RECOGNITIONS

Recognition – Proclaiming October 5-11, 2025 as National 4-H Week

Mr. Goodwin read the proclamation, and Ms. Jones presented a framed copy to Jenny Thompson and Kylie Hoffman, staff members of the Louisa County 4-H and Extension Office.

PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

Chairman Adams opened the public comment period.

Mr. Kenneth Daykins, Sr., Mineral District, described loud noise from heavy equipment and containers near his home that causes vibration and disturbance. He said he had contacted the Sheriff's Department and Chairman Duane Adams and urged the County to take corrective action. Chairman Adams thanked him and promised to follow up.

Ms. Vicky Harte, Louisa District, thanked the Board, particularly Christian Goodwin and Supervisor Chris Coon for helping the Town of Louisa during its staffing shortage. She announced the hiring of a new town manager who will coordinate with County leadership. Mr. Goodwin also thanked Finance Director Wanda Colvin for assisting with town financial operations.

With no one wishing to speak, Chairman Adams closed the public comment period.

INFORMATION/DISCUSSION ITEMS

Presentation – Louisa 4-H Update

Ms. Jennifer Thompson (Extension Agent), Callie Hoffman (Assistant Agent) reported over 2,900 youth enrolled and 232 volunteers across clubs, camps, and enrichment programs. She discussed successful 4-H Camp and scholarships provided by the County. Ms. Hoffman described outreach to local schools through Agricultural Days, Reality Store, and Second Grade Gardens programs.

Youth speakers shared personal stories of growth and leadership. Hurley Lucas spoke about mentoring younger campers, Mackenzie Jackson shared her experiences in livestock clubs, and Austin Frame highlighted 4-H's life-changing impact. All requested expanded meeting space.

Board members, including Chairman Adams and Supervisors, praised the youth for their poise and suggested exploring an Agricultural Center to serve 4-H, FFA, and community needs.

Presentation – Louisa Land Preservation Initiative: Options for Preserving Rural Lands

Ms. Maggie Breakville, Agricultural and Rural Preservation Coordinator, proposed a three-pronged framework for preserving agricultural and forest lands: (1) zoning and development reforms, (2) agricultural and forestal preservation districts with tiered incentives, and (3) funding mechanisms such as a Land Preservation Service District. She requested Board feedback.

Supervisors Barlow supported developing economic opportunities in agriculture, while Supervisor Adams emphasized protecting working farms and forests. The Board agreed staff were on the right track and encouraged continued development of the plan.

NEW BUSINESS/ACTION ITEMS

Resolution – Authorizing a Pass-Through Appropriation to the Department of Fire & EMS for a Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) Grant

The Department of Fire & EMS was awarded a Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grant in the amount of \$1,698,974.31 for the period of March 23, 2026 to March 22, 2029 for the hiring of nine (9) additional career staff. The Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grant program provides assistance to departments to ensure adequate staffing for safe and effective response. The health and safety of departmental staff and the County's growing response requirements are critically important, and nine (9) additional career staff are needed to assist with ensuring safe and adequate response and to reduce response times in the face of growing demand in several areas of the County, and the added staff would also allow for additional ambulance and fire crews as the demand for services dictate

The grant will provide 75% of all usual employee costs for the first two years and 35% of those costs for the third year of the three-year grant period, following which those costs are the responsibility of the governing body. This funding was not included in the budget and needs to be appropriated at this time.

On the motion of Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Barnes, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to authorize a pass through appropriation for Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grant funding for the hiring of nine additional staff in the Department of Fire and Emergency Medical Services (GL # 20232300-411000-C3212) in the amount of \$2,755,093.50. The source of funding is Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grant funding (0202R32-332-010-C3212) in the amount of \$1,698,974.31 and General Fund Balance in the amount of \$1,056,119.19.

Resolution – Authorizing a Pass-Through Appropriation for Fire & EMS for an Assistance to Firefighters Grant for Fire Equipment

The Department of Fire & EMS was awarded a AFG grant in the amount of \$409,298.18 for the period of September 30, 2025 to September 29, 2027 to purchase replacement fire hose, turnout gear extractors, RIT Packs, and direct source vehicle exhaust filters that are needed with a match requirement of 10% or \$40,929.82. The Assistance for Firefighters (AFG) grant program provides assistance to departments for critical equipment needs and safety initiatives. Several of the County's fire stations have fire hose that is aging and/or has failed NFPA testing. Three of the County's fire stations do not have turnout gear extractors to properly clean and decontaminate gear after fires and hazardous materials calls. Rapid intervention rescue bags (RIT packs) are used to help rescue trapped firefighters who are out of breathing air. Direct source diesel exhaust particulate systems filter harmful and cancer-causing particulate and gases from the apparatus exhaust. These items were not previously included in the budget and need to be appropriated at this time.

On the motion of Mr. Barnes, seconded by Mr. Williams, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to authorize a pass through appropriation for Assistance for Firefighter grant funding for the purchase of equipment for the Department of Fire and Emergency Medical Services (GL # 20232300-482000-C3211) in the amount of \$450,228.00. The Source of funding is Assistance to Firefighters Grant (0202R32-332010-C3211) in the amount of \$409,298.18 and the General Fund Balance in the amount of \$40,929.82.

Discussion – Reconsider the Original Motion on ORD2025-09

Supervisor McCotter explained that a church's sign application was delayed during ordinance changes, resulting in unintended restrictions. The Board voted unanimously to reconsider the June 16, 2025 ordinance and set an August 15, 2025 effective date to correct the issue.

On the motion of Mr. McCotter, seconded by Mr. Woodward, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to reconsider the June 16, 2025 ordinance (ORD2025-09) and set an August 15, 2025 effective date to correct the issue.



The Thomas Jefferson Planning District Commission (TJPDC) greatly appreciates your efforts on behalf of the localities and citizens that you represent. We are writing to inform you that at its meeting held on October 2, the TJPDC unanimously endorsed this letter to communicate to you our request and plea for additional state investments to support transportation infrastructure in the Commonwealth.

The Planning District's member localities recognize that revenues for expanding and maintaining all modes of infrastructure are critical for meeting Virginia's well-documented and ongoing transportation challenges. They are needed to attract and retain businesses, residents, and tourism, as well as to keep pace with growing public needs and expectations. We encourage the State to prioritize such funding for state, regional and local transportation needs.

As the State continues to adjust SMART SCALE prioritization and the funds distribution process, we believe there should be adequate state funding and local authority to generate transportation dollars for important local and regional projects across modes. We have noted that while the most recent SMART SCALE round saw fewer applications submitted statewide, there also was a significant drop, both in number and percentage, in the number of applications that were funded. Funding allocated for successful applications in FY26 also was less than in the FY18 round.

While we are cognizant of pressures to fund and maintain overall transportation system and network improvements in Virginia, we also see and experience, on an everyday basis, the need for supporting projects that make a difference in our local communities. We have been active in seeking support for those projects. In VDOT's Culpeper District, for the FY26 round, a total of 13 applications were submitted by the TJPDC, Charlottesville-Albemarle MPO (CAMPO), and localities in the PDC region (Nelson County also submitted one application for the Lynchburg District, which was funded). Only three of 24 applications for the Culpeper District were funded through SMART SCALE's District Grant Program, totaling about \$56 million (two in Culpeper, one in Warrenton). One project submitted by CAMPO was funded through the High Priority Program at a cost of over \$36 million.

Our bottom-line request is simple: We call on the State to provide stable and consistent revenues for Virginia's long-term transportation infrastructure needs, including necessary funding to support project construction at the state, regional and local levels.

Again, we thank you for your efforts and appreciate your consideration of our position and recommendations as you press forward with considering legislation and shaping budgets in the upcoming General Assembly session. Thank you.

WHEREAS, the Public Outdoor Art Program supports the County's tourism goals by encouraging installations to draw visitors for exploration of Louisa County; and

WHEREAS, research and experience in communities across the Commonwealth and beyond show that outdoor art contributes to increased visitation, extended stays, and greater community visibility; and

WHEREAS, this policy provides a structured process for selecting, funding, and maintaining public art, while promoting collaboration with local and regional artists, nonprofit organizations, and private partners.

