedication to LCPS. Resolution read aloud by Mr. Goodwin and presented by Supervisor Jones.

Recognition – Recognizing Mr. Shane Robertson as the Louisa County Public Schools’ 2025 William G. Thomas Educator of the Year

Resolution recognizing Mr. Robertson, automotive technology teacher at Louisa County High School, for his commitment to hands-on learning, career readiness, and service learning. Resolution read by Mr. Goodwin and presented by Chairman Adams.

PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

Chairman Adams opened the public comment period. With no one wishing to speak, Chairman Adams closed the public comment period.

INFORMATION/DISCUSSION ITEMS

Presentation – Future Revenues (Added Agenda Item)

Supervisors Rachel Jones and Manning Woodward introduced the Future Revenue Plan, the product of a six-month effort by the Revenue Workgroup. Their comments emphasized;

prioritizing citizen benefit, cash funding projects to reduce debt, and a commitment to transparency and public input.

Wanda Colvin presented potential revenue sources, including AWS data centers and modular reactors. Considerations presented included funding Capital Projects over Operating Surplus amounts, reduction in Local Composite Index for Schools (less state revenues), and payoff Virginia Resources Authority Debt upon call dates. Ms. Colvin also talked about potential future uses and recommended allocations, which included:

New Revenue – FY2031 (\$36,481,529)

- Tax Rebates/Reductions (5.0%/\$1,824,076)
- Planned Capital Projects (24.5%/\$8,937,975)
- Road Projects (17.0%/\$6,201,860)
- Recreation Projects (10.0%/\$3,648,153)
- Public Safety/Judicial Facilities (10.0%/\$3,648,153)
- Airport Upgrades (runway extension/terminal building) (3.0%/\$1,094,446)
- Rural Preservation (15.0%/\$5,472,229)
- Water/Sewer/Utilities Infrastructure (9.0%/\$3,283,338)
- HAB Mitigation (4.4%/\$1,605,187)
- Litter Mitigation (0.1%/\$36,482)
- General Fund Reserves (1.0%/\$364,815)
- Long Term Capital Reserves (1.0%/\$364,815)

Board members expressed appreciation for the detailed plan and discussed the importance of fiscal responsibility, public engagement, and adding an “Affordable Housing” allocation in the future.

Chairman Adams proposed a continuation of the workgroup with rotating supervisors every two months through November. There were no objections.

Presentation – Proposal Request from the Planning Commission

Planning Commission requested a countywide build-out analysis. Staff advised this would require third-party assistance and may be better timed after the Comprehensive Plan update.

Board consensus to delay action.

Update – Comprehensive Plan Review

Mr. Coon reported on public outreach survey rollout in July and town halls in September. A draft should be available by January 2026. The Board expressed their support with the district-by-district engagement strategy.

Update – Short Term Rental Compliance

Mr. Coon explained steps taken to remind operators of requirements, reviewed May complaints, and stated that staff will issue letters based on complaints and sheriff's department logs. He noted that STR operators without compliance will eventually require a CUP.

Discussion included STRs at resort developments like Shenandoah Crossings and the staff workload involved.

NEW BUSINESS/ACTION ITEMS

Resolution – Waiving Fishing Permit Fees for Bowler’s Mill Reservoir and Authorizing Reciprocal use by Northeast Creek Reservoir Permit Holders

The Board considered a resolution to waive fishing permit fees for Bowler’s Mill Reservoir and authorize reciprocal fishing access for those holding permits issued by the Louisa County Water Authority for Northeast Creek Reservoir.

Mr. Coon introduced the item, noting that the County currently charges for fishing permits at Bowler’s Mill, while the Water Authority charges a separate fee for access to Northeast Creek. He explained that the County receives relatively low revenue, averaging around \$2,700 annually from Bowler’s Mill fishing permits, and that reciprocal access would reduce confusion for residents and streamline access to both reservoirs. The Water Authority had previously agreed to waive their fees as well.

Supervisor Woodward stated the current system creates unnecessary barriers and suggested that permitting be simplified to allow residents with a permit from either location to fish at both. She noted this change would benefit citizens and eliminate redundant fees for county residents.

Supervisor Williams asked how much the fishing permits cost. Mr. Coon explained that the Water Authority charges \$10 for a permit (with a \$2 discount for seniors), while the County’s Bowler’s Mill permit is priced lower, approximately \$4.50 to \$5.00.

The Board inquired whether the Water Authority would be willing to assume responsibility for issuing permits for both Bowler’s Mill and Northeast Creek.

Supervisor Williams then proposed waiving fishing permit fees altogether for Louisa County residents, emphasizing that county-owned property should not present a financial barrier to citizens.

There was discussion to waive fishing permit fees in full, noting the nominal revenue generated by the current system does not justify the administrative burden or public inconvenience. It was suggested a universal permit be issued at no cost.

The Board discussed whether the waiver should apply only to county residents or to all users. While some members initially discussed limiting the waiver to residents, the consensus formed around waiving the fees entirely, regardless of residency, to simplify enforcement and administration.

Ultimately, the Board reached consensus to waive all fishing permit fees for both Bowler's Mill and Northeast Creek Reservoirs and allow the Water Authority to issue permits for both impoundments.

On the motion of Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Woodward, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board motion to approve the resolution waiving the fishing permit fees and authorizing reciprocal use between the two reservoirs.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS, BOARDS AND STANDING COMMITTEES

Committee Reports

Supervisor Barnes noted a fire-damaged home at Oakley Lane and requested landfill fee and demolition fee waivers for cleanup. Supervisor Barlow moved to approve; seconded by Supervisor Barnes. Motion passed unanimously.

Supervisor McCotter reported on the Lake Anna Advisory Committee: changes to HAB testing, buoy maintenance coordination with the county, and an RFP for phosphorus mitigation.

County Administrator's Report

Mr. Goodwin noted that a listing of upcoming summer concert series events was included in the board packet. She offered to answer any additional questions.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

Ordinance - Approving Proposed Amendments to Chapter 86. Land Development Regulations; Article II. Zoning Ordinance and Maps – Retail Sale of Controlled Substances

Mr. Coon explained that this ordinance amendment is designed to distinguish between legitimate medical facilities and other retail locations that may seek to sell controlled substances. Under the proposed amendment, retail sales of controlled substances would require a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) unless the operation is associated with a DEA-licensed medical provider or pharmacy.

This change aims to:

- Permit by-right medical facilities operating under the authority of a licensed physician or pharmacist.
- Require any establishment not meeting that definition to apply for and obtain a CUP.
- Provide the County a mechanism to regulate future recreational or non-medical controlled substance sales.

Mr. Coon was asked to confirm whether this ordinance would apply retroactively to any current businesses. Mr. Coon responded that he was not aware of any existing business in the County that would be affected, and that all current operators of medical-related retail appear to be operating legally under DEA licensure or a licensed physician.

It was noted that the original version proposed by the Planning Commission had been more restrictive but was adjusted by staff to permit by-right operations for DEA-compliant medical facilities.

Chairman Adams opened the public hearing.

Mr. Brydge Hamilton, Mineral District, came forward to express his support for the ordinance. He commended the County for aligning with evolving state law and ensuring oversight while maintaining access to legitimate healthcare products. He stated he was encouraged to see Louisa taking proactive steps to prepare for the future.

With no one else wishing to speak, Chairman Adams closed the public hearing and brought it back to the Board for discussion.

On the motion of Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. McCotter, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to approve amendments to Chapter 86. Land Development Regulations; Article II. Zoning Ordinance and Maps – Retail Sales of Controlled Substances as presented.

Ordinance - Approving Proposed Amendments to Chapter 86. Land Development Regulations; Article I. General Provision; Article II. Zoning Ordinance and Maps; Article III. Subdivision; Article IV. Supplementary Regulations; and Article V. Signs

Ms. Buckler noted this set of amendments, referred to as “Phase 3” proposed updates across multiple sections of the zoning ordinance. These included:

- Updated definitions
- Adjusted standards for short-term rental (STR) compliance and contact information
- Revised yard regulations and road frontage requirements
- Streamlined plat submission and approval procedures
- Telecommunication ordinance modifications per guidance from Altaris Technology
- New standards for sign lighting, particularly for electronic message boards

Several Supervisors raised concerns about the impact of new brightness standards on existing signage, particularly those located at public schools and churches. They asked whether existing signs, such as those at Louisa County High School and Thomas Jefferson Elementary, would be in compliance.

Ms. Buckler responded that compliance would be determined only if a complaint was received and verified. She stated that a determination could not yet be made because the County does not currently possess the light measurement equipment needed to assess compliance. However, staff has already sent notices to several locations, with four responses received. Some locations have voluntarily reduced brightness.

Supervisor Barnes emphasized his opposition to retroactive enforcement, particularly on signs funded through community fundraising efforts. He emphasized the need for either grandfathering or exemptions, particularly for schools.

Supervisor McCotter shared that he had received complaints from residents about EMS signs at both churches and businesses. He noted that many signs installed in the last three years have built-in brightness controls and are already being voluntarily adjusted.

Mr. Goodwin suggested proceeding with the regulation as written while monitoring outcomes and adjusting if necessary. He emphasized the importance of community cooperation and noted the Board could revisit the policy if enforcement proved overly burdensome or punitive.

Significant discussion focused on Subdivision Platting Standards and VDOT's role in reviewing subdivision plats and road designs.

Supervisor Barlow raised several pointed concerns, referencing his past experiences and frustrations with VDOT's lack of responsiveness when it came to plat reviews. He specifically noted concerns with VDOT not signing off on subdivision plats, especially for small subdivisions with private entrances and entrance permits are only reviewed at the time of construction, meaning VDOT provides no meaningful feedback during the subdivision platting process. He stated that developers are left in limbo when they submit plats to VDOT, wait 45+ days, and then receive either non-actionable comments or suggestions that are disconnected from on-site realities.

Ms. Buckler responded by clarifying the updated procedure. She explained that a previous ordinance amendment had indeed removed the requirement for VDOT approval on subdivision plats, however, following feedback from a developer and discussions with VDOT, the County learned that VDOT would still review road plans and issue concurrence letters, not formal approvals. She noted as a result, the language in the ordinance was revised to allow for plan review and certification by either a licensed Virginia engineer or surveyor, which could include VDOT staff if the developer intended to submit the road for eventual state maintenance.

Supervisor Barlow emphasized his concern was not about road plans, but about VDOT's non-participation in simple entrance reviews for private roads. He noted that VDOT won't even walk the site until an entrance permit is obtained. He further noted they refuse to review or approve anything in advance. He recalled previous County language that required a simple note on plats advising buyers that entrance permits must be obtained independently from VDOT. That note eliminated the need for VDOT plat review altogether—and he preferred that approach.

After extended discussion, the Board acknowledged that the language in Section 86-567 might still be confusing or contradictory to that prior Board intent. They suggested the issue could be addressed through revised language or by revisiting procedural practices with Community Development.

Ultimately, Supervisor Barlow stated he could not support the ordinance as written, as it did not adequately resolve his concerns. He and other Board members agreed that the current approach might still allow unnecessary delays or unclear expectations for developers.

The Board discussed the addition of performance agreements for subdivisions with internal roads not accepted by VDOT. This amendment formalizes the maintenance obligations of developers or HOAs and protects future residents from being stranded with deteriorating roads.

The Board highlighted that the interim private road maintenance agreement contained an unusual clause requiring residents to remove snow within specific timeframes. They pointed out the clause appeared unrealistic and unenforceable, with specific stipulations such as clearing roads within 6 hours after a snowfall exceeding 6 inches.

Ms. Buckler and Mr. Coon explained that the language originated from a previously adopted ordinance and was tied to historical concerns about emergency and school bus access. However, they agreed that enforcement of such a provision would be impractical and burdensome.

Supervisor Barlow recalled that the clause had been inserted years ago as a response to roads that were never accepted into the state system but required use by residents and first responders.

After further discussion, the Board directed staff to remove Section #6 from the agreement and to bring forward a recommendation to the Planning Commission to strike the clause from the zoning ordinance itself.

Ms. Buckler explained that the new performance agreement goes beyond the existing road maintenance agreement by adding enforceability and accountability for subdivision developers. She noted the older maintenance agreements were often informal and did not include enforceable obligations. The performance agreement requires developers of internal subdivision roads to commit in writing to maintain the roads, unless and until VDOT accepts them. It includes timeframes, clarity on snow removal obligations, and consequences for non-performance.

Supervisors recalled instances in their district where roads were poorly maintained after the developer walked away. They gave the example of residents getting stuck with \$20,000 bills to upgrade the road because the developer skipped out. He asked if the new agreement gives the County or homeowners any kind of recourse.

Mr. Coon said that is the intent. He explained how it spells out the obligations for the developer upfront and if they fail to comply, the County can pursue remedies laid out in the agreement. It also ensures that future buyers know what they're signing up for when they buy a home on a private road.

Ms. Buckler also noted the performance agreement includes language that anticipates the transfer of responsibility to an HOA, but only if one exists and accepts that role. It still starts with the developer, and the County verifies compliance before any shift occurs.

Chairman Adams opened the public hearing. With no one wishing to speak, Chairman Adams closed the public hearing and brought it back to the Board for discussion.

As the conversation became more detailed, Chairman Adams summarized the options for moving forward:

- Table the entire ordinance to allow staff time to revise language and revisit VDOT-related provisions
- Adopt the ordinance without Sections 5 and 6, then address those sections later
- Move forward with clarifying administrative practices outside of the ordinance

Mr. Barnes moved to table the entire Phase 3 ordinance until the Board had time to fully review Sections 5 and 6 and staff could revisit process language with VDOT. Mr. Williams seconded. Motion passed by majority vote, with Mr. McCotter voting against.

ADJOURNMENT

On the motion of Mr. Barnes, seconded by Mr. Williams, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to adjourn the June 2, 2025, meeting at 7:43 p.m.

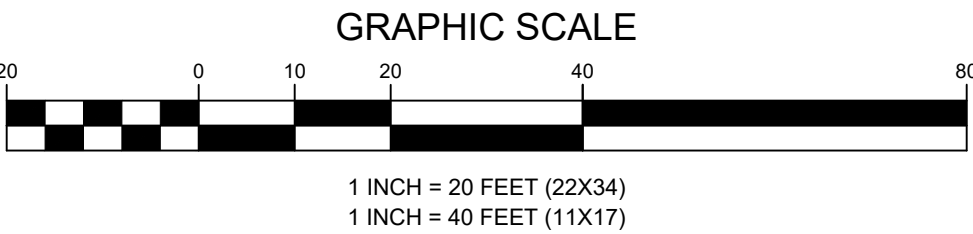

DEED OF EASEMENT

DEED OF EASEMENT made this ____ day of _____, 20____, by and between the County of Louisa (hereinafter called "Grantor") with an address of P O Box 160, Louisa, Virginia 23093, and SummitIG, LLC, a Virginia limited liability company, its successors, assigns, lessees, licensees and agents (hereinafter called "Grantee") with an address of 22365 Broderick Drive, Suite 250, Sterling, Virginia 20166.

For and in consideration of One Dollar (\$1.00) cash in hand paid unto Grantor and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, Grantor hereby grants and conveys unto Grantee, its successors, assigns, lessees, licensees and agents, a perpetual easement and right of way (the "Easement") to install, access, construct, operate, repair, maintain, test, inspect, improve, relocate, alter, replace and remove an underground communications system, and such uses compatible therewith and ancillary thereto, consisting of such buried cables, wires, conduits, innerducts, vaults, manholes, handholes, and related above-ground and under-ground facilities, including but not limited to, posts, terminals, handholes, manholes, location markers, cabinets, shelters, equipment housings, and other appurtenances (the "Facilities"), as Grantee may from time to time require, over, across, under, through and upon Grantor's real property being located in the County of Louisa, Commonwealth of Virginia, more particularly identified as Tax Map Parcel I.D. No. 59-109B (the "Property"), as depicted on a plat identified as Exhibit A, attached hereto and made a part hereof (the "Easement Area").