Louisa County Public Outdoor Art Program

I. Purpose

This Public Outdoor Art Program aims to support placemaking goals through the creation of inspiring, defined spaces within Louisa County and through fostering a sense of belonging for residents and all who visit.

II. Goals

- i. **Promote Economic Development:** Public art installations should draw tourism and enhance the appeal of outdoor spaces.
- ii. **Promote Cultural and Historical Awareness:** Art should reflect the local culture and history, ensuring diverse representation.
- iii. **Support Local:** To support the local creative economy, preference will be given to local and regional artists to contribute work. Additionally, the art should also encourage civic pride among residents.

III. Funding and Partnerships

Public art projects may be funded through tourism funds, public-private partnerships, or collaborations with non-profits and community organizations. Costs included for temporary and permanent works of art:

- i. Artist services, including models, design fees, and consultant fees;
- ii. Art-related materials, fabrication, delivery and installation costs;
- iii. Acquisition of works of art;
- iv. Incremental costs of public art integrated into infrastructure elements such as sound-walls, utility structures, roadway elements, landscape architecture and landscape elements;
- v. Plaques/markers;
- vi. Repair, replacement, maintenance, surveys, curatorial management, re-siting and other conservation work; and
- vii. Community education, publicity, dedications.

IV. Eligible Public Art

This policy applies to public art installations, including murals, sculptures, and other artistic works placed outdoors in publicly accessible spaces within the county. Public art may include, but is not limited to:

- i. Artistic designs incorporated into recreational trails;
- ii. Design work to be incorporated into a construction project; and
- iii. Exterior surfaces, fixtures and functional elements.

Requirements for Program Artwork:

- i. Art must be suitable for an outdoor exhibition in a public space, encouraging visitation and selfies (if safe).
- ii. If a sculpture, the base shall be level with the ground.
- iii. Art must be installed with sufficient anchoring to prevent the sculpture from being removed, tipped, broken or overturned due to adverse weather conditions or normal wear and tear.
- iv. Art must be low maintenance and durable in four seasons of weather.
- v. All art must be an original creation by the artist or ownership must be obtained prior to approval.
- vi. Works of art shall not create safety problems or liability concerns.
- vii. Works shall be appropriate for all ages.
- viii. Individual installations using tourism funds must follow the Virginia Procurement Policy and Louisa County's micro-purchase threshold as applicable.
- ix. Politically charged applications will not be considered.
- x. Work should be completed within 90-days of approval from the Board of Supervisors.

V. Art Selection Process

- i. **Applications:** The County will accept applications on a rolling basis.
- ii. **Selection Criteria:** Applications will be evaluated based relevance to Louisa County's identity, tourism potential, originality, feasibility, community impact, equity and inclusion, maintenance requirements, and applicant experience.
- iii. **Community Involvement:** The public may submit ideas on the application webpage. Ideas will be available to potential applicants.
- iv. **Ownership:** If selected, the design and the resulting artwork will be the exclusive property and expression of Louisa County.

VI. Maintenance and Conservation

Artists may be consulted for specific maintenance requirements and requirements will be budgeted into the maintenance program.

VII. Decommissioning

Artwork in this program may be decommissioned if it becomes a hazard, requires excessive maintenance, or no longer aligns with the County's vision.

VIII. Review and Oversight

The Tourism Advisory Committee will review applications and make recommendations to the Board of Supervisors based on the artwork's alignment with community goals.

Louisa County Sign Implementation Plan

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Executive Summary

County signage supports tourism efforts by creating a sense of place, and that sense of place encourages repeat visitation. The signage implementation plan in the pages that follow outline staff's recommendations to utilize a portion of Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) revenue allocated to tourism to support a County-wide signage program.



Overview of Gateway Signs

Staff has obtained pricing for gateway signs constructed of Aluminum, Aluminum Composite Material, cut out Aluminum, painted and vinyl graphics. The pricing ranges from \$2,850 - \$8,065 and is based on the draft signs to the left. While these designs are not final, note that substantial changes to size and material will impact cost. The draft gateway sign designs are used for reference throughout this document, and the large gateway sign design is intended to represent that different areas of the county may be branded with elements that make them unique (not to represent that all signs would include Lake Anna branding).

The service life for these signs is estimated between 7-15 years. Maintenance entails cleaning with soap and water as needed. These signs constitute Public Signs.

Overview of Event & Wayfinding Signs



The draft design for Event and Wayfinding signs may be found to the left. Pricing for a single-sided sign, produced and installed will be \$4,915. Double-sided, produced and installed will be \$6,020. The material for the signs at this cost will be Aluminum and Aluminum Composite Material with vinyl graphics.

The top area in the draft design, currently represented in blue, may be customized to reflect an overarching branded element for the county or a branded element for a particular area of the county. The area below may include wayfinding to encourage visitors to explore.

The panels below the wayfinding element are intended to be updated with signature events throughout the year to encourage attendance. We may fill the panels with Louisa County Parks, Recreation & Tourism events and other notable festivals. Panels will have tamper-proof screws and will cost \$85 produced and installed.

The service life for these signs is estimated between 7-15 years. Maintenance entails cleaning with soap and water as needed. These signs constitute Public Signs.

Painting of Water Towers

The cost for painting an erected water tower is approximately \$20,000. This estimate is for a multi-colored design.

Requirements for Roundabout Installations

The usable diameter for the roundabout at Wares Crossroads is 72 feet. The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) requires we submit plans with dimensions for approval prior to installing art or signage in the roundabout. If we install art or signage, we assume the center area maintenance responsibility to include mowing/plantings/lighting/maintenance of structures.

VDOT will review plans for fixed object art (to include signs and landscaping in general) in order to confirm the following:

- Art and landscaping must not invite pedestrians; must be scaled to be appreciated from the outer perimeter
- Fixed objects must be at least 6' from the inner curb face (enhanced lateral offset) and 14' or more from the circulatory roadway (clear zone)
- Fixed objects should not be in the perimeter landscape zone, and should not be in the line of path of approach traffic (approach geometry must deflect approaching vehicles away from the object)
- Sight obstructions must not be in the perimeter landscape (sight distance) zone
- When practical, frangible materials should be used
- Any lighting, fountains, signage, etc. must not interfere with or confuse roundabout users
- If existing landscaping is removed that was designed to restrict sight across the center island, then the new landscape design should also restrict sight lines across the center island.
- Tree species should not attract wildlife or create a maintenance nuisance.
- Maintenance access may need to be discussed if high maintenance landscaping is proposed
- For signage, a stamped engineered plan must be submitted.

See Section 14.5 of NCHRP Report 1043 for more information on fixed object art installations at roundabouts. Relevant information is included in this document's Appendix.

Tourism Advisory Committee Recommendation

The Tourism Advisory Committee recommends concentrating on gateway signage in year one of the sign program implementation, rather than installing event and wayfinding signs. *Note, we have now entered into the second fiscal year of this plan, but the initial installations in the recommendations to follow are in alignment with starting with gateway signage.*

Planning Commission Comments

The Planning Commission offered various thoughts on the signage program, with some members stressing safety considerations at the Wares Crossroads roundabout. Staff will ensure safety is the primary consideration throughout this project.

Year One Recommendations

Budget

The FY26 allocation in TOT revenue for signage is \$70,000. However, the FY26 allocation for a mural/art program, also funded with TOT revenue, is \$73,756. To best achieve our near-term goals, we may choose for the first art installations in our program to also meet our signage goals.

7. Using TOT sign program funds to install a small gateway sign near the **Spotsylvania** County line
8. Using TOT sign program funds to install a small gateway sign **near Hanover**
9. Using TOT sign program funds to install an event and wayfinding sign on **West Main Street**
10. Using TOT sign program funds to install an event and wayfinding sign on **Camp Creek Parkway**
11. Using TOT sign program funds to install an event and wayfinding sign near the **airpark**



Image of Water Tower in Zion Crossroads Currently



14.1.1 Landscaping Objectives

A landscaping plan consistent with the project context and type can help provide several benefits without sacrificing other design outcomes. Fundamentally, landscaping at a roundabout has several objectives:

- **Support intersection visibility on approach and maintain adequate sight distance.** Landscaping should allow drivers to observe the signing and shape of the roundabout as they approach, and it should provide adequate visibility for making decisions within the roundabout. While sight distance is often thought to be influenced only by static features, landscape and vegetation growth and maintenance can also temporarily affect sight distance.
- **Prevent excessive sight distance.** Excessive intersection sight distance can lead to higher vehicle speeds that increase crash risk and severity for all road users. Landscaping features indicate to approaching drivers that they cannot pass straight through the intersection. International evidence suggests it is advantageous to provide no more than the minimum required intersection sight distance on each approach (16). Practitioners should also note that mounding the central island can reduce headlights shining across the circle to opposing directions of travel.

- **Help pedestrians who are blind or have low vision locate sidewalks and crosswalks.** The buffer strip beside a sidewalk or walking path is an essential wayfinding component for pedestrians who are blind or have low vision. Traversable walking surfaces versus non-traversable surfaces, such as soft landscaping or hardscaping, are effective components that support wayfinding (17).

If achieved, these landscaping objectives provide considerable benefit over a roundabout without such landscaping.

14.1.2 Central Island Landscaping


Within non-traversable central islands, landscaping can

- Improve intersection conspicuity,
- Promote lower speeds,
- Break the headlight glare of oncoming vehicles, and
- Focus driver attention to the left at the entry to look for conflicting vehicles.

Typically, different types of landscaping are selected for the inner and outer portions of the central island, as described in the following and depicted in Exhibit 14.9. They can be classified into the inner landscape zone and the perimeter landscape zone.

Within the inner landscape zone, landscaping can be strategically located and managed to limit the amount of excess intersection sight distance, help encourage slow speeds, and provide a terminal vista for supporting approach visibility and stopping sight distance. The perimeter portion of the central island can be landscaped with low-level shrubs, grass, or groundcover, which can help maintain stopping sight distance requirements for vehicles within the circulatory roadway as well as improve intersection sight distance for vehicles entering the roundabout. The planting zone width around the perimeter of the central island will vary depending on the size of the roundabout and the required sight triangles, as described in Chapter 9: Geometric Design Process and Performance Checks.

A roundabout with a larger diameter provides more opportunity for prominent placemaking or landscaping that can serve as a gateway feature. However, an agency may not be able to provide ongoing maintenance because of cost or other resource limitations. Practitioners need to consider maintenance when developing the landscape plan to inform the types and quantity of landscaping that might be needed. This includes needs for irrigation, drought tolerance, and frequency of required maintenance. As trees grow, they can affect sight distance triangles if not properly maintained. In northern climates, practitioners need to consider the salt tolerance of any plant material along with snow storage and removal practices. In addition, landscaping requiring watering may increase the likelihood of wet and potentially slippery pavement.

A domed or mounded central island can provide the same conspicuity and terminal vista benefits as landscaping but should not exceed a horizontal-to-vertical ratio of 6:1 (adapted from

the guidance for transverse slopes in the AASHTO Roadside Design Guide) (19). Exhibit 14.9 provides elevations and sloping for a mounded central island. Mounding can deflect errant drivers to the right and reduce the likelihood of a head-on collision while absorbing some of the energy of entry. However, a mounded central island without landscaping does not adequately deter drivers from occasionally driving onto or over the central island.

Illuminating features on the central island can also provide positive visual evidence of the round-about. Lighting aimed at plantings and signs provides the necessary contrast for non-traversable areas of the roundabout. Eco-luminance is a concept that integrates lighting with vegetation by using lower mounting heights and reflected light from plants and retroreflective elements. The potential benefits of this approach include illuminating a roundabout using less energy and with improved aesthetics and positive contrast for all users (20).

For roundabouts with traversable central islands, central island landscaping is not an option. Exhibit 14.11 illustrates a retrofitted mini-roundabout that retained median landscaping even though the fully traversable central island does not provide landscaping opportunities.

14.1.3 Median and Approach Landscaping

Landscaping on a roundabout's approaches can enhance safety by making the intersection a focal point (i.e., enhancing its visibility) and narrowing the visual field for approaching drivers. This creates a funneling effect that induces drivers to slow down on approach.

Landscaping at splitter islands is subject to different considerations than landscaping on the central island. Landscaping at splitter islands must avoid obstructing stopping sight distance to the crosswalk, yield signs, and the roundabout entrance, particularly if reverse curvature is present on an approach. However, median and splitter island landscaping can be used to help remove excess sight distance. As discussed in Chapter 9: Geometric Design Process and Performance Checks, splitter islands are within intersection sight distance triangles between entering and conflicting vehicles, and they frequently serve as part of bicyclist and pedestrian crossings. Exhibit 14.12 and Exhibit 14.13 provide examples where the vegetation in the splitter island is beginning to undesirably encroach on stopping sight distance and intersection sight distance, respectively.

Exhibit 14.14 provides an example of low-lying vegetation in the splitter island with no risk of obstructing sight distance. The size of the splitter islands and the location of the roundabout

are determining factors when assessing whether to provide landscaping within the splitter islands. Generally, low-growing landscaping is recommended within sight triangles on either side of the pedestrian crossing and between the crossing and the circulatory roadway.

14.1.4 Art and Other Fixed Objects

In addition to landscaping, some agencies use the roundabout's central island as an opportunity to display local art or other gateway features. Communities often desire public art or other large aesthetic objects within the central island, including statues, fountains, monuments, and other gateway features for community enhancement. In some areas, a roundabout design can help define a community, township, or region by displaying a piece of art that represents local

heritage. Art can also aid placemaking, giving each roundabout in a community a distinct look. While the choice of art can sometimes spark debate due to differences in aesthetic tastes, it can also bring critically needed support to the project. Examples of artwork and other objects on the central island are shown in Exhibit 14.17 through Exhibit 14.22.

Including art and other fixed objects at roundabouts depends largely on the context of the roundabout. Any central island art or other objects need to be of a size and scale to be readily appreciated and observable from the outer perimeter of the intersection. The central island is not to include any inviting elements, such as benches or plaques, that might encourage a person to walk onto the central island for closer inspection. In addition, the central island features cannot

affect the drivers circulating the roundabout. For example, fountains on the central island of a roundabout may be feasible, but maintenance, the potential for leaks, and the range of spray under windy conditions must be considered.

Fixed objects present a potential hazard to vehicles that depart from the roadway, and they become more critical as approach speeds increase. If fixed objects are placed on the central island, they need to be designed and located to minimize crash risk and severity. This is especially important in environments with higher approach speeds, where fixed objects may improve visibility from a distance but introduce the risk of a crash with the fixed object. Roundabouts may have different levels of entry channelization depending on site context and intersection geometry. For example, if speed control relies on the central island (rather than entry curvature and splitter island channelization), the likelihood of errant vehicles striking the central island may be greater. If used, fixed objects are to be placed within the inner landscape zone at a location where the roundabout's geometry deflects approaching vehicles away from the object, as discussed in Section 14.4. To the extent possible, frangible materials are to be used in the perimeter landscape zone.

DRAFT LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES – 2026 SESSION OF THE VIRGINIA GENERAL ASSEMBLY

ADOPTED XX/XX/XXXX

The following legislative priorities have been adopted by the Louisa County Board of Supervisors for the upcoming session of the Virginia General Assembly.

Rural Preservation and Local Zoning Control

The preservation of rural lands and open space is a top priority for Louisa County, and local control over land use is an vital tool in this effort. The County firmly supports maintaining local control over land use and associated decisions. Local governments are the closest and most accessible form of government for their citizens, and are more connected with the land use issues and associated challenges facing their communities. As such, localities are best positioned to undertake planning and land use decisions. The Commonwealth should staunchly resist preempting or circumventing land use authorities and maintain/support for local authority in this regard.