Said Easement is hereby granted and conveyed unto Grantee together with the following rights and covenants:

1. Grantee shall have the right of ingress and egress over, upon and across the Property, including drives, lanes, ways or private roads, to and from the Facilities and Easement Area, including the right to temporarily open and close fences, to exercise the rights herein granted.
2. Grantee shall have the right to trim, cut and remove trees, shrubbery, undergrowth and other obstructions within the Easement Area, which interfere with or threaten the efficient and safe operation, construction or maintenance of the Facilities or impede access thereto.
3. The Facilities constructed hereunder shall be owned by and shall remain the property of Grantee. Grantee shall have the right to inspect, rebuild, access, relocate, repair, replace, and remove the Facilities, or any part thereof, within the Easement Area, and may make such changes, alterations, substitutions, additions in and to, or extensions of the Facilities as it deems advisable without the prior consent of the Grantor.

4. During periods of construction, repair, and maintenance of the Facilities, Grantee shall have the temporary right to use Grantor's property lying adjacent to the Easement Area. Grantee, after constructing, inspecting or maintaining the Facilities, will restore the Property impacted by such work, as nearly as reasonably practicable, to the condition of the Property existing immediately prior to commencement of its work to construct, inspect or maintain the Facilities. Grantor shall not interfere with the Facilities.

5. NOTICE TO LANDOWNER: You are conveying rights to a public service corporation. A public service corporation may have the right to obtain some or all of these rights through exercise of eminent domain. To the extent that any of the rights being conveyed are not subject to eminent domain, you have the right to choose not to convey those rights and you could not be compelled to do so. You have the right to negotiate compensation for any rights that you are voluntarily conveying.

6. Grantor covenants that it is seized of the Property and has the right and authority to convey the Easement and the rights and privileges herein conveyed to Grantee, that no consent is required, and that Grantee, its successors, assigns, licensees, lessees and agents shall have quiet and peaceable possession, use and enjoyment of the aforesaid Easement, rights and privileges hereby granted. This Easement shall be a covenant running with the land, shall be a burden upon the Property and shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of the parties and their successors, assigns, licensees, lessees and agents.

7. Grantee shall have the right to assign, lease, license, sell or transfer all or any part of the rights granted pursuant to this Deed of Easement, including without limitation, the Easement and the Facilities to third parties, and such third parties shall have the right, in like manner and to like extent as provided herein, to operate their Facilities on the Property as provided herein.

8. Grantor represents and warrants that, as of the date of this Agreement, the Property is not encumbered by any mortgages or deeds of trust.

9. This instrument may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which together shall constitute one instrument.

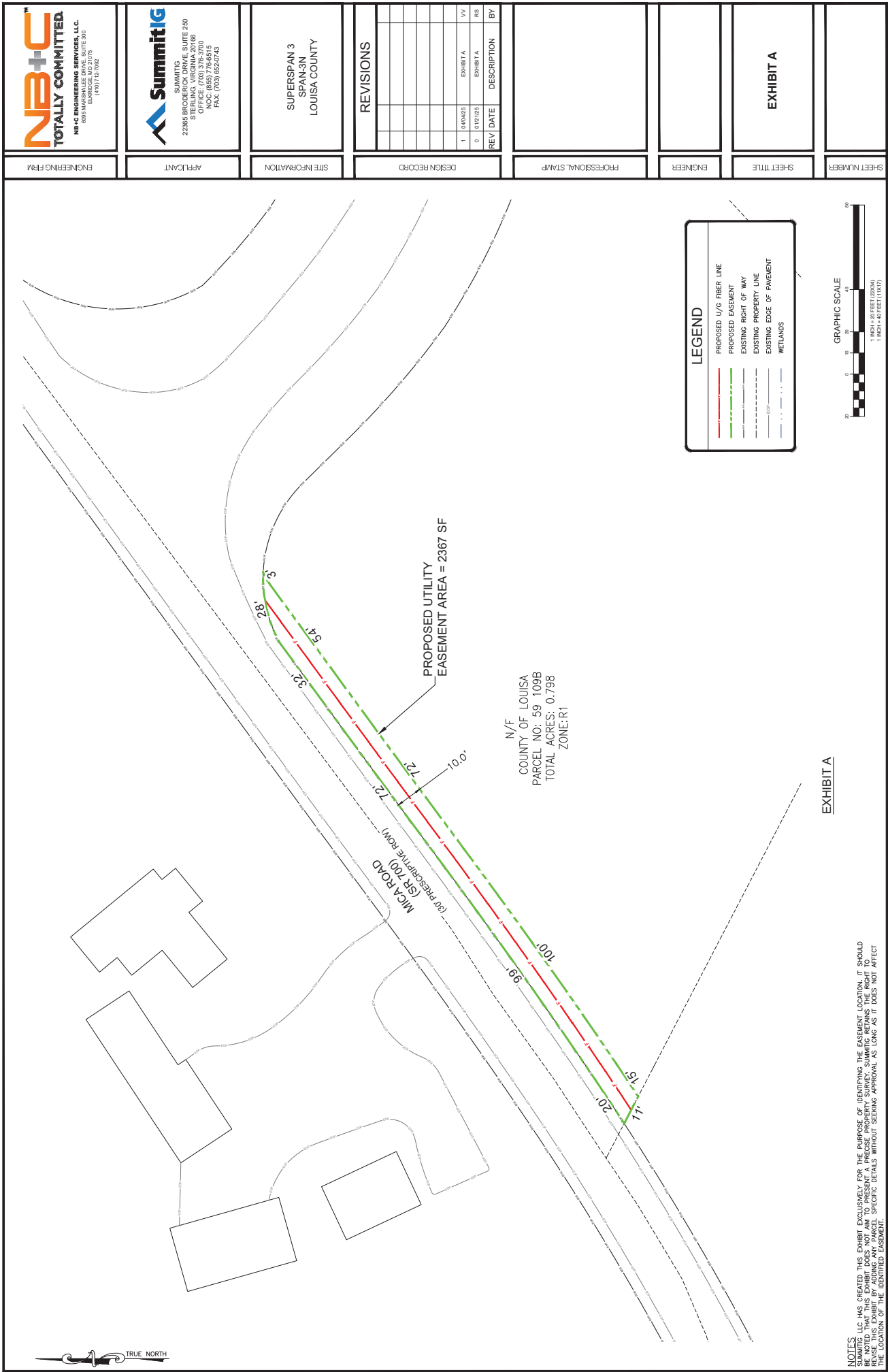

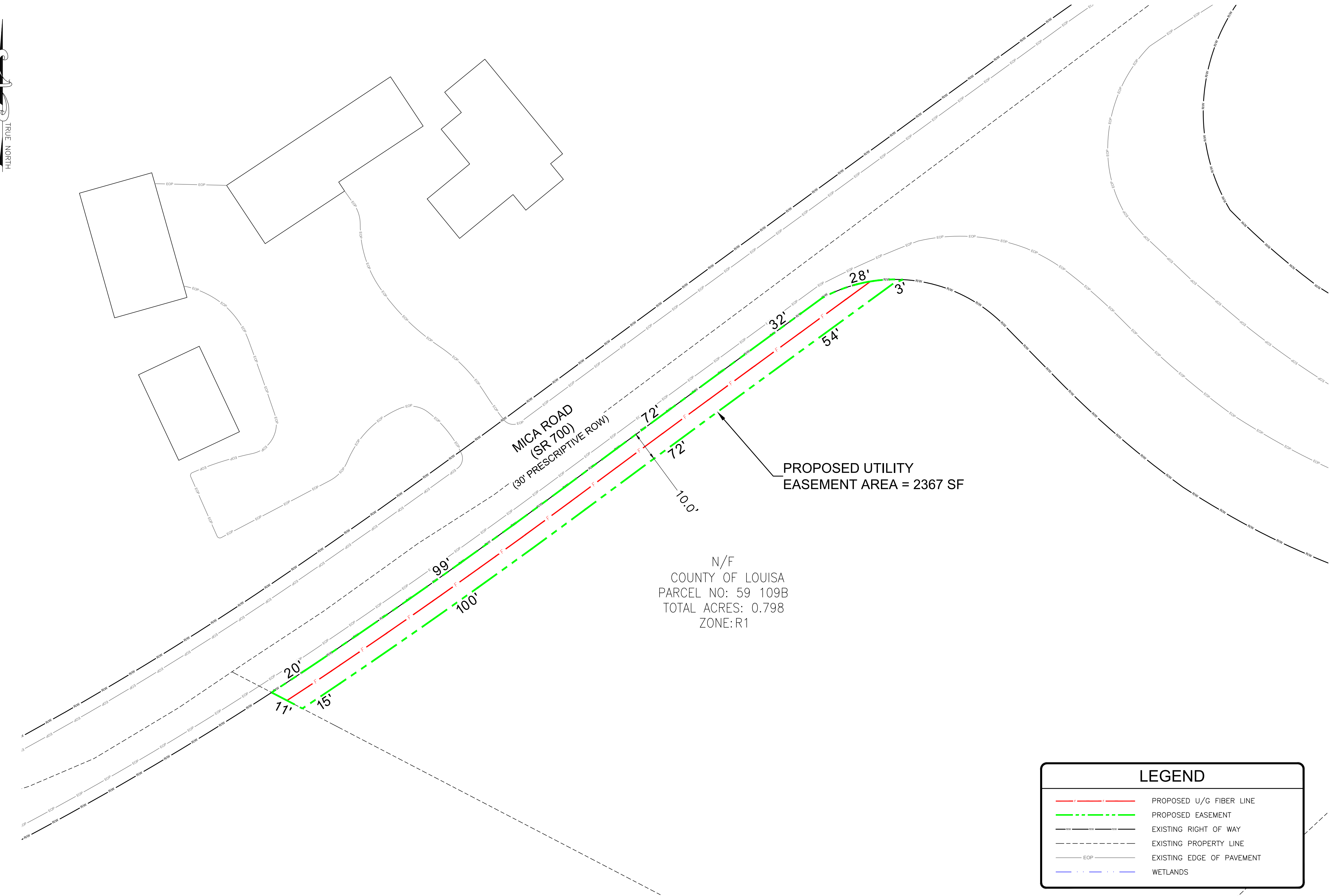

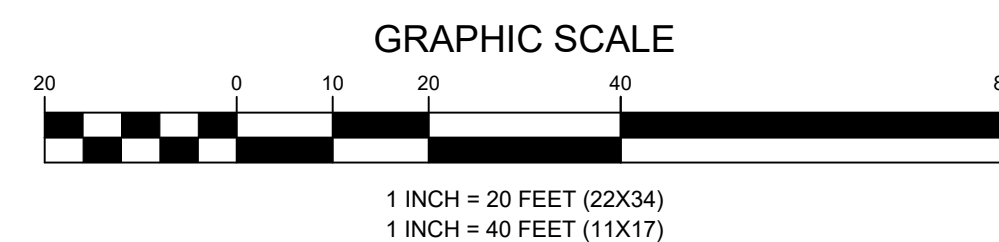

I. Background:

a. Project Description

The County of Louisa invites qualified offerors to submit proposals for providing comprehensive child day care services at the Betty Queen Intergenerational Center for up to fifty two (52) children, infants to five (5) years old.

b. Need

The County received Community Improvement Grant #00-16 to partially fund a 5,600 square foot wing of the Center. Of this space, 2,400 square feet, plus an outdoor play area, has been determined to be used for a children's daycare. This project is to follow all pertinent Federal and State laws, regulations, and procedures, including the Community Improvement Grant Contract Negotiation Guide and the Community Improvement Grant Management Manual, as amended.

c. Project Budget

No funds for this project come from the County.

d. Request for Proposals

On May 15, 2025, the County issued a Request for Proposals inviting qualified child day care companies to submit proposals for Child Day Care Services.

Louisa County will select the firm(s) who they determine most closely satisfies the needs of the County. There is no requirement for acceptance of the lowest cost of service offered, and specific requirements may be waived or amended at the discretion of the County.

- e. The Selection Committee consisted of Sam Massie, Purchasing Coordinator and James Smith, Parks, Recreation, & Tourism Director.

II. Current Situation:

a. Proposals/Bids

One (1) proposal was received by the closing date of June 5, 2025. Proposals were received from the following child day care companies:

- Abundant Love Learning Center

b. Selected Firm

After careful consideration, the selection committee determined Abundant Love Child Development Center would be the most qualified child day care to meet the needs of the County.

c. Justification

Abundant Love Learning Center is the current vendor, and has a great level of familiarity with current families. They also expressed knowledge of the Department of Social Services and Department of Human Services and their related requirements. They recently purchased the property for their other location, which speaks to their financial stability.

III. Recommendation

The recommendation is for the Board of Supervisors to approve and award a contract for Abundant Love Learning Center for a period of one year beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2026, with the option to renew for four additional one year terms.

Subject: FW: Affordable Housing Trust

What is the goal of an Affordable Housing Trust?

Overall, an AHT's main goal is to increase accessible and affordable housing opportunities for individuals and families with low- and moderate-incomes by providing a flexible funding mechanism. Local trusts — unlike federal, state, or certain private funds — can be tailored to maximize flexibility in tackling urgent local requirements, free from stringent regulations. Eligible uses often include:

- Re/development of affordable rental housing
- Property acquisition for affordable housing
- Owner-occupied home repair
- Down payment assistance
- Rent and/or utility assistance

How are Affordable Housing Trusts structured?

Affordable Housing Trusts are typically established through legislation or regulatory ordinances at the municipal or state level. This legal foundation defines the trust's authority, governance structure, funding mechanisms, and operational scope.

Trust funds often have a governing board or committee responsible for decision-making and oversight. Members of this board may include representatives from local government, housing advocacy groups, community organizations, and sometimes residents directly affected by affordable housing issues. They may prioritize projects based on community needs assessments and affordability criteria. In many cases, government entities often partner with qualified tenant coalitions, developers, nonprofit organizations, or housing agencies to deploy funding rather than self-developing.

How are Affordable Housing Trusts funded?

Affordable Housing Trusts primarily get their funding from public revenue streams, including:

- **Developer fees** are assessed to developers for new construction to account for their impact on their surroundings.
- **Documentation recordation fees** are applied per page for documents processed and archived in the public record.
- **Real estate transfer fees** are charges imposed at the point of a real estate transfer relative to the value of property. Certain municipalities apply real estate transfer fees to transactions above a specified price threshold. These fees may be imposed on either the seller or buyer, or both.

- **Short-term rental taxes and fees** are often collected on hotel lodging or through short-term rental platforms such as Airbnb and VRBO.
- **Local property taxes** are levied on the value of real property such as land and buildings, both commercial and residential, or personal property, such as business equipment and noncommercial motor vehicles.
- **Recurring appropriations** are regular contributions made from a state/local government's general fund to a dedicated AHT.

Community Land Trusts

What are Community Land Trusts?

Community Land Trusts (CLTs) are nonprofit organizations established with a mission to provide permanent affordable housing opportunities, mostly with an emphasis on homeownership. These entities can do this by acquiring property and rehabbing existing or constructing new structures, offering them at affordable price points, and then finding an income-eligible homebuyer. The buyer purchases the structure from the CLT, while the CLT maintains ownership of the land, providing a (typically 99-year) renewable lease of the land to the buyer. The homebuyer is responsible for paying the mortgage on the house and for upkeep of both the land and structure.

The homeowner then has the right to exclusive use of the property, to bequeath the property and lease, and to sell the house. When the homeowner wishes to sell the home, the CLT sets a new sales price, typically using a formula that balances affordability for buyers and wealth building for the previous owner. Thus, when the home is sold, the previous owner is able to recoup their original investment plus some of the appreciated value of the home.