Broadband

Internet has become a necessity, yet citizens in many localities have insufficient connectivity. Louisa was the first locality in the region to partner with multiple utility providers to provide end-user fiber on a County-wide basis, and the County supported the effort with a commitment of up to \$15 million in local dollars.

The County supports state (and federal) efforts to offset further funding requirements and to bolster cooperative efforts (among utility providers and other entities) and concerns such as easement usage associated with deployment.

State Funding Levels and Flexibility

The Commonwealth has funding responsibilities for several local services such as law enforcement (through the State Compensation Board) and education (through the Standards of Quality). In many cases, localities supplement this funding, and in some cases that supplement is significant. In Louisa, the state funds less than half of the deputy positions in the Sheriff's Office. When the state provides salary increase funding, it calculates the state funding amount using the number of state-funded positions, but sometimes compels the same increases for non-state funded positions. This is an unfunded mandate.

It is requested that the state allow flexibility in the application of state revenues (Compensation Board and otherwise) for compensation increases across all positions. Local governing bodies would have the choice (and therefore bear the responsibility for their decision) to either match the

state amount for all positions or to spread state funding across all positions.

The County also urges the state to continue efforts to increase funding for compensation board-funded and Standards of Quality-funded positions and functions.

State Library Funding

State aid for public libraries in the Commonwealth has not been fully funded since 2001. Libraries rely on this funding for books, media, and digital content. Progress toward full funding has been made over the past several years and year two of the governor's biennial budget includes full state funding. The County supports this effort.

Funding for Dolly Parton Imagination Library

The Dolly Parton Imagination Library is a book gifting program that provides free books to children from birth to the age they enter school. The state has provided support for the program, which has an active and impactful presence in Louisa County. The fiscal year state funding in 2026 is \$1.15M, down from \$1.65M in the prior fiscal year, and this reduction has the potential to materially impact the program. The County supports restoration of state funding to its previous level.

Buoy Maintenance and Hydrilla Treatment on Public Waters

The Lake Anna Advisory Committee (LAAC) is responsible for buoys on the public waters of Lake Anna, and also treats the lake for hydrilla, an invasive and submerged aquatic weed which can clog waterways, damage infrastructure, and reduce flows. With regard to buoys, the Department of Wildlife Resources (DWR) compels ongoing maintenance and standards for placement. The presence of hydrilla is a statewide issue, and mitigation in each body of water plays an important role in minimizing transference to other resources.

The costs associated with buoy maintenance and hydrilla mitigation are below. The County requests state support for funding of these efforts.

Freshwater Harmful Algae Blooms

The County is home to Lake Anna, the third largest freshwater lake in Virginia. The lake has experienced Harmful Algae Blooms (HAB) over the past several years. HAB's are also materially impacting other bodies of water in the Commonwealth, including Lake Gaston and the James River. HAB alerts have a material impact on public usage of our natural assets and this in turn impacts economic assets which rely thereon. These impacts include tourism-based operations such as vacation rentals, restaurants, marinas, and many related offerings. Costs to mitigate HAB in Lake Anna have been estimated at ~\$20M, and the County is grateful for the past funding support by General Assembly. Ongoing support in future years is requested to combat this issue.

Furthermore, freshwater monitoring in the state is minimally funded and decentralized. The County supports state efforts to formalize freshwater monitoring and adequately fund the same to keep public waters safe and protect those enjoying these resources.

Equal Revenue Authority

The County of Louisa gratefully acknowledges prior efforts by the General Assembly to address revenue generation inequalities, and fully supports further county rights to raise the same revenues as cities.

Jail Costs

Louisa County is a member jurisdiction of the Central Virginia Regional Jail (CVRJ) and is grateful for the recent increases in jail per diem rates approved by the General Assembly. Actual daily costs are nonetheless still significantly higher than reimbursement levels, and the County supports further improvements.

To offset future surprises and to fairly share future cost increases, the County supports continued increases in cost sharing, or indexing per diem costs as a fixed percentage of the actual statewide daily expense average as set forth by the state in the annual Jail Cost Report.

Small Modular Reactors

Virginia is a leader in clean energy production with over 30% of the state's power based on zero emission nuclear generation. Nuclear power provides reliable, competitively priced electricity to consumers in the Commonwealth, and low energy costs play a critical role in maintaining Virginia's stature as an attractive location for business. The Commonwealth is also home to numerous facilities and operations in the nuclear energy sector including BWX Technologies (engineering), Framatome (industrial computing and regulatory compliance), Newport News Shipbuilding and many others. These entities sustain thousands of jobs throughout the Commonwealth which support Virginia families, generate substantial tax dollars, and trigger beneficial relationships with higher education in the state to train the future nuclear workforce.

Dominion Energy operates the North Anna Nuclear Power Station in the County, and has set “net zero” emissions goals for its overall generation portfolio. Achieving these goals represents a substantial benefit to the environment and will require diversification of generation resources beyond that which is achievable by wind, solar, and energy storage alone. Additional nuclear generation represents a viable path forward in this important effort. Small Modular Reactors (SMR) represent an innovative, safe alternative to traditional nuclear power stations. Ranging from 50-300MW and fabricated in a factory environment, SMR's incorporate advanced features including scalable output and safe shutdown even in the absence of operator action, and their reduced complexity results in lower infrastructure requirements. HB894 (2022) directed the Department of Energy to study the development of SMR's and convene a stakeholder group for “promoting the development of advanced small modular reactors in the Commonwealth.” Louisa County supports this effort.

Development Road Reviews

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) formerly provided reviews of the internal roads, entrances, and related transportation aspects of development proposals. Following an opinion from the state's Attorney General, this practice was discontinued and localities must now have internal/contract staff to perform these functions. The County supports state efforts to move funding from VDOT to localities to support this increased workload.

Dog and Cat License Requirements

The Commonwealth compels licensure of dogs and cats in § 3.2-6524 of the Code of Virginia as part of efforts to require rabies vaccinations. The County believes the rabies vaccination requirement can be met without requiring a license, which compels local effort and administrative resources. The County supports efforts to maintain vaccination requirements without compelling the license process.

PERFORMANCE AGREEMENT
CLOUD COMPUTING CLUSTER INFRASTRUCTURE GRANT PROGRAM

THIS PERFORMANCE AGREEMENT (this “Agreement”), dated as of the _____ day of _____, 2025, made by and among the **COUNTY OF _____, VIRGINIA** (the “Locality”), and the **VIRGINIA ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PARTNERSHIP AUTHORITY**, a political subdivision of the Commonwealth (“VEDP”), and **AMAZON DATA SERVICES, INC.**, a Delaware company authorized to transact business in the Commonwealth (the “Company”), and provides:

Recitals

The Commonwealth, in consideration of the Company’s intentions regarding Capital Investment and New Full-Time Jobs, as such capitalized terms are defined below, wishes to offer certain incentives under the Cloud Computing Cluster Infrastructure Grant Program under the Act (“the Program”) to be used directly for the development of data centers in the Eligible Localities, including the Locality. The Program consists of grants to be paid to the Company from the Fund (the “Grant”) that are intended to pay or reimburse the Company for (i) Infrastructure Costs related to the construction and support of facilities and (ii) costs for workforce development, recruiting, and training based on the amount of Capital Investment made and New Full-Time Jobs created, as set forth in a separate Memorandum of Understanding between the Company, the Commonwealth of Virginia, and VEDP (the “Memorandum”). Such Grants are contingent on the commitment of a local match from the Eligible Locality in which each data center is located of at least twice the amount of Grants from the Cloud Computing Cluster Infrastructure Grant Fund created by the Act (“the Fund”) provided to the Company for Capital Investment and New Full-Time Jobs in the applicable Eligible Locality. This Agreement memorializes the Locality’s contribution to the Local Match.

On or about December 1, 2023, the Locality and the Company entered into the Economic Development Local Performance Agreement, in which the Locality agreed to provide the Company with certain grants based on a percentage of the increase in tax revenue generated by the Company’s development of data centers in the Locality (the “Local Grants”). The Locality, VEDP, and the Company intend for the Local Grants to contribute to the Local Match.

The stimulation of the additional tax revenue and economic activity to be generated by the Capital Investment and New Full-Time Jobs constitute a valid public purpose for the expenditure of public funds and is the animating purpose for the Grant.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and other good and valuable consideration, receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the Company, the Locality, and VEDP agree as follows:

Section 1. Definitions.

As used in this Agreement:

“Act” means Chapters 671 and 678 of the 2023 Acts of Assembly of the Commonwealth of Virginia that codified the Program at Chapter 22.21 (§ 59.1-284.42) of Title 59.1 of the Code of Virginia, as such legislation may be amended or supplemented.

“Agreement” has the meaning set forth in the preamble.

“Annual Report” means the annual written report, including the application for earned Grant Payments, to be filed by the Company with the Secretary, as described in Section 4 of the Memorandum.

“Average Annual Wage” means, for any calendar year, the quotient of (i) the annualized salary (defined as “wages” under Virginia Code §60.2-229 exclusive of benefits) payable to persons holding New Full-Time Jobs for such calendar year, divided by (ii) the number of New Full-Time Jobs in place as of the end of such calendar year.

“Capital Investment” means an investment by or on behalf of a qualified company incurred on or after January 1, 2023, in real property, tangible personal property, or both, at a Facility that are properly chargeable to a capital account or would be so chargeable with a proper election.

“Construction Costs” means any Capital Investment, except for the purchase of land, made by or on behalf of the Company in real or tangible personal property to develop or support a data center in an Eligible Locality. Construction Costs include Infrastructure Costs.

“Eligible Locality” means a locality identified in the Memorandum. The Locality is an Eligible Locality.

“Facility” means one or more buildings, group of buildings, and ancillary facilities and equipment that are located in the Locality and that are owned, occupied, or otherwise operated by or for the Company for data center and cloud computing cluster operations.

“Final Local Match Report” means the final Local Match Report to be submitted by the Locality pursuant to Section 4(b).

“Fund” has the meaning set forth in the Recitals.

“Grant” has the meaning set forth in the Recitals.

“Grant Payments” means payments paid from the Fund.

“Infrastructure Costs” includes costs related to fiber, water, wastewater, and stormwater facilities, gas pipelines; electrical transmission and distribution lines; and site clearing, grading, and other improvements to support the construction and development of the Facility.

“Economic Development Local Performance Agreement” means the agreement entered into between the Company and the Locality on December 1, 2023, setting forth the specific details related to the Company’s planned investment and job creation in the Locality and the Locality’s provision of the Local Grants to the Company. Such Economic Development Local Performance Agreement is attached hereto as Exhibit A.

“Local Grants” has the meaning set forth in the recitals.

“Local Match” means the funds committed by the Locality to the Company related to the construction and operation of a Facility, including by cash grants such as Local Grants, or via the expenditure of local funds for Infrastructure Costs. The Local Match shall be at least twice the amount provided from the Fund by the Commonwealth to the Company related to the construction of, and creation of New Full-Time Jobs at, a Facility in the Locality. Expenditures by the Locality certified by the Secretary as Infrastructure Costs incurred by the Locality shall be counted toward the Local Match obligation.

“Local Match Report” means the annual Local Match Report to be submitted by the Locality pursuant to Section 3.

“Maintain” means the New Full-Time Jobs created pursuant to the Memorandum that continue without interruption from the date of creation through the last day of the calendar year that immediately precedes the date of submission of each respective Annual Report. Positions for the New Full-Time Jobs will be treated as Maintained during periods in which such positions are not filled due to (i) temporary decreases in the Company’s employment levels (so long as there is active recruitment for open positions), (ii) strikes, and (iii) other temporary work stoppages.

“MEI Commission” means the MEI Project Approval Commission established pursuant to Chapter 47 (§ 30-309 et seq.) of Title 30 of the Code of Virginia.

“Memorandum” has the meaning set forth in the recitals.

“New Full-Time Job” means job positions created on or after January 1, 2023, but prior to July 1, 2040, in which the employee of a Company works at a Facility for which the standard fringe benefits are provided by the Company for the employee, and for which the Average Annual Wage is at least one and one-half times the prevailing average wage of the Locality. Each New Full-Time Job must require a minimum of either (i) 35 hours of an employee’s time per week for the entire normal year of the Company’s operations, which “normal year” must consist of at least 48 weeks, or (ii) 1,680 hours per year. Seasonal or temporary positions shall not qualify as New Full-Time Jobs. Positions created after January 1, 2023, by contractors that are dedicated full-time to providing operational services after the opening of a Facility may constitute New Full-Time Jobs of the Company but shall not exceed 20 percent of the number used to meet any performance criteria for the creation of New Full-Time Jobs. A position created when a job function is shifted from an existing location in the Commonwealth to a new Facility shall qualify as a New Full-Time Job if the Company certifies that it has hired a new employee or contractor to fill substantially the same job at an existing location as that performed by the transferred position. New Full-Time Jobs shall be in addition to the full-time jobs that the Company had in the Commonwealth as of January 1, 2023.

“Performance Date” means July 1, 2040.

“Program” has the meaning set forth in the Recitals.

“Secretary” means the Secretary of Commerce and Trade for the Commonwealth, or his or her designee.

Section 2. Cloud Computing Cluster Infrastructure Grant Program; Generally.

(a) Company as a Qualified Company. The MEI Commission endorsed the Company at its meeting on December 13, 2022, to receive Grant Payments from the Fund in the amounts set forth in the Memorandum, and the General Assembly approved the Company's eligibility for the award of such Grant Payments in the General Appropriation Act adopted during the 2023 Special Session I (Item 113 of Chapter 1 of the 2023 Acts of Assembly, Special Session I). The Company is eligible to receive a maximum aggregate Grant from the Commonwealth of \$140,000,000.

On the date of this Agreement, the parties acknowledge and agree that the Company is a qualified company and the Locality is an Eligible Locality, both as described in the Act.

(b) Performance Agreement. The parties intend that this Agreement meet the requirement in the Act that there be a performance agreement to set forth the Local Match regarding each Eligible Locality and between the Company, such Eligible Locality, and VEDP.

(c) Local Match. The Locality will provide the Local Grants pursuant to the Economic Development Local Performance Agreement, and the Local Grants will count towards the Local Match. Subject to the following sentence and Section 3(c), the Local Match will match the Grant Payments in an amount equal to at least twice the amount of the Grants paid by the Commonwealth for Construction Costs invested and New Full-Time Jobs Created and Maintained. This Agreement does not (i) create any additional payment obligations by the Locality to the Company separate from those set forth in the Economic Development Local Performance Agreement; or (ii) limit the amount of the Local Grants or any other obligation of the Locality or the other Eligible Localities under the respective Economic Development Local Performance Agreements.

Section 3. Reporting of Local Match Amount.

(a) Annual Local Match Report. On or before April 1 of each year, the Locality shall submit a Local Match Report to VEDP and the Company stating the amount, if any, of (i) the amount of Local Match provided by the Locality in the calendar year immediately preceding the date of submission of each respective Annual Report, (ii) the aggregate amount of Local Match provided by the Locality through the prior December 31, and (iii) if applicable, the amount of Infrastructure Costs incurred by the Locality and certified by the Secretary, which amount will be counted towards the Local Match.

(b) Final Local Match Report. No later than October 1, 2040, the Locality shall file its Final Local Match Report to VEDP and the Company, stating the total amount of Local Match provided to the Company through July 1, 2040.

(d) Final Certification. After the Company submits its Final Annual Report pursuant to (and as defined in) the Memorandum, VEDP shall calculate the total amount of Grant Payments made by the Commonwealth to the Company for Construction Costs made and New Full-Time Jobs Created and Maintained in the Locality and confirm whether the total Local Match equals at least twice the total amount of the Grant Payments. If the total Local Match is not at least twice the amount of the Grant Payments, the Company may be required to repay a portion of the Grants to the Commonwealth, pursuant to and subject to the terms set forth in Section 6 of the Memorandum.