LOUISA COUNTY AIRPORT ADVISORY COMMISSION

BYLAWS

Article I – Name

The name of this organization shall be the **Louisa County Airport Advisory Commission** (hereinafter referred to as "the Commission").

Article II – Purpose

The Commission serves in an **advisory role** to the Louisa County Board of Supervisors (“the Board”) and the Airport Manager. It exists to support the ongoing development, public engagement, and strategic value of the Louisa County Airport.

The Commission shall:

- Generate ideas and make recommendations that support the growth and improvement of the airport.
- Assist in hosting and planning aviation-related events that promote public interest, aviation education, and tourism.
- Help align airport-related initiatives with Louisa County’s broader goals for economic development and community growth.
- Encourage partnerships with schools, businesses, civic organizations, and aviation stakeholders.

The Commission shall have no formal authority over airport operations, budgeting, or decision-making.

Article III – Membership

Section 1. Composition

The Commission shall consist of five [5] members, appointed by the Louisa County Board of Supervisors.

Section 2. Eligibility

Members should demonstrate interest or experience in aviation, community development, business, or public service. Residency within Louisa County is preferred but not required.

Section 3. Term of Service

Commission members shall serve an initial term of three (3) years. Members may be reappointed at the discretion of the Board.

Section 4. Resignation and Vacancies

Any member may resign at any time by submitting written notice to the Chair. In the event of a vacancy, a replacement shall be appointed through a collaborative process involving the Airport Manager and the Board..

Article IV – Officers

Section 1. Officers

The officers of the Commission shall include a Chair and Vice-Chair.

Section 2. Election and Term

Officers shall be elected annually by a majority vote of Commission members and shall serve for a one-year term.

Section 3. Duties

- **Chair:** Presides at meetings, sets the agenda in collaboration with the Airport Manager, and serves as the primary liaison with County officials.
- **Vice-Chair:** Assumes the duties of the Chair in their absence.

Article V – Meetings

Section 1. Regular Meetings

The Commission shall meet at least quarterly. Additional meetings may be called by the Chair or at the request of the Airport Manager.

Section 2. Quorum

A majority of current Commission members shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. Public Access

Meetings shall be open to the public, and notices shall be posted in accordance with County guidelines.

Article VI – Collaboration and Events

The Commission shall:

- Partner with the Airport Manager to identify and support aviation-related events such as fly-ins, educational outreach, airport tours, and community open houses.
- Recommend opportunities that enhance the airport's visibility and its contribution to local tourism and business recruitment.
- Support initiatives that strengthen the airport's role in the County's long-term economic development strategy.

Article VII – Amendments

The Board of Supervisors may amend these bylaws. The Commission may also propose amendments by majority vote. Amendments are subject to approval by the Louisa County Board of Supervisors.

RE: Proposed Amendments to Chapter 86. Land Development Regulations (Phase III)

Purpose:

The following amendments to Chapter 86. Land Development Regulations are proposed to improve the efficiency of the Zoning and Subdivision Ordinances and to better serve the community. These amendments remove conflicts and outdated provisions; improving consistency in the organization of regulations, including additional standards to ensure safety in the application of the regulations; and providing language within the subdivision regulations regarding review, road standards, completion of improvements and responsibility for completion.

1. Definitions Amendment

Amendments are proposed amend, delete or add definitions as follows:

- Add *Ambient lighting or illumination*
- Delete *Buffering and screening yard*
- Add *Candela*
- Amend *Division, parcel*
- Amend *Emergency shelter*
- Add *Foot candle*
- Add *Nit*
- Add *Off-grid construction (residential)*
- Amend *Private lane*
- Amend *Religious assembly*
- Amend *Residue or residual parcel or lot*
- Delete *Sign, electric message*
- Add *Sign, electronic message*
- Amend *Subdivision*
- Amend *Vegetative Buffer*

2. Update Short Term Rental of a Dwelling

To correct scrivener's error of omission for the RD District and correct the effective date of the ordinance.

3. Yard Regulations in the A-1 and A-2 Zoning Districts, including Growth Area Overlay Districts (GAOD)

Removed the increased setback in the Agricultural zoning districts for “other permitted structures greater than 50 feet in height.”

4. Minimum Frontage Requirements

For consistency throughout the ordinances, included language to provide reference to the code section where the minimum road frontage requirement is located.

5. Subdivision Plat Requirements and Standards

Language has been amended to provide plan review by licensed engineers or surveyors; to require submittal of a performance agreement for new subdivisions that would require completion of improvements within a set time; clarifies the County has no obligation to install or maintain any improvements (roads) that are part of a subdivision development, based on the language in the State Code of Virginia; permits a maximum of two (2) private lanes be used in a subdivision development; and, requires that security/guarantee posted with the County is renewed and reviewed every twenty-four (24) months to ensure sufficient funds remain in place for project completion.

6. Plat Approvals

New language has been added that requires the private road disclosure language be included on all subdivisions plats; that will indicate the roads are private until such time as they have been accepted into the State secondary road system. Plats will also be required to include a note that an entrance permit must be obtained from VDOT for access to each lot on the subdivision plat.

7. Lake Anna Shoreline Use and Design Standards

Clarifies that dry hydrants and restroom facilities will only be required in common areas if required by the Department of Fire/EMS and Virginia Department of Health, respectively. If these facilities are required, the location will be coordinated with Dominion Energy.

8. Telecommunications Regulations

Clarifies that generators may be located on site; but only operated during power outages or testing; and includes language recommended by the County’s Telecommunication Consultant that requires additional structural reports and analysis be submitted for co-location applications to confirm structure safety and integrity of existing towers.

8. Sign Regulations

Language has been added to strengthen the current language as it pertains to electronic message (or illuminated) signs. This strengthens the ability to determine is a sign is a safety hazard; includes illumination standards; detailed specifications for electronic message signs.

10. Interim Road Maintenance Agreement and Performance Agreement

The current Interim Road Maintenance Agreement and a draft Subdivision Performance Agreement have been included for review and discussion purposes.

Conclusion:

The amendments proposed at this time reflect the County's commitment to ensuring that the Zoning Code remains responsive to current needs, reduces unnecessary regulation, institutes additional safety standards, and aligns with State and Federal laws. The proposed changes will enhance clarity, efficiency, and fairness in the administration of the Zoning Code while supporting the County's long-term planning goals.

AMENDMENTS – (Phase III)

Chapter 86 - LAND DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS

The purpose of these amendments is to resolve any discrepancies that currently exist; update sections based on amendments to the State Code of Virginia; amend sections to provide clarification, and consistent application of regulations. **THESE REGULATIONS APPLY THROUGHOUT ALL OF LOUISA COUNTY**; and are proposed pursuant to Va. Code §§ 15.2-2285 and 15.2-2286.

ARTICLE I. GENERAL PROVISIONS

DIVISION 2. DEFINITIONS

Sec. 86-13. Definitions

***Ambient lighting or illumination* - the general illumination or light that is naturally present in an environment, providing overall brightness and visibility, as opposed to specific, focused light sources.**

***Candela* - is the base unit of luminous intensity in the International System of Units.**

~~*Buffering or screening yard.* A yard or designated area with certain screening, like opaque fencing or landscaping materials, required between abutting zoning districts of differing use intensities or between adjoining land uses for decreasing the adverse impact of differing uses and districts.~~

Division, parcel. To divide a parent parcel into no more than two additional parts for the purpose of transfer of ownership or building development. Lots shall be divided from parent tracts, or the residue parcel that remains after a prior one-lot division, so long as such residue parcel has five or more acres ~~and a~~ or minimum of ~~4~~300 feet of existing state road frontage. For clarity, it is the specific intent of this provision to allow a maximum of three total lots, including the residual parcel, to be created from any parent parcel by division, if any. Divisions are not subject to the provisions set forth in the subdivision ordinance except for subsection [86-567](#) (11), private lanes. However, similar to the requirements of [section 86-587](#), a lot created by division shall be required to include provisions for the dedication of right-of-way when the property is adjacent to a state road that is less than 50 feet in width; provided that, this requirement does not apply to a residual portion of the parent tract that is five or more acres ~~and~~ or has a minimum of 4300 feet of existing state road frontage.

Note – The “4” is stricken in the amendment language above; the “strike through” line goes through the crossline of the “4.”

***Foot candle* – a measurement of light intensity.**

***Nit* - a unit of measurement for the brightness of a display, specifically its luminance, and are equivalent to one candela per square meter (cd/m²).**

***Off-grid construction (residential)* - the practice of building a home without connecting to public utilities. Off-grid homes are self-sufficient and generate their own power and water,**

with no physical connection or relationship with any sort of utility service, and all the power it uses comes from an energy source that it generates and stores on its own. Off-grid construction shall be considered as conventionally constructed dwellings, in compliance with all requirements of the USBC.

Private lane. An access way for residential use ~~in divisions of~~ **serving** less than three lots ~~only or for agricultural use~~ which is within a 50-foot deeded right-of-way or easement and built to the design standards in [section 86-567](#)(11). Private lanes are restricted as to the hours of access by the public or by those who may use it and are maintained by the property owners association or by the lot or parcel owners who are afforded access to their lots or parcels by such private lanes.

Residue or residual parcel or lot. The remaining portion of a parent parcel or tract after division or subdivision takes place. Residue parcels are five or more acres ~~and~~ **or** have a minimum of **4300** feet of existing state road frontage. For determining if the splitting of land is either a division or subdivision, a residue parcel shall not be counted as a lot in agricultural or residential districts when the residue parcel is at least five acres **or** has at least **4300** feet of existing state road frontage. ~~, and has a VDOT approved access.~~ Residue parcels in commercial and industrial districts shall not be counted as a lot for determining if the splitting of land is either a division or subdivision, regardless of the lot size, existing state road frontage, or existing access.

Note – The “4” is stricken in the amendment language above; the “strike through” line goes through the crossline of the “4.”

Sign, electric message. A sign on which the copy can be altered by electric, electro-mechanical or electronic means.

***Sign, electronic message -.* A sign or portion of a sign that is capable of displaying words, symbols, figures, or images that can be electronically changed by remote or automatic means. Electronic message signs permitted prior to the effective date of this ordinance **(insert date)** must comply with all lighting/illumination standards, contained in Article V. Signs, within twelve months. All other sign features, including zoning district location, size and height shall be considered legally non-conforming.**

Subdivision. Splitting any tract, parcel or lot of land into two or more parts, other than a division of a parent parcel or a family subdivision, for the purpose of transfer of ownership or building development. ~~Subdivided lots shall generally be less than five acres and front on less than 400 feet of existing state road frontage, but subdivided lots shall front on a road that meet VDOT specifications.~~ Consistent with this definition, any new road constructed to serve more than two lots shall be constructed to VDOT standards for subdivision roads. The residue tract after subdividing is not counted as a lot for the purposes of this definition. Subdivided parcels may not be further subdivided or divided unless the remaining division rights are noted on a recorded plat or in conformance with existing ordinances.

Vegetative buffer. A vegetative buffer for screening purposes shall include a mix of trees and shrubs with varying heights and densities to provide maximum screening throughout the year, considering factors like evergreen vs. deciduous foliage. Wooden privacy fences and berms may be used to supplement existing and proposed plantings at the discretion of the zoning administrator; who may choose to forward the proposal to the planning commission for a recommendation. **The terms buffering or screening yard, or any variation of these terms, as used throughout the ordinance in conjunction with *vegetative buffers* shall include a yard or designated area with certain screening, like opaque fencing or landscaping materials, required between abutting zoning districts of differing use intensities or between adjoining land uses for decreasing the adverse impact of differing uses and districts. Vegetative buffers meeting the above criteria shall be shown on a plan prepared by a certified landscape architect; surveyor; engineer; or other qualified licensed professional.**

DIVISION 4. ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS

Sec. 86-114. - Short-term rental of a dwelling.

NOTE – To correct scrivener’s error of omission for the RD District and correct the effective date of the ordinance.

For only this section GAOD means all properties zoned residential limited (R-1); ~~and~~ residential general (R-2); **and resort development (RD)** located within the boundaries of a designated growth area as shown on the 2040 Comprehensive Plan. The following are requirements for use in R-1 GAOD; ~~and R-2 GAOD; and the RD zoning districts:~~

- (1) Owners of dwellings used for short-term rental shall provide contact information for the owner and/or any authorized property manager to Louisa County and the dwelling's subdivision governing body, if one exists.
- (2) The owner shall provide the current Louisa County Code chapters relative to noise (51) and solid waste (62) as well as the definitions for special occasion facilities and gatherings as part of short-term rental contracts.
- (3) Owner must notify tenants that events, rentals, special occasion facilities and related uses are prohibited, except with valid conditional use permit according to Louisa County Code.
- (4) Owner must comply with all Virginia Department of Health regulations.
- (5) The dwelling must comply with all applicable state building code and safety regulations.
- (6) Owners unable to meet all of the above requirements shall be prohibited from operating a short-term rental of a dwelling without obtaining a conditional use permit from Louisa County Board of Supervisors.
- (7) A violation under this section shall be enforced as provided in section 86-11 and section 86-11.1.
- (8) The effective date of this Code shall be January 1, ~~2024~~**2025**.

DIVISION 6. ZONING DISTRICTS AND LAND USES

NOTE – To remove additional setback requirements in the agricultural districts for structures taller than 50 feet.

Sec. 86-142. - Yard regulations.

In the agricultural (A-1) district, the yard regulations shall be:

~~(3) — Any other permitted structure that exceeds 50 feet in height shall be no closer than 40 feet from any side or rear property line.~~

Sec. 86-159. - Yard regulations.

In the agricultural (A-2) district, the yard regulations shall be:

(3) Accessory structures shall be no closer than ten feet to any side or rear property line. ~~Any other permitted structure that exceeds 50 feet in height shall be no closer than 25 feet from any side or rear property line.~~

Sec. 86-344. - Yard regulations. (GAOD)

In the agricultural (A-1) district, the yard regulations shall be:

~~(3) — Any other permitted structure that exceeds 50 feet in height shall be no closer than 50 feet from any side or rear property line.~~

Sec. 86-364. - Yard regulations. (GAOD)

In the agricultural (A-2) district, the yard regulations shall be:

~~(3) — Any other permitted structure that exceeds 50 feet in height shall be no closer than 50 feet from any side or rear property line.~~

NOTE – For consistency throughout the ordinances, including language where the minimum road frontage requirements can be found. Currently included in Sec. 86-174. - Frontage; minimum lot width for the R-1 zoning district.

Sec. 86-198. - Frontage; minimum lot width.

In the residential general district (R-2), the minimum lot width at the building setback line shall be 125 feet; for two-family dwellings it shall be 175 feet.

The minimum road frontage shall be as provided in Section 86-118 of this chapter.

Sec. 86-381. - Frontage; minimum lot width.

In the residential limited district (R-1) within the growth area overlay district, the minimum lot width at the building setback lines shall be 150 feet.

The minimum road frontage shall be as provided in Section 86-118 of this chapter.

Sec. 86-397. - Frontage; minimum lot width.

In the residential general district (R-2) within the growth area overlay district, the minimum lot width at the building setback line shall be 125 feet; for two-family or multifamily dwellings it shall be 175 feet. Minimum lot width for attached two-family dwellings and townhouses where separate lots are assigned shall be 20 feet for interior units and 30 feet for end units.

The minimum road frontage shall be as provided in Section 86-118 of this chapter.

ARTICLE III. SUBDIVISION

DIVISION 3. PLAT REQUIREMENTS AND STANDARDS

NOTE - Language has been amended to provide plan review by licensed engineers or surveyors; provisions added that require the private road disclosure language be included on all subdivisions plats. This note will indicate the roads are private until such time as they have been accepted into the State secondary road system. Require a note on plats that an entrance permit must be obtained from VDOT for access to each lot on the subdivision plat. Performance agreements will be required; along with review of security every twenty-four (24) months.