Section 4. Notices.

Formal notices and communications between the parties will be given by (i) personal service, (ii) delivery by a reputable document delivery service that provides a receipt showing date and time of delivery, or (iii) mailing utilizing a certified or first-class mail postage prepaid service of the United States Postal Service that provides a receipt showing date and time of delivery. Notices and communications personally delivered or delivered by document delivery service will be deemed effective upon receipt. Notices and communications mailed will be deemed effective on the second business day following deposit in the United States mail. Such written notices and communications will be addressed to:

Section 5. Miscellaneous.

(a) Entire Agreement; Amendments. This Performance Agreement and the Economic Development Local Performance Agreement attached hereto constitute the entire agreement among the parties as to the subject matter contained herein. This Agreement may not be amended or modified, except in writing, signed by each of the parties hereto. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns. The Company may not assign its rights and obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the Locality and VEDP, except that such consent will not be required if the assignment is to an affiliate or in connection with any merger, reorganization, sale of all or substantially all of the Company's assets or any similar transaction, so long as prompt written notice is provided to the Locality and VEDP.

(b) Governing Law; Venue. This Agreement is made, and is intended to be performed, in the Commonwealth and shall be construed and enforced by the laws of the Commonwealth. Jurisdiction and venue for any litigation arising out of or involving this Agreement shall lie in the Circuit Court of the City of Richmond, and such litigation shall be brought only in such court. With respect to any proceeding or action arising out of or in any way related to this Agreement (whether in contract, tort, equity or otherwise) the parties knowingly, intentionally and irrevocably waive their right to trial by jury. To the fullest extent permitted by law, no party shall be liable for any indirect, incidental, special, punitive, exemplary or consequential damages.

(c) Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be an original, and all of which together shall be one and the same instrument.

(d) Severability. If any provision of this Agreement is determined to be unenforceable, invalid or illegal, then the enforceability, validity and legality of the remaining provisions will not in any way be affected or impaired, and such provision will be deemed to be restated to reflect the original intentions of the parties as nearly as possible in accordance with applicable law.

(e) Effective Date; Amendment of Act. The effective date of this Agreement shall be December 1, 2024. If the Act, as amended by the General Assembly, contains provisions that are additional to or in conflict with the provisions of this Agreement, the Company, Locality, and VEDP will endeavor to amend this Agreement to include or modify provisions to the end that this Agreement will be in conformity with the Act. To the extent any inconsistency between the Act and this Agreement exists, the terms of the Act shall control.

(f) Confidential and Proprietary Information. Any confidential and proprietary information made available by the Company or an affiliate shall be maintained as confidential by the Locality and VEDP to the maximum extent permitted by law. The Company understands that this Agreement is non-proprietary information and any amount of Local Match reported pursuant to this Agreement related to Grant Payments is non-proprietary, and both are subject to disclosure by the Locality and VEDP. Notwithstanding the foregoing, prior to any disclosure pursuant to a request for information under the Virginia Freedom of Information Act, the Locality or VEDP shall notify the Company as soon as reasonably possible and, at the same time, provide the Company with a copy of any intended disclosure and allow the Company sufficient time to provide

comments to the intended disclosure or seek a protective order or other similar recourse. The parties will work together in good faith to agree on the proposed wording of any disclosure.

(g) Attorney's Fees. Attorney's fees shall be paid by the party incurring such fees.

(h) Dispute Resolution. In the event of any dispute, controversy or claim of any kind or nature arising under or in connection with this Agreement (including (i) disputes as to the creation, validity, or interpretation of this Agreement or (ii) the existence or amount of any Grant Payment (a "Dispute")), then upon the written request of either party, each of the parties will appoint a senior representative whose task it will be to meet for the purpose of endeavoring to resolve the Dispute. The representatives will meet as often as the parties reasonably deem necessary in order to gather and furnish to the others all information with respect to the matter in issue which the parties believe to be appropriate and germane. Such representatives will discuss the Dispute and will negotiate in good faith in an effort to resolve the Dispute without the necessity of any formal proceeding. The specific format for such discussions will be left to the discretion of the representatives but may include the preparation of agreed upon statements of fact or written statements of position furnished to the other parties.

(i) Force Majeure. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Agreement, if the Locality does not achieve a target or take any action required under this Memorandum because of an "Event of Force Majeure" (as defined below), the time for achieving the applicable target or taking such action will be extended day-for-day by the delay caused by the Event of Force Majeure. "Event of Force Majeure" means without limitation, any of the following: acts of God; strikes, lockouts or other labor or industrial disturbances (whether or not on the part of agents or employees of any Party); act of public enemies; orders, law, regulation, or other action of any kind of the government of the United States of America or of the Commonwealth or any of their respective departments, agencies, political subdivisions or officials, or any civil or military authority, including, but not limited to war; sabotage; blockage; embargo; failure or inability to secure materials, supplies, or labor through ordinary sources; civil disturbance; terrorist act; power outage; windstorm; insurrections; riots; epidemics; pandemics; quarantine; landslides; lightning; earthquakes; fires; hurricanes; tornadoes; storms; floods; washouts; droughts; or other casualty; arrests; restraint of government and people; civil disturbances; explosions; breakage or accident to machinery, transmission pipes or canals not caused by the Company; insufficient or unavailable utilities; partial or entire failure of utilities; or any other cause or event not reasonably within the control of the Company.






October 1, 2024-September 30, 2025 (Rolling Year)

Grants, Capital, and Other Updates:

Grants Updates:

- RSAF TJ-C05/12-24 (50/50 for Medications and Lockers): Medication lockers have been ordered.
- RSAF TJ-C03/06-25: Video Laryngoscopes for this grant have been delivered, and training will begin soon. IV pumps have also been ordered.
- SAFER EMW-2020-FF-01104 (Volunteer R&R): This grant is nearing closeout. We have funding for a few more sets of volunteer turnout gear for new volunteer firefighters.

New Grants:

- SAFER EMW-2024-FF-01464: (SAFER EMW-2024-FF-01464: (Hiring) We received notification that we have been awarded this funding!
- SAFER EMW-2024-FF-01614: (Volunteer R&R): Awards have started on this grant cycle, and, to-date, we have not received this award.
- AFG EMW-2024-FG-01391: Equipment: We received notification that we have been awarded this funding!

Capital Projects:

- 481050 Command Vehicle: Three Chevrolet Silverado 2500HD trucks have been ordered, and design work for the emergency upfitting packages is nearly complete.
- 481051 Ambulances: FEMS has selected a vendor and finalized a quote for a new ambulance that will be delivered around the end of this year. Lake Anna Rescue has started working with their chosen vendor for a custom spec ambulance.






The Landfill received 8,439.23 tons of materials last month. The chart below shows the amount of material received at the landfill each month over the last three years.

The Landfill received 334.70 tons of brush last month. The chart below shows the tonnage of brush received at the landfill each month over the last three years.



4. Haul off approximately 194,000 gallons of leachate from onsite storage tank to the Wastewater treatment plant in Louisa for disposal.







The local agency is still receiving a high volume of calls with questions about their benefits cases or seeking information about other resources in and outside of Louisa County. Foot traffic was higher than that experienced in the prior year, but less than that of 2023 when businesses were more accessible following the end of the pandemic. The energy assistance program for Cooling ended in the month of August. The highest number of visitors to the agency occurred on Mondays (159), Wednesdays (142), and Fridays (121), with an average of just over 35 visitors on each of those days. Tuesdays (119) and Thursdays (101) saw an average of just over 24 visitors on those days. There was one observed holiday in the month of September, Labor Day which occurred on a Monday.








The most significant item regarding benefit programs is the tremendous reduction in overdue renewals since 2023. Unfortunately, the number of overdue renewals is still presenting over 450 cases 2 years later. This number impacts timeliness percentages as some of these cases are years old. Benefits staff with assistance from the State and other LDSSs are actively working to get these cases identified and processed. Some of these cases find their way back into the caseload as new applications or appeals that workers must evaluate.