Sec. 86-567. - Streets and alleys.

All streets in the proposed subdivision shall be designed and constructed in accordance with the following minimum requirements by the subdivider at no cost to the locality. All street names shall be approved by the agent or agent's representative. The developer shall be responsible for all costs associated with the manufacturing and installation of signs for said streets, roads or lanes (public or private).

(4) *Construction requirements.* All construction of streets, private roads or streets must comply with the requirements and specifications of the state department of transportation for subdivision streets, which may be found on file at the office of the resident engineer of the county department of highways. This includes all new internal subdivision streets for agricultural; residential; commercial; industrial; resort developments; or planned unit developments.

a. All review for road plans and profiles; and inspections during road construction shall be conducted by a ~~third-party review firm chosen by the county, or on the county's contracted list of engineering firms.~~ **an engineer or surveyor licensed in the State of Virginia.**

d. All costs associated with the ~~third-party~~ plan review; inspections; and road certification will be the responsibility of the developer.

e. Upon the completion of construction, as-built plans will be required from the developer's engineer as part of the final certification ~~by the third-party engineer.~~

g. Prior to approval of any subdivision plats where a new internal subdivision street is proposed for acceptance into the state road system, **a performance agreement and** interim road maintenance agreement shall be provided for approval by the county attorney and must be recorded with the final subdivision plat. The **performance agreement and** interim road maintenance agreement must identify the responsible party for construction and continuing maintenance of the road improvements; and include the language found in subsections **86-567(10)g.** and h. The **performance agreement and** interim road maintenance agreement shall remain in effect until the roads have been accepted by the Virginia Department of Transportation/Commonwealth Transportation Board.

h. Prior to approval of any subdivision plats where a new internal subdivision street is proposed to remain private after approval of a private road waiver by the planning commission, **a performance agreement and** road maintenance agreement shall be provided for approval by the county attorney and must be recorded with the final subdivision plat. The **performance agreement and** road maintenance agreement must identify the responsible party for construction

and continuing maintenance of the road improvements; and include the language found in subsections [86-567](#)(10)g. and h.

i. Dedication of rights-of-way for streets, alleys or other public use as shown on an approved and recorded subdivision plat; and the County's obligation to install or maintain any such facility, shall be as provided for in State Code Section 15.2-2265.

Nothing in this section shall obligate the locality to install or maintain such facilities unless otherwise agreed to by the locality.

(10) *Private road design.*

g. All plats, contracts of sale and deeds for a lot in a subdivision in which private lanes, roads or streets are allowed shall contain language which clearly discloses to a potential purchaser the following minimum information:

5. It shall be the responsibility of the developer for the initial construction and subsequent maintenance, if any, of the roads, ~~the responsibility of the buyer, and the ownership of the roads.~~ If the roads are to be maintained by a property owners association or other legal entity, the disclosure must clearly ~~so~~ inform the buyer.

(11) *Private lanes.* Lots accessed by roads in subdivisions of less than three lots can be accessed by private lanes which do not meet VDOT subdivision street standards and are approved by the agent. Lots in subdivisions of less than three lots must have the minimum frontage requirements on a deeded access way or easement which is owned by the property owners association or developer or by the lot or parcel owners who are afforded access to their lots or parcels by such private lanes of such subdivision. **A maximum of two (2) separate private lanes shall be permitted in a subdivision.** All plats describing lots served by private lanes shall include language found in [section 86-587](#) (10) g.1-3. Subdivision roads serving less than three lots shall be approved by the zoning administrator and shall meet the following minimum standards:

(Road Minimum Standards chart intentionally excluded.)

Sec. 86-576. - Security.

Before any subdivision plat will be finally approved by the agent, the subdivider shall, in lieu of construction, furnish security to be approved by the governing body and county attorney, in an amount calculated by the agent to secure the required improvements in a workmanlike manner, and in accordance with specifications and construction schedules established or approved by the appropriate engineer, which security shall be payable to and held by the governing body. Such security may be posted in the form of a surety bond, letter of credit or cash escrow.

Letters of credit will only be accepted from financial institutions approved to do business in the Commonwealth of Virginia.

In order to ensure that sufficient security is maintained throughout project construction and completion; the security/guarantee shall renew every twenty-four (24) months for the duration of the project. *The guarantee shall increase or decrease by an amount equal to the most recent quarterly Construction Cost Index published by Engineering News-Record.*

This ensures that the estimated costs escalate as the Construction Cost Index escalates so that the security amount reflects the most current cost to perform the improvements.

In the case of default, the county shall follow the last policy adopted by the Board of Supervisors for liquidation of any security/guarantee held by the County. In no event, however, shall the county be bound to supplement the performance guarantee funds with other county funds in order to complete the improvements.

For Information Purposes Only

Staff's research into processes used by other localities found the recommended process from Greene County that uses information from a publication to determine the increase or decrease in the surety amount. **This process was recommended by the Planning Commission.**

DIVISION 5. PLAT APPROVAL

Sec. 86-614. - Final plats.

(15) All plats, contracts of sale and deeds for a lot in a subdivision with a new internal subdivision street shall contain the following language which clearly discloses to a potential purchaser the following minimum information:

- 1. Until such time as all new internal streets shown on this plat have been accepted into the State secondary road system, the lots are served by a privately maintained road and will not be maintained by the state or county. Any costs necessary to bring the road to a condition qualifying it for acceptance as part of the secondary system of state highways shall be sustained from resources other than those administered by the state department of transportation and the county or any other public agency.**
- 2. School bus service is not provided by the county along private roads, lanes or streets;**
- 3. United States postal service is not provided along private roads, lanes or streets;**
- 4. The expense and responsibility for maintaining the roads within the development will be paid for and borne by the lot owners and/or developer, as the case may be; and**
- 5. It shall be the responsibility of the developer for the initial construction and subsequent maintenance, if any, of the roads. If the roads are maintained by a property owners association or other legal entity, the disclosure must clearly inform the buyer.**

(16) All plats must contain a note stating, "Entrance locations to each lot shown on this subdivision plat; require approval by the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) at the time the entrance permit is applied for through VDOT."



ARTICLE IV. – SUPPLEMENTARY REGULATIONS

DIVISION 4. - LAKE ANNA SHORELINE USE AND DESIGN STANDARDS

NOTE - Clarifies that dry hydrants and restroom facilities will only be required in common areas if required by the Department of Fire/EMS and Virginia Department of Health, respectively. If these facilities are required, the location will be coordinated with Dominion Energy.

Sec. 86-655. - Statement of intent; policy guidance.

(Only the third paragraph included for amendment purposes)

The standards set forth in this division are mandatory unless a waiver is granted. Applications that meet all of the ordinance standards will be reviewed administratively by staff. Applications should include site plans that meet the criteria included in the "Lake Anna Shoreline Site Plan Requirements Checklist," to include an approval statement by Dominion Energy for proposed development on Dominion Energy's shoreland or shoreline. Where criteria is not clearly illustrated on a site plan, a survey shall be required to demonstrate compliance with the ordinance, or in order to process special exception requests. If a waiver is requested, then the application will be reviewed by staff (per section 86-22– 119 of this chapter). If a waiver is denied, applicants may resubmit a revised waiver at any time or appeal staff's decision to the board of supervisors.

Sec. 86-656. - Use and design standards

(b) Safe Navigation

(7) *Common areas.*

- a. Common area ramps shall be constructed of reinforced concrete with a minimum thickness of six inches and shall be a minimum distance of 75 feet from designated swimming areas.
- b. **If determined to be necessary or required by the Department of Fire/EMS during site plan review, common areas ~~are~~ may be required to have a dry hydrant in a location to be determined on the site plan in coordination with Community Development; Department of Fire/EMS; and Dominion Energy.**
- c. Common area boat ramps shall be placed or positioned to minimize wave interference from boats passing nearby through high concentration navigation choke points as determined by the county during site plan review (i.e., cove entrances, narrow channels, sharp bends, bridges, etc.).

(c) Neighbor policies

(4) *Common areas.*

- a. **If determined to be necessary or required by the Virginia Department of Health, restroom facilities ~~are~~ may be required in areas with structures for ~~persons~~ people or watercraft for common areas with **twenty-five (25)** or more lots. **and shall be placed in a location to be determined on the site plan in coordination with Community****

Development; the Virginia Department of Health; and Dominion Energy. Restrooms are not allowed within the Dominion Energy easement without their approval.

- b. All structures in a common area shall maintain a 100-foot side setback from residential and agricultural zoning districts (not part of the subdivision), and a 50-foot side setback from resort development, commercial, and industrial zoning districts.
- c. **Twenty-five (25)** foot vegetative buffer between the common area and adjoining property owners (not part of the subdivision) shall be required. Applicants shall provide a copy of the TIA-222 Inspection Report to resolve or validate assumptions pertaining to the maintenance or physical condition of a tower or antenna support structure.**
- 3. Any Assumptions or Standards Conditions asserted by the PE relative to the accuracy of the information or data provided to the PE which is utilized in completing the SA shall be resolved, validated, or confirmed to be correct.**

(d) Applicants for modifications to existing antenna colocations or new antenna colocations must provide a Structural Mount Analysis (MA) which demonstrates that the antenna mount has the structural integrity to support the proposed antenna loads as outlined in the current version of “ANSI/TIA-222 Structural Standard for Antenna Supporting Structures and Antennas”.

The Structural Analysis shall comply with the following criteria:

- 1. The MA Report shall be sealed and signed by a Professional Engineer (PE), licensed in the Commonwealth of Virginia.**
- 2. Any “Assumptions” or “Standard Conditions” asserted by the PE relative to the maintenance or physical condition of the antenna mount shall be resolved, validated, or confirmed in writing to be correct.**
- 3. New antenna mounts or modifications to existing antenna mounts will require a Post Modification Inspection (PMI) or Post Installation Inspection (PII) to certify that the modifications or installations were completed as specified in the engineering drawings and plans.**
- 4. The PMI or PII report must be sealed and signed by a PE, licensed in the Commonwealth of Virginia and a copy of the report must be provided to the County prior to close out of the Permit.**

(e) Applicants for structural upgrades or modifications to existing towers or antenna support structures shall provide a PMI as outlined in ANSI/TIA-222 Structural Standard for Antenna Supporting Structures and Antennas, to certify that the modifications were completed as specified in the engineering drawings and plans. The PMI shall comply with the following criteria:

- 1. The PMI or PII report must be sealed and signed by a PE, licensed in the Commonwealth of Virginia**
- 2. A copy of the report must be provided to the County prior to closing out the Permit.**

***The above amendments were recommended by the Planning Commission. After the public hearing, the consultant provided additional amendment language for consideration.* See Exhibit B**

Sec. 86-674. - Development standards for freestanding antenna support structures greater than one hundred feet in height.

(i) *Sounds.* No unusual sound emissions such as alarms, bells, buzzers, or the like are permitted. Generators shall not be ~~stored or~~ operated at WCFs except during power outages **or during testing.**

ARTICLE V. SIGNS

NOTE - Language has been added to strengthen the current language as it pertains illuminated signs; and new provisions for electronic message signs. New definitions are proposed in Section 86-13.

Sec. 86-683. - General provisions.

(a) *Prohibited signs.* The following types of signs are prohibited in all zoning districts:

- (1) Flashing signs; which include any illuminated sign on which the artificial light or lights are not constant in intensity and color at all times shall be prohibited. This prohibition shall not apply to signs **solely** giving public service information such as time, date, temperature, weather or similar information.; ~~or message board, when such sign does not constitute a public safety or traffic hazard. (i.e. electric message sign for schools, churches, etc.)~~
- (2) Any sign that obscures or interferes with a sign displayed by public authority for the purpose of giving traffic instructions or direction or other public information.
- (3) Any sign that uses the word "stop" or "danger" or otherwise presents or implies the need or requirement to stop or caution or the existence of danger, or which is a copy or imitation, or which for any reason is likely to be confused with any sign displayed by public authority.
- (4) Any sign that obstructs any window, door, fire escape, stairway, ladder, or opening intended to provide light, air, ingress or egress for any building, as required by law.
- ~~(5) Any sign or illumination that causes any direct glare into or upon any building other than the building to which the sign may be related.~~
- ~~(6)~~(5) Any sign that violates any provision of any law of the state relative to outdoor advertising.
- ~~(7)~~(6) Political signs posted on county property.
- ~~(8)~~(7) Signs that violate state or federal laws, whether or not identified in this ordinance as being permitted.
- (8) Signs determined by officials to create safety hazard. A sign whose characteristics, including but not limited to its construction, design, or location, are determined by a fire official, the building official, or a law enforcement officer, to create a safety hazard.**

(c) ~~Location;~~ *Illumination.* No sign shall be located or illuminated in such a manner as to cause a traffic hazard. Where a permit is required, the permit shall not be issued until the location

and illumination, if any, of the sign are approved by the zoning administrator. ~~All lighting must comply with dark sky lighting standards.~~

- (1) Signs may be illuminated, either internally or externally, as permitted by this ordinance, provided that the illumination is fully shielded and directed at the sign and not in a manner as to cause a traffic hazard.**
- (2) All lighting must comply with dark sky lighting standards.**
- (3) No light from any illuminated sign shall cause direct glare on any adjoining piece of property, right-of-way, or building other than the building to which the sign applies.**

(l) *Signs, Electronic Message* are allowed in all commercial, industrial, resort development, and planned unit development districts. In reviewing the application, the Zoning Administrator or Designee, who may choose to send such application to the Board of Supervisors for review as a Special Exception (86-68), if staff determines that the proposed sign requires additional review and consideration. The Zoning Administrator may consider the following factors as well as other appropriate land use considerations; and may request the applicant submit additional information responsive to these items:

- (1) Proportion of the sign face to be used for the electronic message.**
- (2) Use of colors in the electronic message.**
- (3) Relationship to nearby residences.**
- (4) Distance to other electronic message boards.**
- (5) Speed limit of roadway and road classification.**
- (6) General character of area.**
- (7) Landscaping incorporated into sign package.**

A. The following standards are required:

(1) General requirements

- a. Electronic message signs may not exceed thirty-two (32) square feet in overall size and the electronic display may not be more than 50% of this area; and eight (8) feet in height from normal ground level.**
- b. Building and electrical permits and inspections are required.**

- c. **Sign cannot be located in a manner which could cause confusion with or from traffic signals.**
- d. **Messages must be static for twenty (20) seconds or longer; with no animation, videos, flashing, or scrolling text.**
- e. **Only one (1) electronic message sign is allowed per parcel.**

(2) Display

- a. **Messages cannot change less than once every twenty (20) seconds.**
- b. **Transitions between messages can only be a black screen or an immediate transition; no flashing, fading, or scrolling text is permitted.**
- c. **In the event of a malfunction, the display must be changed to a dark screen.**
- d. **If the sign is two-sided, both sides must display the same message.**

(3) Brightness controls

- a. **All electronic message signs shall be equipped with a photocell, sensor or other device that automatically dims the sign based on ambient light and limits the brightness to a maximum of 100 NITS between sunset and sunrise, as set by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), or that can be adjusted to comply with the maximum NIT level.**
- b. **Lighting cannot shine directly toward any dwelling.**
- c. **Prior to sign permit approval, the applicant must provide certification showing compliance with brightness controls, herein noted.**

Sec. 86-689. - Waivers.