FOSTER CARE SUMMARY:

No new placements this month. One youth transitioned from congregate care to a new local foster home. We are waiting on the final order to arrive any day now for two adoption cases.

As of September 2025, there are 20 youths in foster care. Seven (7) youth have been in care for less than 12 months, six (6) youth have been in care for more than 12 months, but less than 24 months and three (3) youth have been in care for more than 24 months. Each of these youth has had a face-to-face visit as required by State and foster care policy.

Two (2) of these youth reside in relative foster homes, two (2) youth are in congregate care, two (2) youth are in pre-adoptive placements, seven (7) youth are in a non-relative foster home placement, and four (4) youth are in the Fostering Futures program. One (1) youth is in Detention/DJJ, one (1) youth is hospitalized, and one (1) youth is on a trial home placement.

FOSTER PARENT RECRUITMENT/TRAINING UPDATE:

We have two new local foster families approved and ready for placement!

Recruitment is on hold as training is occurring for relatives for new placement.

Currently four relative families are in the process of approval and training. We will resume traditional family recruitment in November/December. We are also getting an influx of ICPC supervision cases being trained, and we will be responsible for case management and supervision once the placement is an approved foster home.







PROJECTS

Fuel Kiosk Relocation- The scheduled upgrade of the airport's fuel kiosk system is underway. The contractor has started to install new piping and a modern QTpod kiosk, which will be repositioned slightly farther from the fence line to improve accessibility and compliance. This marks the first kiosk replacement since the original installation in the late 1980s and will include significant technological enhancements, such as contactless card payment capability. Although the project was initially scheduled for completion by September 1, supply chain delays—specifically related to specialized piping components—have pushed the estimated completion to October. The project remains eligible for reimbursement through the Virginia Department of Aviation (DOAV).



Background/History:

Louisa County Water Authority (LCWA) was created in 1968 by the Louisa County Board of Supervisors to engage in water and wastewater treatment in the County. The County has provided financial assistance as necessary since the Authority's inception as LCWA works to build a sufficient user and revenue base.

LCWA is comprised of several separate subsystems:

- The Northeast Creek Water Treatment Plant produces water for the Towns of Louisa and Mineral as well as surrounding areas, and utilizes conventional treatment followed by Nanofiltration. This plant uses raw water from the Northeast Creek Reservoir; treated water is delivered via a distribution system which connects end users outside of the Towns as well as Town-managed distribution systems within the Towns.
- The Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant, which is owned by the Town of Louisa and the County and serves the same areas as the Northeast Creek Plant above. LCWA operates this system under contract.
- The Zion Crossroads water system consists of seven (8) potable production wells, and thirteen (13) monitoring wells and serves the Zion Crossroads/Ferncliff areas through a distribution system.
- The Zion Crossroads Wastewater Treatment Plant and collection system serves the same area as the Zion Crossroads Water System above.
- The Bowlers Mill raw water system is owned by the County and operated by LCWA to provide raw water to Old Dominion Electric Cooperative.
- The New Bridge System at Lake Anna provides water and wastewater services to the development area near Lake Anna on Rt. 208.





Zion Crossroads Wastewater Treatment Plant Treated Effluent / Re-Use (Gallons per month)



BACKGROUND: 2024 PJM OPEN WINDOW

- PJM is the regional transmission organization that coordinates the movement of wholesale electricity in all or parts of 13 states, including Virginia.
- PJM's Open Window process solicits annual proposals from several electric transmission developers aimed at enhancing the reliability of the electric transmission grid.
- The proposals must present practical and buildable solutions that address specific electrical needs.
- After multiple proposals were submitted, the PJM Board of Managers began their lengthy review process.
- In 2024, the PJM Board of Managers selected Dominion Energy's proposal for the Kraken Loop Project, among other projects.

WHAT'S INCLUDED IN THE PROPOSAL?

The proposed Kraken Loop is a 500 kV electric transmission project that is in the early stages of development. The project includes:

- Approximately 70 miles of new 500 kV electric transmission line through Louisa, Spotsylvania, Caroline, Stafford, and Fauquier counties.
- The line will connect the existing North Anna Substation to the proposed Kraken Substation in Caroline County, and will ultimately tie into the proposed Yeat Substation in Fauquier County.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

How does PJM ensure the reliability of the electric grid?

PJM ensures electric grid reliability through continuous monitoring and coordination of the high-voltage electric transmission network. It conducts detailed planning studies to identify potential reliability issues and selects and implements solutions to address them. PJM also operates a real-time control center that monitors grid conditions 24/7, ensuring that electric supply meets demand and that the grid remains stable and secure.

Will the public be involved in the project approval process?

Yes. Your voice matters at every stage of this project. Extensive outreach with residents, local governments, and other stakeholders will guide key decisions, including how to avoid or minimize potential impacts. You will also have many opportunities to participate in the SCC approval process.

What does the Virginia State Corporation Commission (SCC) process entail?

The SCC is the regulatory body with jurisdiction over electric transmission lines in Virginia. The Kraken Loop Project involves new 500 kV transmission line and will be subject to SCC review. The SCC will validate the need for the project and approve a final route and structures. Virginia law requires it to consider whether various potential impacts have been reasonably minimized.

Dominion Energy intends to file an application with the SCC in Q2 2026. The SCC will then publish a procedural schedule, including additional opportunities for public input. A proceeding of this nature can take 12 to 24 months. It is important to note that although the SCC is the primary agency responsible for reviewing and ultimately approving the project, additional permits will be required from local, state, and federal agencies.

Where will the substations be located for the Kraken Loop?

The line will connect the existing North Anna Substation to the proposed Kraken Substation in Caroline County. The Kraken Loop will ultimately tie into the proposed Yeat Substation in Fauquier County. This investment strengthens the grid, supports Virginia's energy security, and ensures reliable power for your community.

- You may see much of this project routed along existing Dominion Energy right-of-way corridors.
- You will have opportunities to share input on the route options before they are submitted to the Virginia State Corporation Commission (SCC).



¿De qué manera PJM asegura la fiabilidad de la red eléctrica?

PJM asegura la fiabilidad de la red eléctrica a través del monitoreo y la coordinación permanentes de la red de transmisión eléctrica de alto voltaje. Realiza estudios de planificación detallados para identificar potenciales problemas de fiabilidad y elige e implementa soluciones para abordarlos. PJM también opera un centro de control en tiempo real que monitorea las condiciones de la red las 24 horas, los 7 días de la semana, asegurando que el suministro eléctrico cumpla con la demanda y que la red siga siendo estable y segura.

¿El público participará en el proceso de aprobación del proyecto?

Sí. Su opinión importa en cada etapa de este proyecto. El compromiso amplio con los residentes, gobiernos locales y otras partes interesadas guiará las decisiones clave, incluso la forma de evitar o minimizar potenciales impactos. Usted también tendrá muchas oportunidades de participar en el proceso de aprobación de la SCC.

¿Qué conlleva el proceso de la Comisión de Corporaciones del Estado de Virginia (SCC)?

La SCC es la autoridad regulatoria con competencia en las líneas de transmisión eléctrica en Virginia. El Proyecto Kraken Loop conlleva una línea de transmisión nueva de 500 kV y será revisado por la SCC. La SCC validará la necesidad del proyecto y aprobará una ruta y estructuras definitivas. La ley de Virginia le exige que considere si se han minimizado varios impactos potenciales de manera razonable.

Dominion Energy tiene previsto presentar una solicitud ante la SCC en el segundo trimestre de 2026. La SCC luego publicará un calendario de procedimientos, incluidas las oportunidades adicionales de comentarios del público. Un procedimiento de este tipo puede durar entre 12 y 24 meses. Cabe destacar que, aunque la SCC es la agencia principal a cargo de revisar y finalmente aprobar el proyecto, se necesitarán permisos adicionales de agencias locales, estatales y federales.

¿Dónde se ubicarán las subestaciones correspondientes a Kraken Loop?