Notwithstanding the other regulations of this chapter, a waiver may be approved by staff (per section 86-119 of this chapter) to the regulations of this article that are specific to the number of allowed signs, the maximum sign area, and the sign height. In no circumstances shall a waiver increase the number, size, or height of a sign(s) by more than 100 percent of the ordinance standard. A waiver may only be granted if it can be demonstrated that the proposed standards, with conditions, better ensure that the intent of this ordinance, as specified in section 86-682 ~~86-246~~, will be met. Requests for a waiver to this article shall accompany a master plan of the entire development showing all proposed business signs. **Standards for electronic message signs are not subject to increase through the waiver process. All requests for a variation to the standards for an electronic message sign would require a Special Exception in accordance with Section 86-68, granted by the Board of Supervisors.**

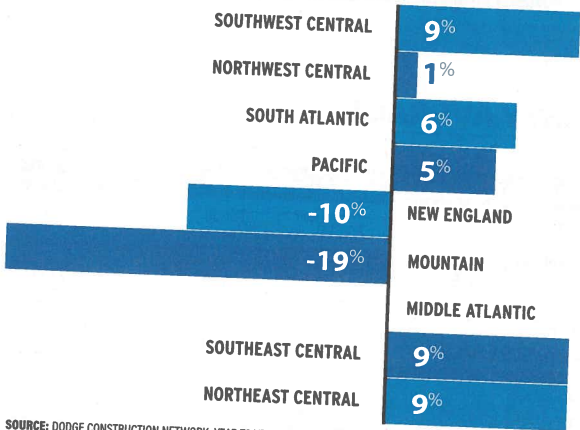

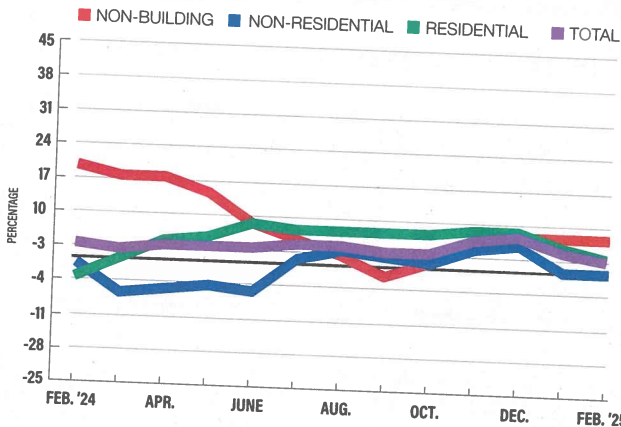
Construction Starts Regional growth trends vs. national trends

4. The PMI or PII report must be sealed and signed by a PE, licensed in the Commonwealth of Virginia and a copy of the report must be provided to the County prior to close out of the Permit.

Digital Billboard Lighting Measurement

How to Measure Nits (Candelas/Square Meter) in the Field– Without Sign Company Knowledge

Overview and basic notes on luminance meters

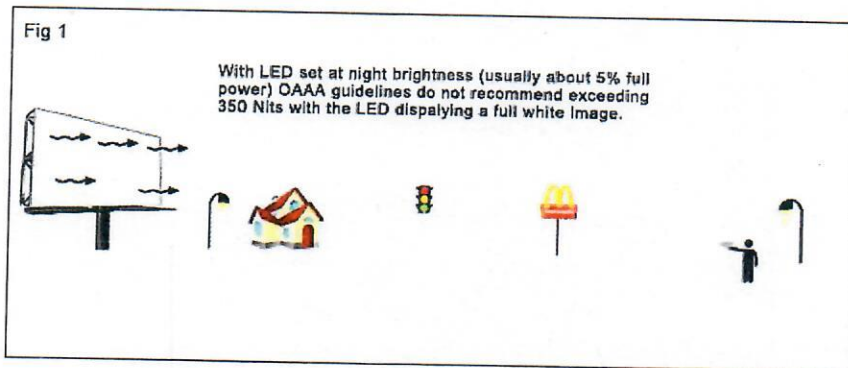
After a digital billboard is installed, there will be instances where it is desired to evaluate the nighttime billboard illumination to ensure that it does not exceed the brightness levels recommend by the OAAA. This procedure is extremely simple and requires only a luminance meter also known as a Nit gun.

The luminance meter (Nit gun) measures candelas per square meter from the source of any light. Most Nit guns come with a measurement area that appears as a circle in the field of vision of the meter. When taking readings, be sure that the subject you are measuring fills the entire circle (measurement area).

Most luminance meters are expensive pieces of scientific equipment. There are multiple ways to use the meter to record data. It is important that you set the meter to read absolute luminance measures vs. percentages of some stored values or previous peak readings. Some luminance meters will provide measurements in foot lamberts as well as candelas/square meter. Be sure your meter is set to measure in candelas/square meter.

Steps

1. Measuring Nits does not vary based on the size of the display. All displays can be measured in the same manner. The critical step with Nit measurements is to position yourself in the best possible location prior to taking your readings.
2. The person taking measurements should be as close to directly in front of the digital display as practical. Even slight variations off center will impact your readings. The variations in height are as impactful as variations in side to side alignment.



3. Each meter comes with a measurement area represented by a circle inside the view finder. This circle needs to be positioned so it falls entirely within the area of the digital billboard that you want to measure.
4. Take the measurement by pulling the Nit gun trigger. A reading will take place in about 0.8 seconds. The readings will continue to change as long as the trigger is held.
5. If the reading is below the maximum allowed, everything is okay. If the reading is higher than the maximum limit, the digital billboard is operating too brightly. The OAAA recommends that night time Nit readings not exceed 350 Nits.

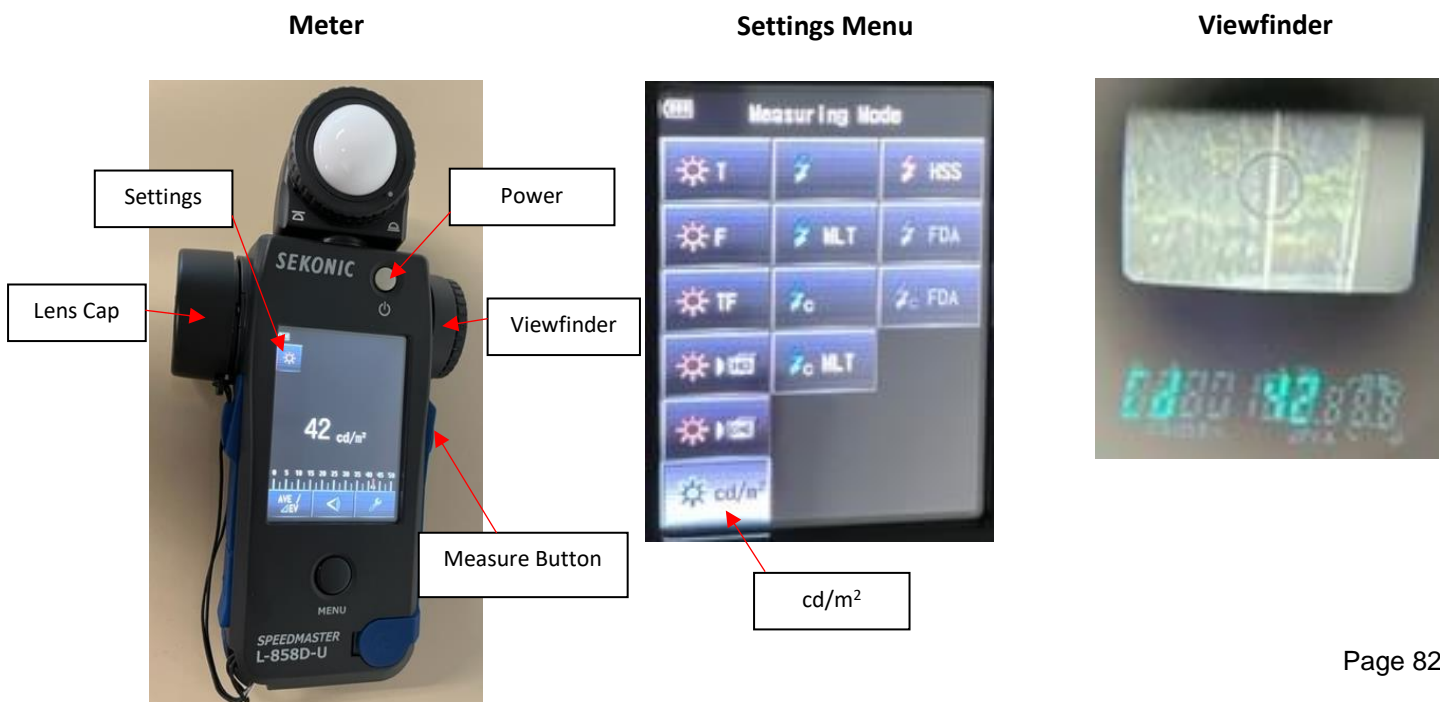

Using the Sekonic Speedmaster L-858D-U to Measure Nits

1. Hold the power button to turn the meter on.
2. Remove the lens cap.
3. If the screen shows cd/m^2 , the meter is on the correct setting to measure nits. Nits and cd/m^2 are the same. If the screen shows a different type of measurement, touch settings to view the setting menu and then touch cd/m^2 .
4. Look through the viewfinder and aim the circle in the viewfinder at the location on the sign where you want to take the measurement.
5. Press the measure button beneath the viewfinder to take the measurement. The measurement number will appear in the viewfinder and on the meter screen.

Guidance on Electronic Display Sign Measurement:

- Readings must be taken after sunset when it is dark (for planning purposes, this could be after 9 PM in June and July).
- Position yourself around three feet from the base/face of the sign when taking a reading. Take the reading as straight-on as possible (this might increase the distance beyond three feet).
 - If three feet is not possible, please measure the distance from the base of the sign and include in your response.
- Take at least ten readings of each sign. Wait for any white text or background if the image is scrolling – the whiter the color, the higher the nits.

INTERIM ROAD MAINTENANCE AGREEMENT FOR _____
SUBDIVISION WITH INTERNAL STREETS DESIGNATED FOR ACCEPTANCE INTO
THE STATE SECONDARY ROAD SYSTEM

THIS INTERIM ROAD MAINTENANCE AGREEMENT dated this ____ day of _____, 20____, is by and between _____ (Land Owner) and Louisa County, Virginia, a political subdivision of the Commonwealth exercising its powers by and through its Board of Supervisors (“the County”).

WHEREAS, the Land Owner is the owner of _____ subdivision, _____ Magisterial District, Louisa County, Virginia (“the Lots”); and

WHEREAS, the access to the aforementioned lots is over, along, and across _____ (name of roads) _____”Roads” as shown on the plat of survey for _____ subdivision; which is attached hereto and made a part hereof; and

WHEREAS, the Land Owner desires to provide for the construction, care, maintenance, upkeep and repair of the Road(s) and for the benefit of future lot owners *until such time* as the Roads and the internal subdivision streets (“the subdivision streets”) shown on a plat survey titled Subdivision Plat of _____ prepared by _____ and dated _____ are accepted by the Commonwealth of Virginia into the state secondary road system (“the Date of Acceptance”).

Now therefore the Land Owner and the County agree that:

1. The Lots are served by the Roads, privately maintained roads which will not be maintained by the state or County.
2. The Land Owner understands that school bus service is not provided by the Louisa County School Division along private roads, lanes, or streets.
3. The Land Owner understands that United States Postal Service is not provided along private roads, lanes, or streets.
4. The expense and responsibility for maintaining the Road and the subdivision streets will be paid for and borne by the Land Owner or his assigns under this Agreement. The Land Owner may assign its obligations under this Agreement with written permission from the County, which will not be unreasonably withheld.
5. It is the responsibility of the Land Owner to undertake construction and subsequent maintenance, if any, of the roads. On purchase of any of the Lots by any person prior to the Date of Acceptance, the Land Owner must provide the buyer with a copy of this Agreement.
6. In addition, the Land Owner will maintain roads and provide for snow removal. Snow plowing shall be required when there has been an average accumulation of four inches or

more and shall continue until roads are cleared to a maximum average depth of four inches. Snow plowing shall commence no later than six hours after the snow has ceased falling or two hours after dawn, whichever time is the later.

7. The County or its representative may inspect the Road and the subdivision streets at any time for compliance with the terms of this Agreement.
8. In event of any failure by the Land Owner in the performance of any term of this Agreement, the County, after providing 30 days' notice and opportunity to cure, may perform necessary maintenance or repairs. All costs expended by the County will constitute a lien on the Lots. However, nothing herein should be construed to obligate the County to maintain the Road and the subdivision streets.
9. This Agreement is a covenant that runs with the land, and inures to the benefit of and will be binding on the Land Owner and the County, their heirs and assigns, and all subsequent owners of the Lots, until the Date of Acceptance.
10. On execution, the Land Owner will record this Agreement among the land records of Louisa County, Virginia, at its own expense.
11. This Agreement will terminate only by written agreement signed by the Land Owner and the County.
12. Invalidity of any provision of this Agreement by judgment or decree of Court will not affect any of the other provisions of this Agreement, but the remainder will continue in full force and effect.

THIS AGREEMENT, made this ____ day of _____, 20__, by and between _____, corporation/partnership/llc, or husband and wife, or individually, and all successors in interest, party(ies) of the first part, hereinafter referred to as "OWNER", and the COUNTY OF LOUISA, VIRGINIA, a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia, party of the second part, hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY".

WHEREAS, the party(ies) of the first part is (are) the owner of a certain tract of land located in the County of Louisa, Virginia; and

WHEREAS, the said parcel of land is being subdivided by the Owner into the subdivision known and designated as:

and the Owner has caused a plat of said subdivision dated _____, and as last revised, to be prepared by _____, Certified Land Surveyors, or Civil Engineers, which said plat the Owner desires to admit to record in the Clerk's Office of the Circuit Court for the County of Louisa, Virginia; and

WHEREAS, the Owner agrees to construct and locate all physical improvements in said subdivision, as required by the Subdivision Ordinance of the County of Louisa, Virginia, or shown on the development plans approved by the Agent of the Subdivision Ordinance, hereinafter to as "AGENT"; and

WHEREAS, the Owner has posted sufficient bond, letter of credit or certified check, pursuant to existing ordinances, approved as to form by the County Attorney, and with surety satisfactory to the County in the amount of _____ and 00/100 Dollars (\$_____) guaranteeing the installation of the aforementioned improvements within twenty-four (24) months from the date of this agreement; and

NOW, THEREFORE, THIS AGREEMENT WITNESSETH: That for and in consideration of the premises and the approval of said subdivision and the covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. The Owner does covenant and agree that it will, without cost to the County, within twenty-four (24) months from the date of this agreement, construct to the approval of the County all physical improvements as required by the Subdivision Ordinance of the County, or shown on the development plans approved by the Agent. If, in the sole judgment of the County, circumstances beyond the control of the Owner prevent the Owner from completing the improvements in the time set forth herein, then the County may at its sole discretion grant an extension of time for completion of said improvements and in such instance the County shall require an amended bond, letter of credit, or certified check, approved as to form by the County Attorney, and with surety satisfactory to the County in an amount to guarantee the installation of the aforementioned improvements.

2. It is mutually understood and agreed that in the event the Owner fails to properly complete the physical improvements provided hereinabove, the County may complete, or cause to have completed, the same and render a bill therefore to the Owner who shall be liable to the County for all proper costs so incurred by the County or the County may draw the amount necessary from the surety to complete or cause to have completed the same.

3. It is mutually understood and agreed that this agreement does not relieve the Owner of any responsibilities or requirements placed upon them by the various ordinances of the County applicable to such subdivision and development of the property, and the subdivision and development of the property will be done in strict accordance with such ordinances.

4. It is mutually understood and agreed that if the Owner shall faithfully execute each and all requirements of the said Subdivision Ordinance and the provisions of this agreement, and shall indemnify, protect and save harmless the County of Louisa from all loss, damage, expense or cost by reason of any claim, suit or action instituted against the County of Louisa or its agents or employees thereof, on account of, or in consequence of any breach on the part of the Owner, then the aforementioned bond, letter of credit, or certified check, shall be released by the County to the Owner.

5. The Owner does hereby agree to indemnify, protect and save harmless the County from and against all losses and physical damages to property, and bodily injury or death to any person or persons, which may arise out of or be caused by the construction, maintenance, presence or use of the streets, utilities and public easements required by, and shown on, the development plans and the subdivision plat until such time as the said streets shall be accepted as part of the Virginia Department of Transportation's system and utilities and public easements shall be accepted as a part of the County's system. To insure such indemnification, the county may require and the owner shall provide upon request a Certificate of Public Liability Insurance in an amount approved by the County Attorney as sufficient, including a governmental endorsement thereto, naming the County as an insured, issued by an insurance company licensed to do business in the Commonwealth of Virginia.

6. It is mutually understood and agreed, that the approval on final plat or plats of this subdivision, or section thereof, shall not be deemed to be an acceptance by the County of any street, alley, public space, sewer or other physical improvements shown on the plat or plats for maintenance, repair or operations thereof, and that the Owner shall be fully responsible therefore and assume all of the risks and liabilities therefore. Nor shall approval on final plat or plats of this subdivision be deemed to guarantee public water or sewer service or available capacity.

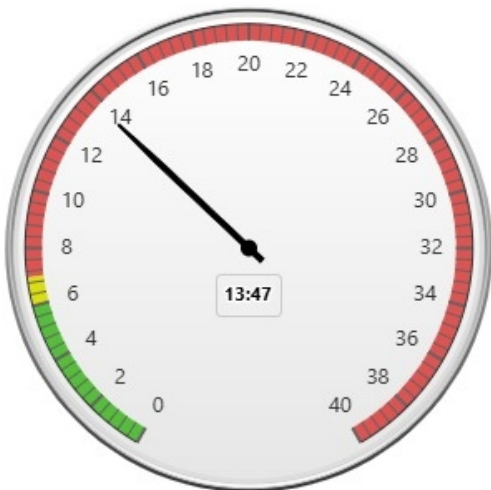

Year to Date 13:35

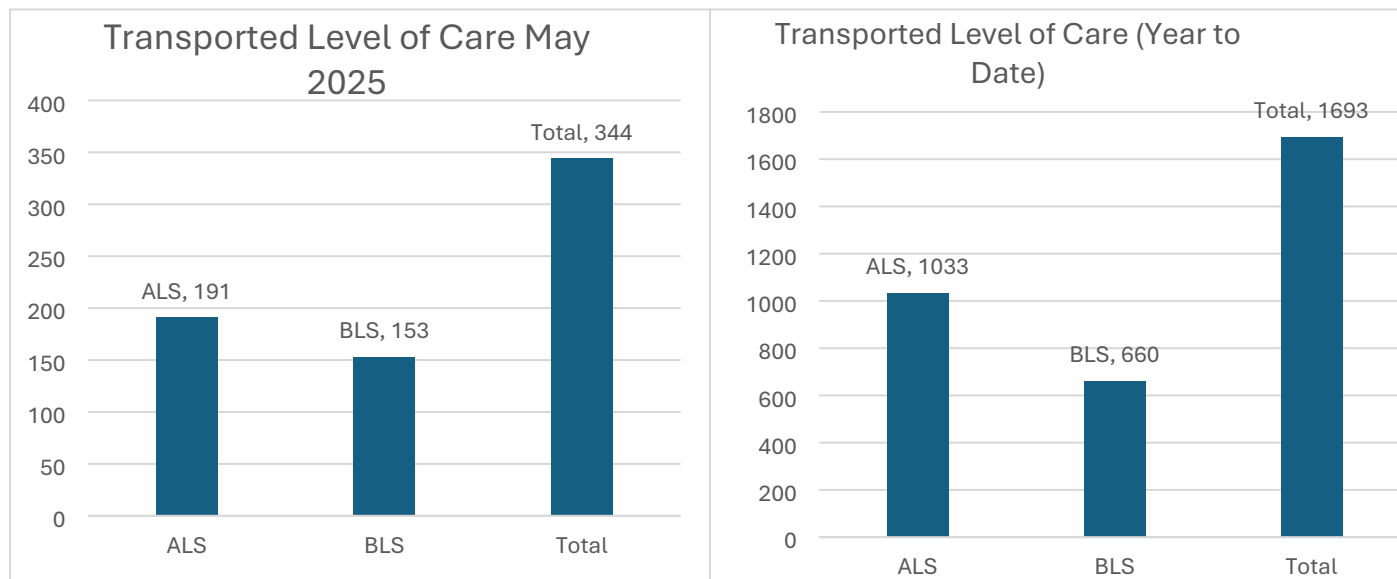
Average Total Response Time (MM:SS)

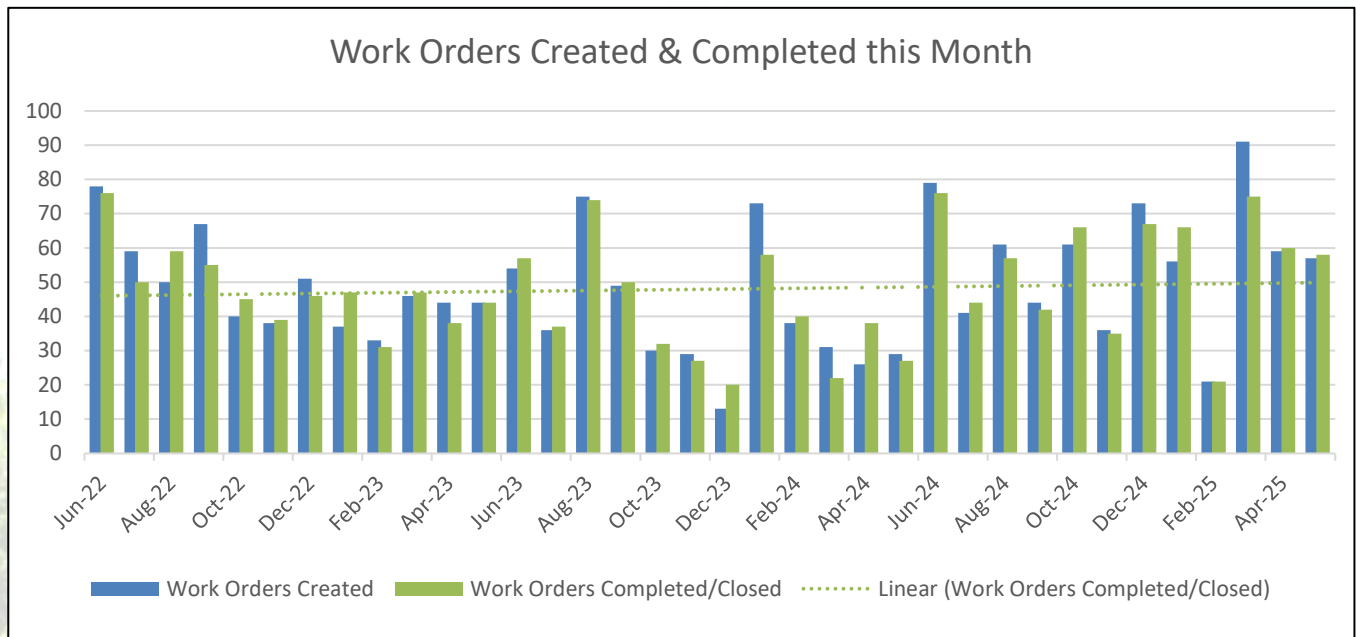

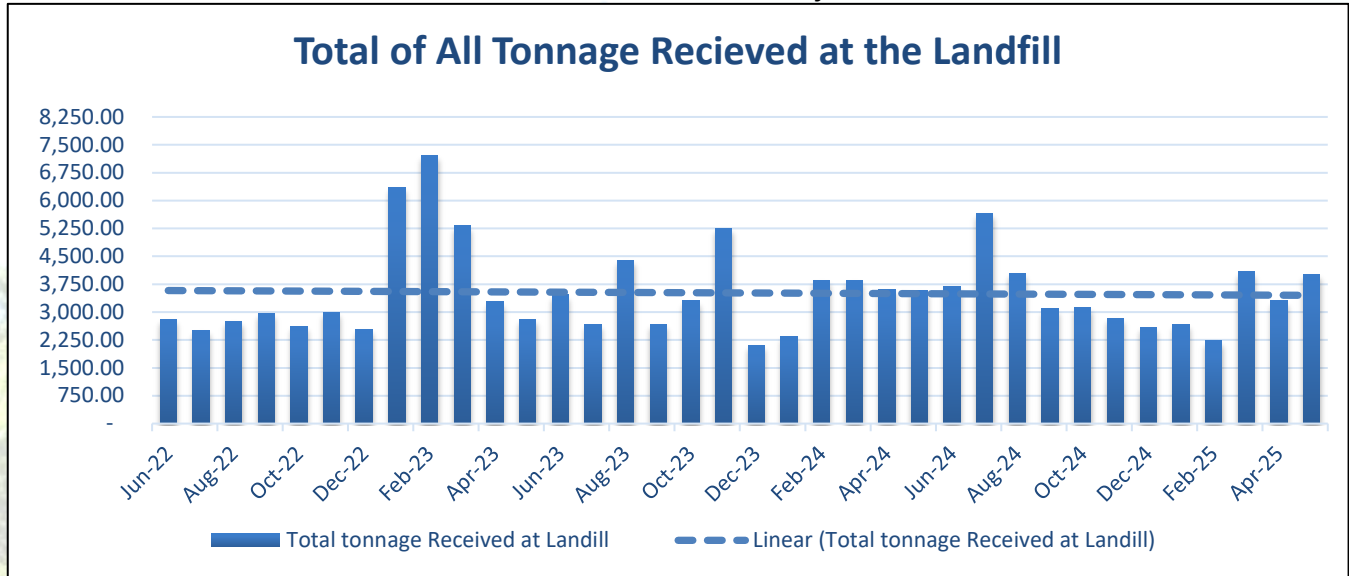

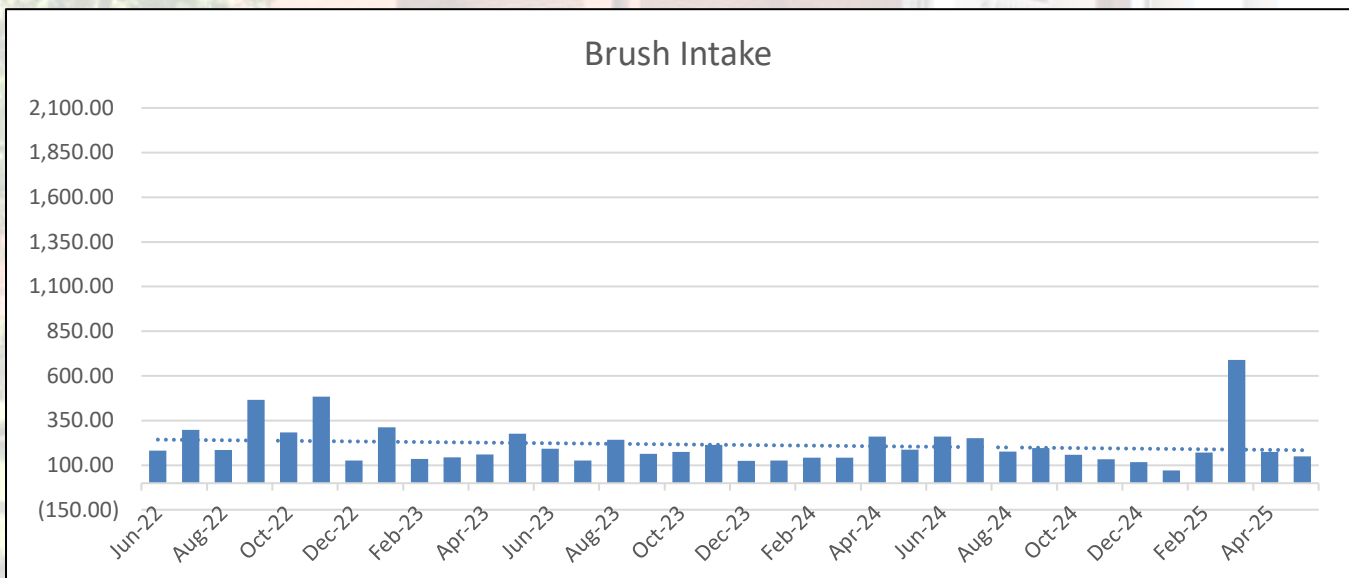
Solid Waste

The Landfill received 150.13 tons of brush last month. The chart below shows the tonnage of brush received at the landfill each month over the last three years.