La línea conectará a la actual Subestación North Anna con la Subestación Kraken propuesta en el condado de Caroline. Kraken Loop finalmente se conectará con la futura Subestación Yeat, propuesta en el condado de Fauquier. Esta inversión fortalece la red, fomenta la seguridad energética de Virginia y garantiza un suministro eléctrico fiable para su comunidad.

DE CARA AL FUTURO

- Es posible que gran parte de este proyecto se desarrolle a lo largo de los corredores de derecho de paso existentes de Dominion Energy.
- Tendrá la posibilidad de compartir su opinión acerca de las opciones de rutas antes de que se presenten ante la Comisión de Corporaciones del Estado de Virginia (SCC).
- Dominion Energy llevará a cabo encuestas para identificar recursos ambientales, culturales e históricos en el área del proyecto, como así también cualquier especie en peligro y/o en vías de extinción.

Las rutas potenciales podrán precisarse usando los comentarios aportados por usted y otros miembros de la comunidad a través de reuniones, jornadas de puertas abiertas y participación directa. Usted recibirá novedades periódicas y comunicaciones claras para que pueda mantenerse informado durante todo el proceso.

Dear Governor Youngkin:

We write as the representatives of the communities on and around Lake Anna to respectfully request that your biennial budget include **\$1 million annually in each of the next two fiscal years** to continue phosphorus remediation and combat harmful algal blooms (HABs). Sustained funding is essential to protect public health, safeguard tourism and property values, and preserve the economic vitality of this region.

Lake Anna is a 13,000-acre reservoir created in the early 1970s to serve as the cooling reservoir for the North Anna Power Station, a critical asset in ensuring affordable, reliable energy for Virginia families and businesses. The lake stretches across Spotsylvania, Louisa, and Orange Counties and serves as a major economic engine for the region. Its 200+ miles of shoreline include more than 5,000 waterfront and water-access homes, generating millions in property tax revenues. Lake Anna State Park, one of Virginia's largest, attracts tens of thousands of visitors each year with its 3,000 acres of campgrounds, hiking and biking trails, fishing piers, boat launches, and beaches. Beyond the state park, numerous marinas and rental businesses support a thriving tourism economy that contributes millions annually in lodging, dining, and recreation spending.

In recent years, however, Lake Anna has been severely impacted by HABs. These toxic blooms of cyanobacteria pose real health risks to swimmers, anglers, boaters, and pets. Since 2018, the Virginia Department of Health has issued "No Swim Advisories" during peak recreation months, closing large portions of the lake and undermining its value to both residents and visitors.

Your administration and the General Assembly have already taken important steps to address this crisis. With \$1 million appropriated in FY24 and \$750,000 in FY25, remediation efforts have demonstrated measurable success in reducing phosphorus levels, improving water quality, and showing proof of concept for large-scale HAB treatment. This progress would not have been possible without your leadership and the Commonwealth's investment.

But this work is not a one-time fix. HAB remediation requires a consistent, multi-year commitment. At present, no funding is provided for FY26 or FY27, leaving the progress we have made at risk. Without sustained support, HABs will continue to threaten the health of lake users, diminish tourism revenues, and depress property values across three counties.

The Lake Anna community has stepped up to do its part. The Lake Anna Civic Association (LACA) has invested more than \$250,000 through voluntary donations for monitoring and research. While this demonstrates strong local commitment, the scale of the problem requires state partnership to match and build on these efforts.

We therefore respectfully request that you include **\$1 million in each of the next two fiscal years** in your upcoming budget for HAB treatment, mitigation, and remediation at Lake Anna. This consistent funding will protect public health, preserve Virginia's tourism and real estate economy, and ensure that Lake Anna remains a treasured resource for generations.

Based on our conversations with the Lake Anna communities that we represent, we believe this request enjoys the support of the relevant local governments, who we expect will convey their support through separate correspondence.

This letter provides the results of our September 16, 2025 inspection of the proposed well sites to serve the Christopher Run Campground waterworks. In accordance with the *Waterworks Regulations*, the following well sites are tentatively approved by the Virginia Department of Health, Office of Drinking Water (VDH-ODW) for the construction of the wells to be utilized as a public drinking water supply:

Well Nos. 4, 5 and 6

The approval of the well sites listed above expires 12 months from the date of this letter and is subject to the conditions described in the attached Well Site Approval Conditions Form. This approval is limited to well drilling, casing, grouting, and testing of the well. If drilling of any well listed above has not commenced by the expiration date, a re-inspection of the well site is required.

Upon receipt of the required documentation and after plans and specifications have been approved, a Construction Permit will be issued by the State Health Commissioner in accordance with the *Waterworks Regulations*. Construction of the waterworks facilities shall not be started until the construction permit has been issued.

Waterworks wells must be constructed by a licensed Water Well Systems Provider in Virginia. You may confirm licensure status by contacting the Virginia Department of Professional and Occupational Regulation (DPOR) or using the search tool on DPOR's website at the following address:



Dear Ms. Jackson:

The subject waterworks appears to be in violation of the Commonwealth of Virginia *Waterworks Regulations*.

According to our records, the required triggered source water sample was not collected for the contaminated sample, Mid-Atlantic Lab Sample # CS21374, collected on September 19, 2025. Section 12VAC5-590-379B.1 of the *Waterworks Regulations* requires you to collect and have analyzed a triggered source water sample whenever there is a routine total coliform present sample.

Required Actions

Public Notice: The *Waterworks Regulations* characterize this as a Tier 3 violation. You are required to notify consumers that the required monitoring was not conducted, as follows:

- **You must provide a Notice to Consumers (“Notice”) no later than October 15, 2026.**
- The Notice must be posted in conspicuous locations throughout the area served by your waterworks, or mailed or directly delivered to the persons served by your waterworks.

- If your waterworks serves consumers who would not be reached by your posted, mailed, or hand-delivered Notice, you must also use other distribution methods to provide the Notice to these consumers as well. Such persons may include those who may not see the posted Notice because it is not in a location they routinely pass. Examples of other methods include, but are not limited to, publication of the Notice through a company newsletter, or by E-mail to staff or students.
- The Notice must be posted for a minimum of seven days even if the violation has been resolved, and must remain in place as long as the violation persists.
- You must repeat distribution of the notice annually for as long as the violation persists.

Attached is a draft notice for you to provide to consumers. You may use this notice as is, or modify it to meet your situation better, as long as the information is accurate and the notice contains all of the required elements and mandated language. If you decide to change the notice, we suggest you contact this Office to verify your proposed changes meet the requirements of the *Waterworks Regulations*. Please insert the name, address, and phone number of a waterworks representative in the spaces provided on the draft notice.

Public Notice Confirmation: Within 10 days of completing public notification, you must provide this Office with a copy of the notice you distributed, along with signed certification of the distribution completion date and methods used. **The signed certification form is due to this office no later than October 25, 2026.** Failure to distribute public notice and report to the Virginia Department of Health may be a further violation of the *Waterworks Regulations*. Enclosed is a certification form for your use.

Follow-up Actions: You must **collect a source water triggered sample by November 15, 2025** or within 30 days of receipt of this letter in order to return to compliance with the *Waterworks Regulations*.

Requesting an Administrative Proceeding: If you disagree with the allegations in this notice or wish to obtain a determination as to whether a violation has occurred, you may request an informal conference in accordance with Va. Code § 2.2-4019 and 12VAC5-590-115 of the *Waterworks Regulations*. To request an informal conference, please contact Grant Kronenberg, Director of Compliance, Enforcement and Policy by telephone or email at (804) 629-0989 or grant.kronenberg@vdh.virginia.gov.

Enforcement Authority: Failure to take all the necessary corrective actions in a timely manner to voluntarily return your waterworks to compliance may result in enforcement action. Enforcement actions include permit revocation, administrative orders, and civil or criminal proceedings, and civil charges or penalties of up to \$5,000 per day for each violation. Va. Code §§ 32.1-26, 32.1-27, 32.1-175.01 and 32.1-176.