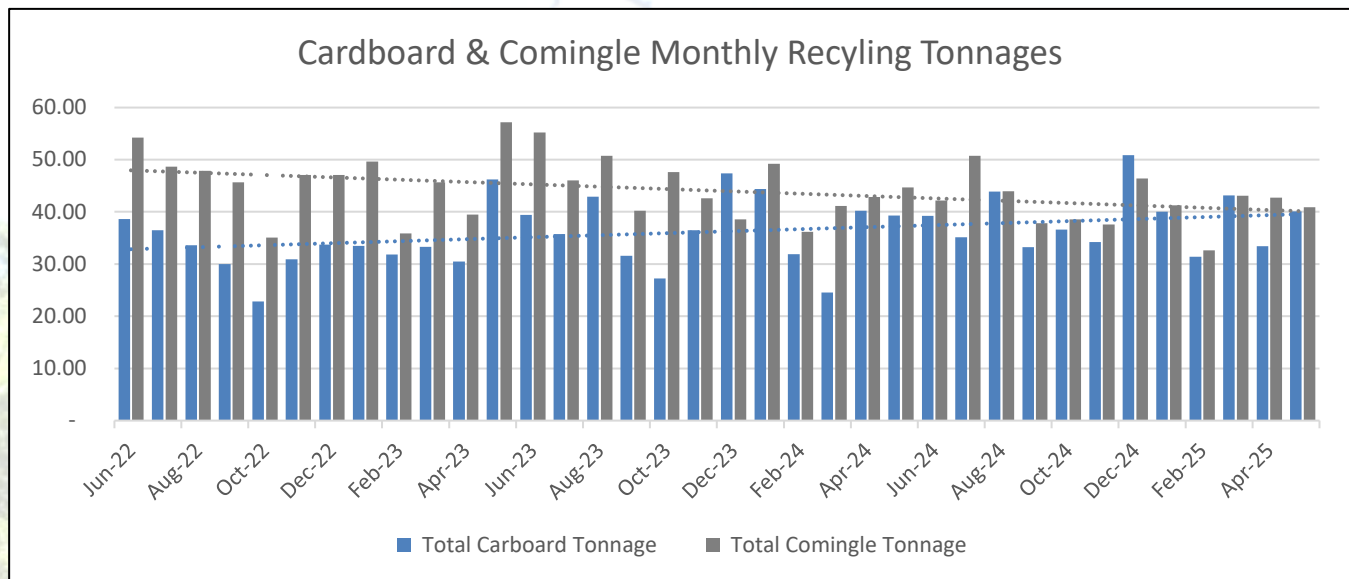

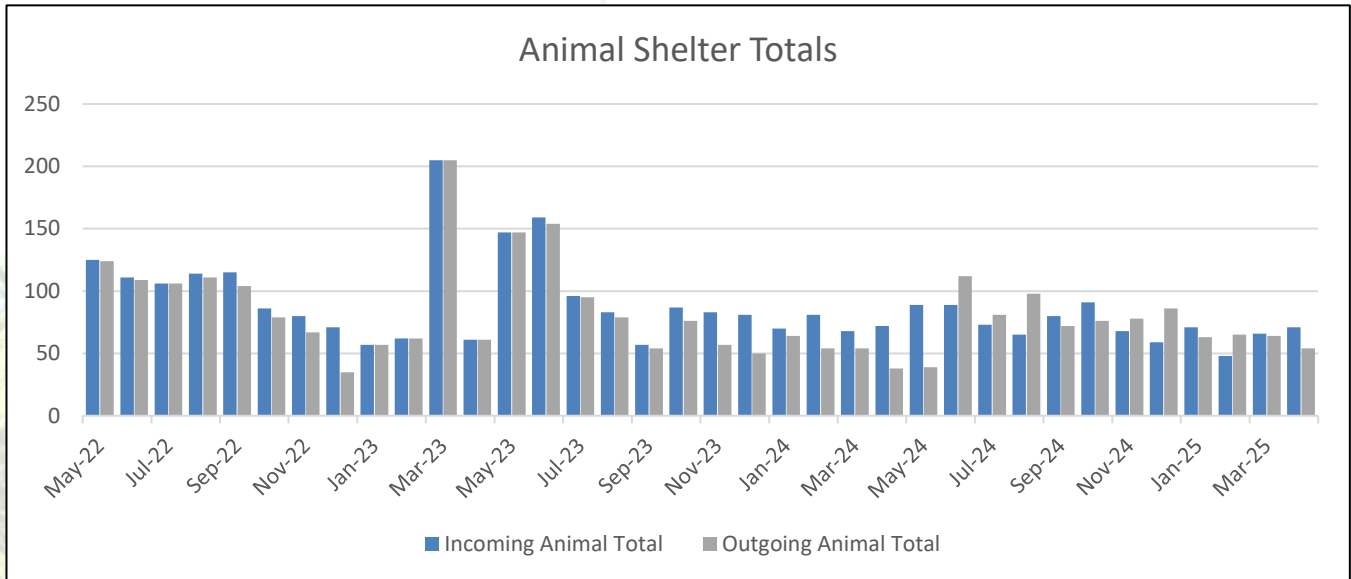

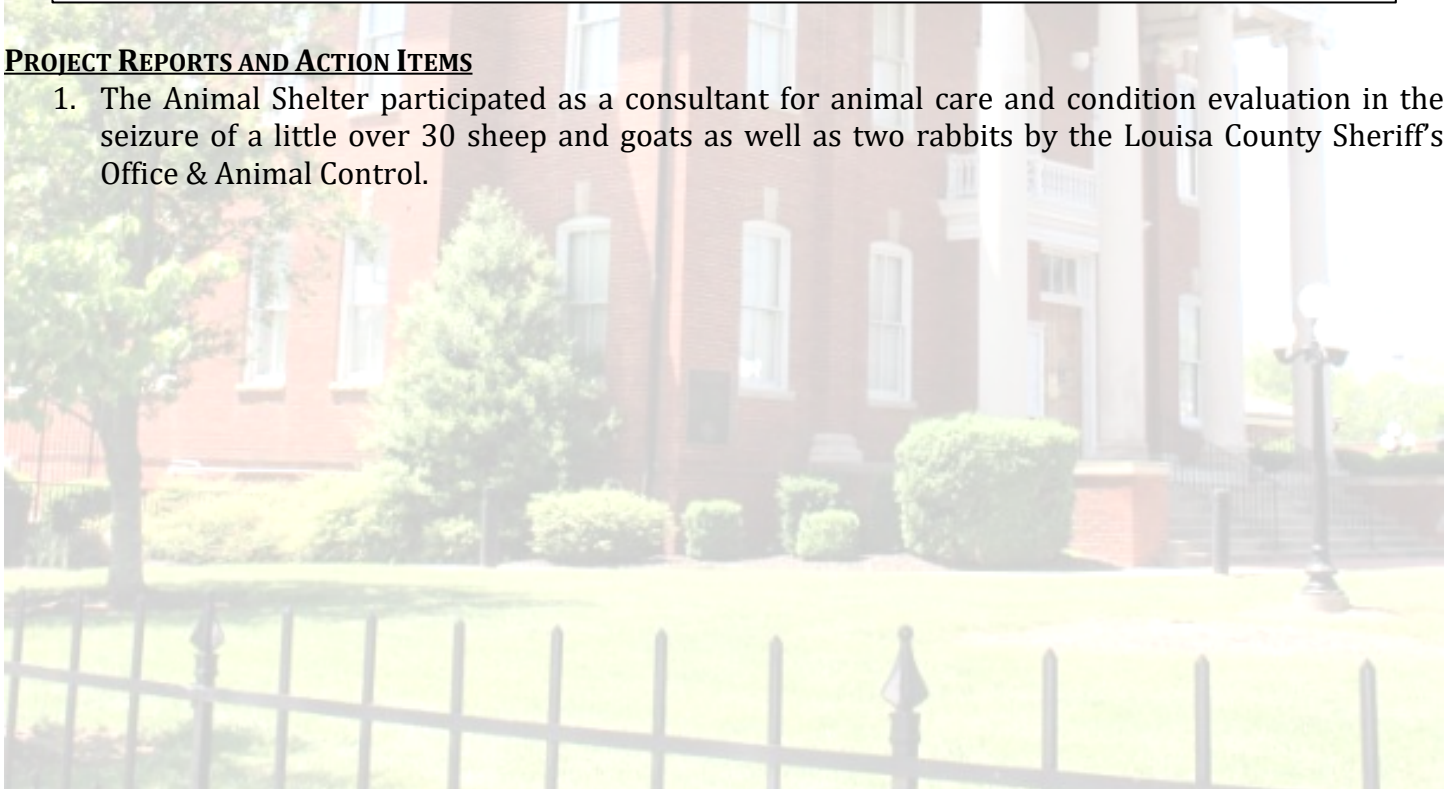

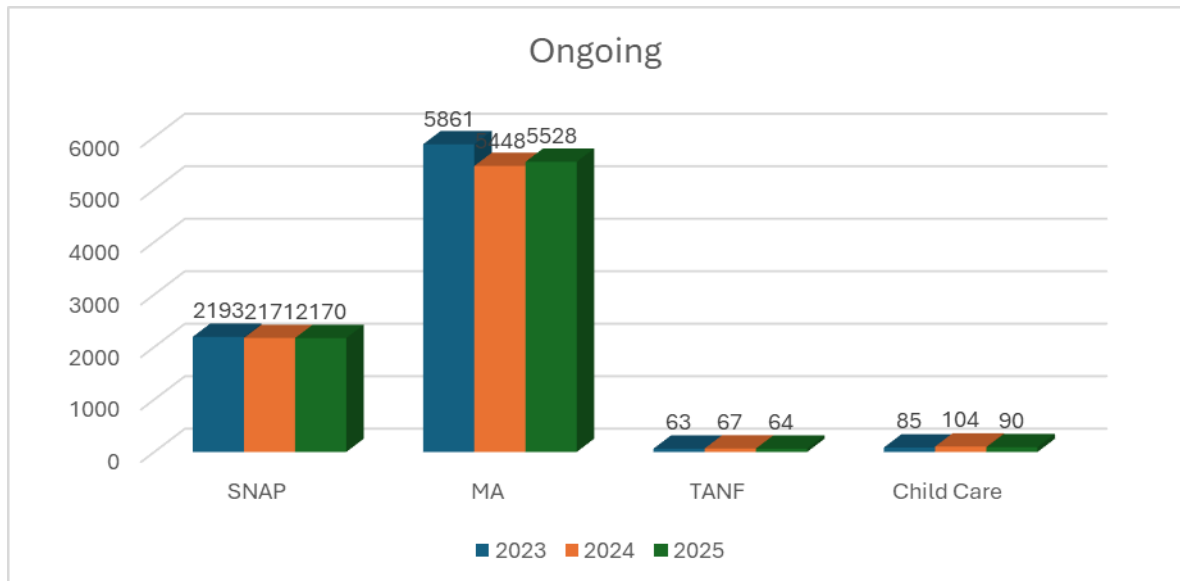
Customers are calling multiple times to speak with workers about their benefits cases or seeking information about other resources in and outside of Louisa County. There was a slight decrease in foot traffic as more clients are trying to conduct as much of their business over the phone. The next energy assistance program will not begin until June. The highest number of visitors to the agency occurred on Thursdays (145) and Fridays (152) with an average of 29.7 visitors on those days. Although the numbers were slightly lower, on Mondays (89), Tuesdays (109), and Wednesdays (107), the average number of visitors to the agency was 27.7 on those days. There was one observed holiday in the month of May.

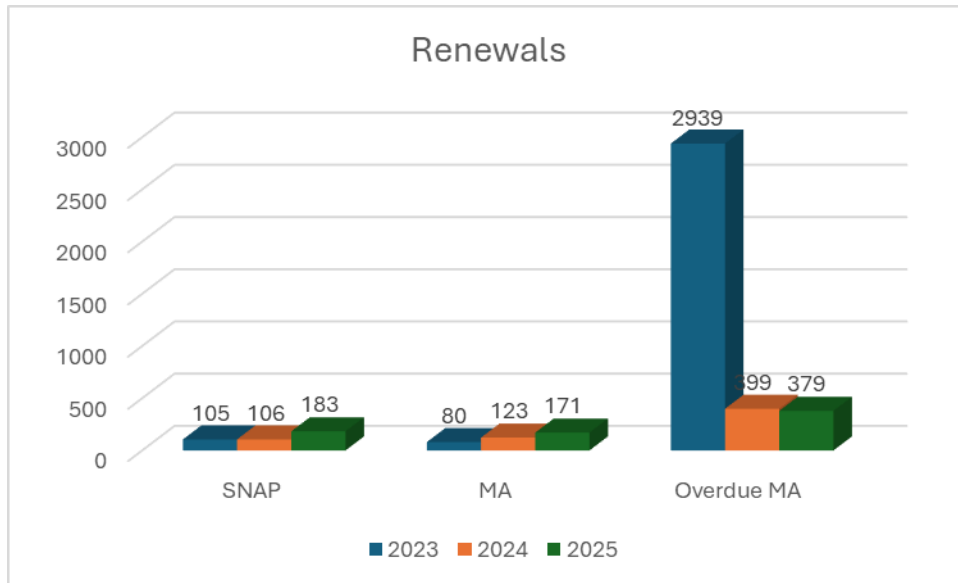

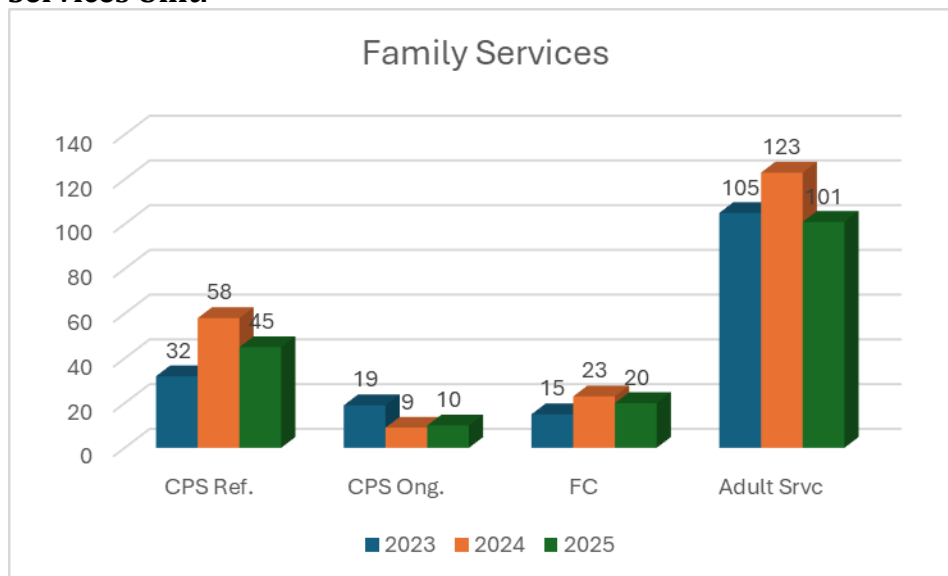
Caseloads for SNAP and Medicaid have begun to level out over the last three years. Although unit vacancies have been filled, worker inexperience is still impacting processing timeliness. Contract benefits workers are providing case processing and additional support currently. Overdue Medicaid renewals are decreasing slightly. The local agency is receiving assistance from another locality that can offer support to complete overdue renewals for Medicaid. The number may remain the same in the short term until the new workforce have the training necessary to process cases.

FOSTER CARE SUMMARY:

No new youth in foster care this month! One youth was discharged from Cumberland to their pre-adoptive placement in Louisa County. We have 5 youth in pre-adoptive placements; 2 are awaiting the Judge's signature on final orders; 1 is awaiting 6-month supervisory period to expire and 2 have just started the adoption finalization paperwork.

As of May 2025, there are 20 youth in foster care. Six (6) youth have been in care for less than 12 months, six (6) youth have been in care for more than 12 months, but less than 24 months and two (2) youth have been in care for more than 24 months. Each of these youth have had a face-to-face visit as required by State and foster care policy. One (1) of these youth reside in relative foster homes, four (4) youth are in congregate care, five (5) youth are in pre-adoptive placements, three (3) youth in a non-relative foster home placement and six (6) youth are in the Fostering Futures program.

FOSTER PARENT RECRUITMENT/TRAINING UPDATE:

We are heavily recruiting and have placed yard signs and banners throughout the community (at the pool, baseball fields, churches, summer camps, etc.). The Family Services Unit Manager has been holding trainings on an ongoing basis and will continue to do so for relatives and non-relatives. The next training session will begin in July.

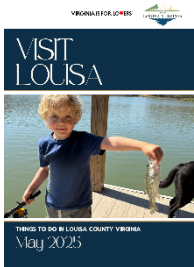

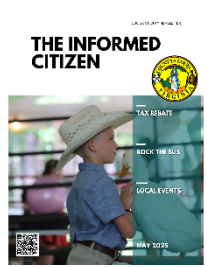

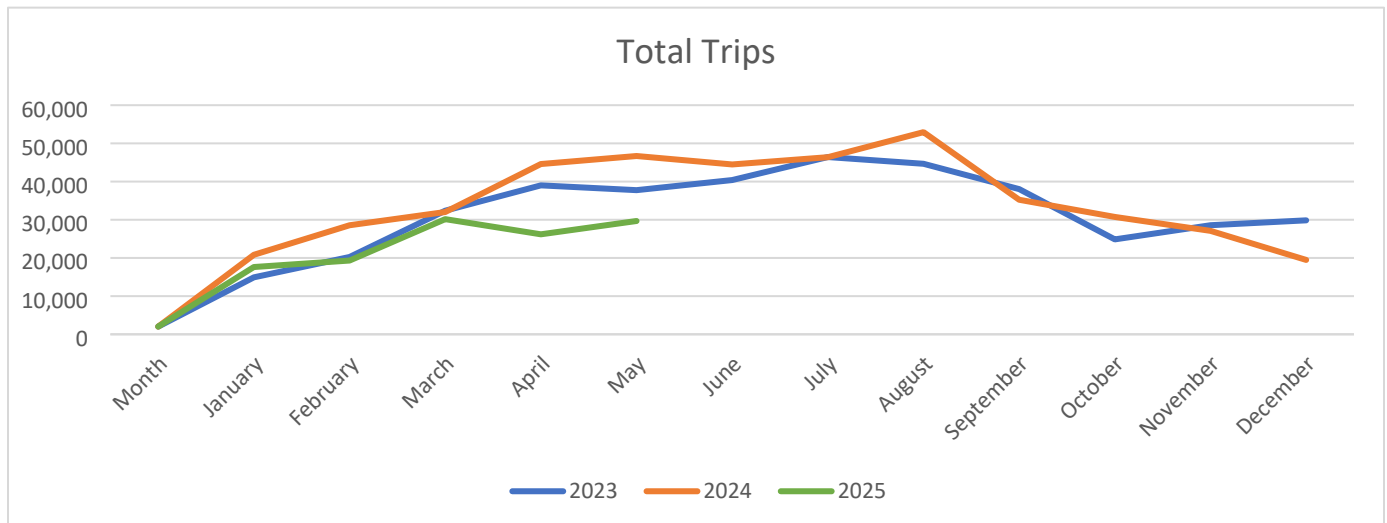

PROJECTS

South Taxiway Construction – The project is progressing well and remains on schedule for completion in late June, weather permitting. As part of the ongoing work, the runway has been temporarily shortened by 1,315 feet, leaving 2,985 feet available for aircraft operations. This configuration will remain in place for the next several weeks. A second three-day runway closure is scheduled for June 16th to allow for the removal of equipment and debris, after which the runway will be restored to its full length. To date, approximately 52% of the project has been completed.

Taxi Lane Rehabilitation – The contractor has completed sealant work on the asphalt aprons in front of the old T-hangars, and the remaining asphalt patching is scheduled to be finished by the end of the day on June 9th. This will mark the completion of the entire project.

Background/History:

Louisa County Water Authority was created in 1968 by the Louisa County Board of Supervisors as a separate legal entity from the County. The Authority is engaged in water and wastewater treatment in Louisa County as requested by the Board of Supervisors. From the beginning there has been an understanding between the Authority and the County that because the County has tasked the Authority with the creation and operation of water and wastewater treatment systems, which for some years could not operate fiscally in the black, some form of County subsidization would be required.

The Northeast Creek Water Treatment Plant currently produces approximately 350,000 – 400,000 gpd, peaking at 520,000 gpd. The treatment process is conventional treatment followed by Nanofiltration.

The Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant and collection system has too few customers to this day and cannot operate without operational funding from the County and Town of Louisa. Louisa County Water Authority is a party to a contract to operate the Regional WWTP. The LRWWTP treats approximately 465,000 gpd.

The Zion Crossroads water system consists of seven (7) potable production wells and thirteen (13) monitoring wells. The well system produces approximately 265,000 gpd. Spring Creek Well #1 is now online. Spring Creek Well #2 will be online as soon as the Virginia Department of Health – Office of Drinking Water inspection, engineering inspection and communication issue is resolved.

The Zion Crossroads Wastewater Treatment Plant and collection system was at first subsidized directly by the County but as more customers were connected the Authority was allowed to keep a portion of the connection fees and did not request O&M funding. During a difficult regulatory period, the Authority was no longer able to meet the Zion Sewer Expenses; to compensate, the Authority was authorized to keep connection fees charged for new connections beginning July 1, 2011. The ZCWWTP treats approximately 250,000 gpd.

The Bowlers Mill raw water system is the exception in that it was built at no cost to the County and operates on a contract with Old Dominion Electric Coop.

The New Bridge System at Lake Anna was taken over on May 1, 2023. Many upgrades have been undertaken to stabilize the wastewater treatment process and improve the potable water quality.

The Note would have extended the initiation of Required Actions F.1 and F.2 Completion Times from discovery of Condition F entry when Condition F entry is a result of VES air system leakage repairs. The one-time allowance would have expired upon entry into MODE 4 on startup from the first refueling outage of Vogtle, Unit 4.

II. Notice of Consideration of Issuance of Amendments To Facility Operating Licenses and Combined Licenses and Proposed No Significant Hazards Consideration Determination

For the facility-specific amendment requests shown in this notice, the Commission finds that the licensees’ analyses provided, consistent with section 50.91 of title 10 of the *Code of Federal Regulations* (10 CFR) “Notice for public comment; State consultation,” are sufficient to support the proposed determinations that these amendment requests involve NSHC. Under the Commission’s regulations in 10 CFR 50.92, operation of the facilities in accordance with the proposed amendments would not (1) involve a significant increase in the probability or consequences of an accident previously evaluated; or (2) create the possibility of

a new or different kind of accident from any accident previously evaluated; or (3) involve a significant reduction in a margin of safety.

The Commission is seeking public comments on these proposed determinations. Any comments received within 30 days after the date of publication of this notice will be considered in making any final determinations.

Normally, the Commission will not issue the amendments until the expiration of 60 days after the date of publication of this notice. The Commission may issue any of these license amendments before expiration of the 60-day period provided that its final determination is that the amendment involves NSHC. In addition, the Commission may issue any of these amendments prior to the expiration of the 30-day comment period if circumstances change during the 30-day comment period such that failure to act in a timely way would result, for example in derating or shutdown of the facility. If the Commission takes action on any of these amendments prior to the expiration of either the comment period or the notice period, it will publish in the **Federal Register** a notice of issuance. If the Commission makes a final NSHC determination for any of these amendments, any hearing will take place after issuance. The Commission expects that the need to take action on any amendment before 60 days have elapsed will occur very infrequently.

A. Opportunity To Request a Hearing and Petition for Leave To Intervene

Within 60 days after the date of publication of this notice, any person (petitioner) whose interest may be affected by any of these actions may file a request for a hearing and petition for leave to intervene (petition) with respect to that action. Petitions shall be filed in accordance with the Commission’s “Agency Rules of Practice and Procedure” in 10 CFR part 2. Interested persons should consult a current copy of 10 CFR 2.309. If a petition is filed, the Commission or a presiding officer will rule on the petition and, if appropriate, a notice of a hearing will be issued.

Petitions must be filed no later than 60 days from the date of publication of this notice in accordance with the filing instructions in the “Electronic Submissions (E-Filing)” section of this document. Petitions and motions for leave to file new or amended contentions that are filed after the deadline will not be entertained absent a determination by the presiding officer that the filing demonstrates good cause

by satisfying the three factors in 10 CFR 2.309(c)(1)(i) through (iii).

If a hearing is requested, and the Commission has not made a final determination on the issue of no significant hazards consideration, the Commission will make a final determination on the issue of no significant hazards consideration, which will serve to establish when the hearing is held. If the final determination is that the amendment request involves no significant hazards consideration, the Commission may issue the amendment and make it immediately effective, notwithstanding the request for a hearing. Any hearing would take place after issuance of the amendment. If the final determination is that the amendment request involves a significant hazards consideration, then any hearing held would take place before the issuance of the amendment unless the Commission finds an imminent danger to the health or safety of the public, in which case it will issue an appropriate order or rule under 10 CFR part 2.

A State, local governmental body, Federally recognized Indian Tribe, or designated agency thereof, may submit a petition to the Commission to participate as a party under 10 CFR 2.309(h) no later than 60 days from the date of publication of this notice. Alternatively, a State, local governmental body, Federally recognized Indian Tribe, or agency thereof may participate as a non-party under 10 CFR 2.315(c).

B. Electronic Submissions (E-Filing)

All documents filed in NRC adjudicatory proceedings, including documents filed by an interested State, local governmental body, Federally recognized Indian Tribe, or designated agency thereof that requests to participate under 10 CFR 2.315(c), must be filed in accordance with 10 CFR 2.302. The E-Filing process requires participants to submit and serve all adjudicatory documents over the internet, or in some cases, to mail copies on electronic storage media, unless an exemption permitting an alternative filing method, as further discussed, is granted. Detailed guidance on electronic submissions is located in the “Guidance

for Electronic Submissions to the NRC” (ADAMS Accession No. ML13031A056) and on the NRC’s public website at <https://www.nrc.gov/site-help/e-submittals.html>.

To comply with the procedural requirements of E-Filing, at least 10 days prior to the filing deadline, the participant should contact the Office of the Secretary by email at Hearing.Docket@nrc.gov, or by telephone at 301–415–1677, to (1) request a digital identification (ID) certificate, which allows the participant (or its counsel or representative) to digitally sign submissions and access the E-Filing system for any proceeding in which it is participating; and (2) advise the Secretary that the participant will be submitting a petition or other adjudicatory document (even in instances in which the participant, or its counsel or representative, already holds an NRC-issued digital ID certificate). Based upon this information, the Secretary will establish an electronic docket for the proceeding if the Secretary has not already established an electronic docket.

After a digital ID certificate is obtained and a docket created, the participant must submit adjudicatory documents in Portable Document Format. A filing is considered complete at the time the document is submitted through the NRC’s E-Filing system. To be timely, an electronic filing must be submitted to the E-Filing system no later than 11:59 p.m. ET on the due date. Upon receipt of a transmission, the E-Filing system

time-stamps the document and sends the submitter an email confirming receipt of the document. The E-Filing system also distributes an email that provides access to the document to the NRC’s Office of the General Counsel and any others who have advised the Office of the Secretary that they wish to participate in the proceeding, so that the filer need not serve the document on those participants separately. Therefore, applicants and other participants (or their counsel or representative) must apply for and receive a digital ID certificate before adjudicatory documents are filed to obtain access to the documents via the E-Filing system.

Such filings must be submitted in accordance with 10 CFR 2.302(b)–(d). Participants filing adjudicatory documents in this manner are responsible for serving their documents on all other participants. Participants granted an exemption under 10 CFR 2.302(g)(2) must still meet the electronic formatting requirement in 10 CFR 2.302(g)(1), unless the

participant also seeks and is granted an exemption from 10 CFR 2.302(g)(1).

IV. Notice of Issuance of Amendment to Facility Operating Licenses and Combined Licenses and Final Determination of No Significant Hazards Consideration and Opportunity for a Hearing (Exigent Circumstances or Emergency Situation)

Since publication of the last monthly notice, the Commission has issued the following amendment. The Commission has determined for this amendment that the application for the amendment complies with the standards and requirements of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, as amended (the Act), and the Commission's rules and regulations. The Commission has made appropriate findings as required by the Act and the Commission's rules and regulations in 10 CFR chapter I, which are set forth in the license amendment.

Because of exigent circumstances or emergency situation associated with the date the amendment was needed, there was not time for the Commission to publish, for public comment before issuance, its usual notice of consideration of issuance of amendment, proposed NSHC determination, and opportunity for a hearing.

In circumstances where failure to act in a timely way would have resulted, for

example, in derating or shutdown of a nuclear power plant or in prevention of either resumption of operation or of increase in power output up to the plant's licensed power level (an emergency situation), the Commission may not have had an opportunity to provide for public comment on its NSHC determination. In such case, the license amendment has been issued without opportunity for comment prior to issuance. Nonetheless, the State has been consulted by telephone whenever possible.

Under its regulations, the Commission may issue and make an amendment immediately effective, notwithstanding the pendency before it of a request for a hearing from any person, in advance of the holding and completion of any required hearing, where it has determined that NSHC is involved. The Commission has applied the standards of 10 CFR 50.92 and has made a final determination that the amendments involve NSHC. The basis for this determination is contained in the NRC staff safety evaluation related to each action. Accordingly, the amendment has been issued and made effective as indicated.

For those amendments that involve an emergency situation, the Commission is now providing an opportunity to

comment on the final NSHC determination for each action; comments should be submitted in accordance with Section I of this notice within 30 days of the date of this notice. Any comments received within 30 days of the date of publication this notice will be considered.

For those amendments that have not been previously noticed in the **Federal Register**, within 60 days after the date of publication of this notice, any persons (petitioner) whose interest may be affected by this action may file a request for a hearing and petition for leave to intervene (petition) with respect to the action. Petitions shall be filed in accordance with the guidance concerning the Commission's "Agency Rules of Practice and Procedure" in 10 CFR part 2 as discussed in section II.A of this document.

Unless otherwise indicated, the Commission has determined that the amendment satisfies the criteria for categorical exclusion in accordance with 10 CFR 51.22. Therefore, pursuant to 10 CFR 51.22(b), no environmental impact statement or environmental assessment need be prepared for this amendment. If the Commission has prepared an environmental assessment under the special circumstances provision in 10 CFR 51.12(b) and has

made a determination based on that assessment, it is so indicated in the safety evaluation for the amendment.

In response to a letter from TVA dated August 17, 2023 (NNP-23-003, ADAMS Accession No. ML23229A569), the Commission on November 21, 2023 granted an exemption from certain requirements of paragraph 2.101(a)(5) of title 10 of the *Code of Federal Regulations* (10 CFR), which allowed TVA to submit a construction permit application in two parts with the information required under 10 CFR 50.34(a)(1) included in the second part of the application (ADAMS Accession No. ML23045A008).

Tennessee Valley Authority filed with the NRC, pursuant to 10 CFR part 50, "Domestic Licensing of Production and Utilization Facilities," both parts of the application for a construction permit to construct a GEH BWRX-300 reactor at the Clinch River Nuclear Site in Roane County, Tennessee, on April 28, 2025 (NNP-25-003, ADAMS Accession No. ML25118A209), and May 20, 2025, (NPP-25-004, ADAMS Package Accession No. ML25140A062), respectively. These notices are being provided in accordance with the requirements in 10 CFR 50.43(a)(3).

The NRC staff is currently undertaking its acceptance review of both parts of the application. If both parts of the application are accepted for docketing, a subsequent **Federal Register** notice will be issued that addresses the acceptability of the construction permit application for docketing and provisions for

Purpose:

This memorandum provides notice of an update to the *Move Safely Blue Ridge* Comprehensive Safety Action Plan prompted by recent federal policy changes. Following an executive order rescinding the Justice40 Initiative and the Climate and Economic Justice Screening Tool (CEJST), the Thomas Jefferson Planning District Commission (TJPDC) is doing detailed analysis on all programs, particularly those that have received federal funding, to ensure compliance with the current executive orders.

Background:

Executive Order 14148, titled "*Initial Rescissions of Harmful Executive Orders and Actions*", was signed on January 20, 2025. It rescinds Executive Order 14008, "*Tackling the Climate Crisis at Home and Abroad*", thereby eliminating the Justice40 Initiative, CEJST, and related environmental justice programs. Accordingly, Justice40 and CEJST data were replaced with data from the U.S. Census Bureau, specifically:

- Areas of Persistent Poverty (AoPP)
- Median Household Income
- Percent of Households with Zero Vehicle Access

Additionally, all recipients of U.S. Department of Transportation funding received a letter from the U.S. Secretary of Transportation on April 24, 2025, outlining interpretation of current federal law and revised guidance for federal grant recipients. Revisions to the *Move Safely Blue Ridge* Comprehensive Safety Action Plan will ensure that TJPDC submits an action plan that is fully compliant with federal guidance.

 - Project ID L5 – Route 22 near Nolting Rd: Shifted from Rank 8 to Rank 7
 - Project ID L8 – Route 208 & Jack Jouett Rd: Shifted from Rank 7 to Rank 8
- **Appendix, Page 173:**
 - Updated prioritization criteria to reflect AoPP data in place of CEJST

Outcome:

These data updates do not affect proposed safety strategies or solutions for jurisdictions. While some project rankings shifted, jurisdictions may pursue implementation funding independent of ranking within the plan document. Ensuring *Move Safely Blue Ridge* remains compliant with federal requirements allows the region to remain eligible for future *Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A)* implementation funding opportunities.

VDOT will be closing Route 714 Horseshoe Farm Rd in Louisa County, VA on June 23, 2025, to rehabilitate the bridge over a small creek. The current Structure is posted at 24 ton and has a width of 13' Feet 7 inches. The State forces from Louisa Bridge Crew will be removing the Steel Beam Timber deck and replacing with a Concrete Box Culvert. Once completed the structure will be capable of carrying legal loads and will be roughly 21' feet wide.

Message boards were placed on Route 714 on June 9, 2025, to announce the closure. The roadway will be closed 0.7 miles from Route 604 Roundabout Rd and 1.4 Miles from Route 208. VDOT is asking drivers to utilize the detour that is in place. The closure is expected to last until August 30, 2025.
